WE have the Confirmation of the departure of the Homeward bound *Turkey* Convoy from *Messina* on the 2d of this Month, and as the Winds have been since, we conclude they are by this time on the Coast of *Spain*. The 19th came in here an English Vessel called the *Peace Sloop*. in 25 days from *Alexandria*, and 3 from *Messina*. The *Russell-Frigat*, Capt. *Peacock*, is sailed hence for *Galipoli*. Yesterday departed the French Man of War, as also the French Privateer of 16 Guns, mentioned in my last.

Venice, Octob. 23. We have an Account that the Pope's and Maltese Galleys are passed by *Corfu* in their return home from the Venerian Fleet in the *Levant*. There is yet no other advice come of their Engagement with the *Turks* on the 24th of the last Month, than what has been already made publick. The Count de *Martini*, Ambassador from the Emperor to the Pope, is arrived here in his way to *Rome*.

Turin, Octob. 29. The Duke of *Savoy* is returned hither, and the Forces of the Allies march to their Winter Quarters. The French who lie at *Diblon* are likewise going to separate.

Vicna, Octob. 29. General *Caprara* returned hither yesterday from *Transilvania*, having left the Imperial Forces in their Winter Quarters. All the Letters from *Hungary* confirm that the *Sultan* is gone back towards *Adrianople*. The report of Gen. *Veterani's* being alive is certainly false, as appears by fresh advices from *Temeswar*. The Elector of *Saxony* will part from hence in few days for *Dresden*, where he will make but a short stay, and then return hither, intending to pass great Part of the Winter at this Court: 'Tis said his Electoral Highness will raise several new Regiments. They write from *Croatia*, that their Troops were returned from the Incurtion they had made into the Enemy's Country, where they had Plunder'd and burnt the Suburbs of a large Town called *Trafsaniza*, and had killed and taken divers *Turks*. The Imperial Forces commanded by General *Staremberg*, were by the last Letters from *Peter Waradin*, still encamp'd near that Place.

Francfort, Nov. 6. The Forces that serv'd on the *Upper Rhine* this last Campaign are now in their Winter Quarters, and care has been taken to post a sufficient Body of them so as to secure the Country against the Enemies Excursions during the Winter. The French are marched to their Quarters in *Alsace*, *Franche Compte* and *Lorraine*,

and the *Mareschal de Lorge* was the last week at *Strasbourg*.

Cologne, Nov. 8. The Elector of *Cologne* is expected in few days at *Bon* from *Munich*; and 'tis said, that upon his arrival Commissions will be given out for new Levies. They write from *Trier*, that the Troops which were some time encamped under the Command of the Count de *Tallard*, are gone into their Quarters along the *Moselle*.

Paris, Nov. 7. The French Court is now at *Marli*, where the *Mareschal de Villeroy* is expected in a day or two, having an Apartment provided for him; and the discourse is, that he is to Command again the next Year in *Flanders*: The *Mareschal de Boufflers* is not yet returned thither; 'tis thought he stays till *Mareschal Villeroy* arrives. The Count de *Montal* is now here, and there is a talk of his being made a *Mareschal of France*, which he pretended to at the last Promotion. The *Mareschal de Lorge* parted from *Strasbourg* the 30th past, and is gone to the Waters at *Vichi*: The French Forces in *Germany* are all in their Winter Quarters; 9 Battalions and 2 Regiments of Horse are to Winter at *Strasbourg*. The French Troops in *Piedmont* began to decamp from *Diblon* the 31th of the last month, in order to enter into their Quarters; 13 Battalions are to remain in *Pignerol*, and several others in the Valleys of *Pragelas* and *Perouse*: *Mareschal Catinat* is thought to be by this time on his return hither. The Letters from *Brest* say, that 4 Ships of the *Marquis de Nesmond's* Squadron were gone out again to Cruise for the account of the Privateers. *Monsieur de Vauban* is shortly expected here from *Brest*. They write from *Toulon*, that most of the Officers of the *Marine* had leave to be absent from their Commands for some time, there being no likelihood of any Service for them this Winter.

Brussels, Nov. 9. The French are making new Lines between *Furnes* and *Ipres*, and others between *Avelghem* and *Courtray*, and have posted near those Places small Bodies of Troops, to cover the Workmen: They have demanded of all the Towns in the new Conquests a certain number of Men, as well for recruiting their Forces, as for the new Regiments they are going to raise: For which purpose *Valenciennes* and *Lille* are to furnish 1000 men each, and other Places proportionably. We hear that the *Mareschal de Villeroy* was the 2d of this month at *Charleroy*, and from thence is gone to visit *Dinant* and other of the French Frontier Garisons before he returns to *Paris*. The Letters from *Namur* give an account, that a Party of 40 Foot and 30 Dragoons commanded by Capt. *John George de Bien*,

Bien, went out from thence on the 1st Instant, and lying in Ambush near *Marionburg*, next day met the Governor of *Chimay*, having with him a strong Convoy; whom they charged and routed, killing several upon the place, among which was the Governor himself, and bringing away 32 Prisoners.

Hague, Nov. 11. N. S. The States of *Holland* are to meet again the 15th Instant, to finish the Funds for the next year. The Prince of *Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Friesland*, went the 8th to *Amsterdam*, and from thence would return to *Leeuwarden*. The new Governor of *Surinam*, the *Heer Van Veen*, will Embark in few days, in order to repair thither.

Newcastle, Nov. 1. Captain *Robinson*, Commander of the *Assistance*, brought last Monday into *Sunderland* a French Privateer of 4 Guns and 44 Men, belonging to *Dunkirk*. On Tuesday sailed hence the *Winchester* and *Swallow*, with about 50 Sail of laden Colliers.

Plimouth, Novemb. 3. This day sailed hence two Dutch Men of War, and under their Convoy about 14 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to *Rotterdam*. The *Ann* of and from *Bombay* taken by the French, and retaken by the *Newcastle*, is come into this Port.

Portsmouth, Nov. 5. Yesterday came to Spithead His Majesty's Ships, the *Norfolk*, *Expedition*, *Engle*, *Monk*, *Southampton* and *Resolution*, and brought an account that Admiral *Russell* passed by that morning, with the *Downes*, with the rest of the Ships that are come home with him. Yesterday being His Majesty's Birth-Day, the English and Dutch Men of War at *Spithead* fired all their Guns; and in the Evening, the *Garillon* being at their Arms, gave three Volleys, and the Cannon were discharged round the Town, after which there were Firework and Bonfires.

Dunkirk, Nov. 5. His Majesty's Ships, the *Charles Galley* and *Harwich*, came this day into the *Downs* from the Westward.

London, Nov. 1. On Thursday last was Launched at *Dewford*, a new Ship of the fourth Rate, named the *Windsor*, carrying 60 Guns, built by Mr *Edward Snigrove*.

Welbeck, Novemb. 2. The Lord Mayor and Aldermen of *Tork* waited on the King here this Morning, being introduced by the Duke of *Newcastle*, and the Recorder made a Speech to His Majesty, who was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon the Lord Mayor, *Gilbert Mordaunt*, Esq. In the Evening the Lord Archbishop of *Tork*, with his Clergy, attended his Majesty, and congratulated his happy Success and safe Return, expressed their Gratitude for his Majesty's Care of the Church, who had shewed himself truly the Defender of the Faith; assured His Majesty of their Fidelity and Loyalty; prayed for all Blessings to attend him, and recommended themselves to his Protection; which His Majesty was pleased to assure them of, and all other Demonstrations of His Grace and Favour.

Warwick, Nov. 4. The King left *Welbeck* Yesterday in the Afternoon, and came that Evening to the Earl of *Stamford's* House at *Brodgate*, where His Majesty lay; and about nine this Night His Majesty came hither to my Lord *Brook's*, being received with great Acclamations, Ringing of Bells, Illuminations and other Expressions of Joy; The Mayor and Aldermen met His Majesty at the Town End, and rid before his Coach to the Castle. To-morrow His Majesty will go hence to *Burford*.

Burford, Nov. 5. The King came from *Warwick* Castle this Morning; The Magistrates attended His Majesty; and my Lord *Brook* and the Gentlemen of the County waited up in His Majesty out of Town, and some part of the way on *Horsback*; His Majesty dined with my Lord Duke of *Shrewsbury* at *Eyford*, and came hither this Evening.

Witchell, Nov. 6. The 4th Instant being His Majesty's Birth-Day, and yesterday the Anniversary of the discovery of the Gun-Powder Treason, were observed with great Rejoycings, and usual Solemnity.
