Parts, Novemb. 4. The Campaign being every where ended, the Generals who commanded the French Armies in Flanders, Germany, Piedmont and Catalonia are fibortly expected here. Lincoln, Octob. 30. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs afterwards artended on His Majesty at his Lodgings, and had the Honour to kis His Hand; as the Clergy did this Morning in a Body: And the Magistrates, in their Formalities, waited upon His Majesty to Prayers at the Cathedral; after which, His Majesty went hence to the Duke of Newcastle's at Welbeck in Nottinghamshire.
