

Sweden and as many German, has lent the Keys of the City to the Imperial Envoy, and declared that he will keep the same pursuant to the Orders he shall receive from his Imperial Majesty, and till the Matter about the Succession be legally determined, and in the mean time the Ministers of the late Duke do continue in the Administration of the Government as before.

Paris, Nov. 21. The Marechal de Catinat is daily expected here from Piedmont: 'Tis said he is of Opinion to demolish Pignerol to save the Expence of maintaining an Army on that side, and to keep Susa, fenestrelle, and some other Posts on the Frontiers of Dauphine. Monsieur de Bonrepos is to return to Denmark as Ambassador from this Court, and prepares for his departure. We hear that Orders are sent to L'Union to Careen the Men of War in that Port, that they may be ready to go out by the beginning of March. Four French Men of War are sailed from Toulon to Convey several Merchant Ships bound to the Levant. The Ministers of this Court have still under Consideration several Proposals for the raising of Money, but the King's Treasury is so exhausted, that there appear great Difficulties in all of them.

Brussels, Nov. 23. The Elector of Bavaria intends to go the next Week to Namur, to view the Fortifications of that Place, which are almost repaired, and several new Works are ordered to be made. Monsieur Dickvelt came hither yesterday from Holland. The French lay up great Magazines in several Places near the Sambre, as also in the Province of Haynault. On the 19th Instant a Party from Mons came to a Village called Locken, about a League from hence, and carried away some Horses, but being pursued by one of our Parties, several of them were killed, others taken, and all the Booty recovered.

Hague, Nov. 25. N. S. Monsieur Smettax is returned hither from Wisel, where he left the Elector of Brandenburg on Saturday last. The Deputies of the Admiralties are come hither to consult with those of the States, about the Maritime Affairs: 'Tis believed the next Letters from Flanders will tell us, the Sentence against Major General Eckenberg, late Governor of Dismuyde, who is condemned to be beheaded, is put in Execution.

Dublin, Nov. 13. They write from Kinsale of the 10th Instant, that on Wednesday last arrived in that Port the Hopewell of Pool, Thomas Nicholas Master, in three weeks from Newfoundland, where he left a great Fleet of Merchant Ships ready to sail for the Streights. The 9th arrived at Kinsale the Restauration; the Nesbergh; the Lucy; the Catherine; the Recovery; the John and Elizabeth; the Friendship; the William and Richard; and the Blossom, all laden with Sugars and Corroa from Barbadoes, but came last from Castlehaven. The same day sailed the Weymouth, Portland, and Foresight Men of War to Cruize.

Falmouth, Nov. 16. The 14th Instant arrived here the Dreadnought Frigate, with the Falkland laden with Masts, and several other Merchant Ships from St. Antonio; and this day they sailed again to the Eastward.

Plymouth, Nov. 17. Yesterday came into this Port His Majesty's Ship the Dreadnought with the Hawke Fireship, the Falkland, and several other Merchant Men from the Westward, as also two Prizes taken by two Dutch Privateers.

Deale, Nov. 19. The 17th Instant at night arrived in the Downs His Majesty's Ships the Bonaventure, Greenwich and Colchester, with 14 Sail of Merchant Ships from Seaboard, Zant, and other Parts of the Streights; and yesterday the Greenwich with the said Merchant Men sailed for the River. Yesterday in the Afternoon came in His Majesty's hired Ship the Samuel and Henry.

Kensington, Nov. 13. His Majesty returned hither this Evening from Windsor.
