

Frankfort, Nov. 23. The Imperialists fortify *Hailerott* and *Eppingen*, and have good Garisons in both; The Deputies of *Franconia* and the Neighbouring Countreys have frequent Meetings to consult together about the preparations for the next Campaigne. His said late Prince *Lewis of Baden* will go shortly to *Vienna*. The French have demolished the little Town of *Bacarab* on the *Rhine*.

Cologne, Nov. 25. The Elector of *Cologne* is expected at *Bonn* about the beginning of the next month; Strict care is taken by his Order to hinder the supplying the French with Horses out of these parts.

Paris, Nov. 25. The Marquis de *Cascais* Ambassador from the King of *Portugal*, who arrived here about 4 months ago, had his first Audience of the French King on the 21th Instant, which had been deferred upon account of some dispute between him and the Ministers of this Court concerning the Ceremonies of his Reception. His said that Commissions are given out for several new Companies of Foot, and that there are to be 36 in all, who are to form their Regiments of the Battalions and Independent Companies now in Garisons; and the places of these are to be supplied by the Militia. The Marschal de *Boufflers* is gone to *Flanders*, and intended to be this day at *Lille*. The Marschal de *Catinat* is not yet arrived from *Piedmont*, but daily expected.

Brussels, Nov. 27. Last Monday night two strong Parties marched from *Namur* to raise Contributions upon the Enemy, in which they succeeded so well, that they put the Village of *Marovelles* near *Landrezy*, *Grand Fay*, and several other Places under Contribution, and brought away divers Hoftages for payment of the same. On Thursday last the Spanish Cavalry was mustered here, and the like has been done in all the other Garisons where they are quartered. The French make new Levies in all their Conquests. We have advice, that the Guard they had at *Moraigne* upon the *Schelde*, consisting of 150 men, have all deserted with their Officers, and are come to *Aeth*; They are all Swissers; and most of them are entred into the Service of the Allies.

Hague, Nov. 29. N. S. The States of *Holland* are still assembled, and their Deputies have had several Conferences with those of the Admiralties about our Sea Preparations. The Dutch Men of War that returned from the *Streights* under the command of Vice-Admiral *Callemberg*, are arrived with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy, part in the *Maeße*, and the rest in the *Texell*, and other Places to which they belong. They write from *Ghent*, that the Execution of Major General *Elenbergh*, late Governor of *Dixmuyde*, is appointed for to morrow.

Plimouth, Nov. 19. Yesterday sailed hence the *Dreadnought* and *Hawke* Fireship, and under their Convoy the *Falkland*, *George Long* Commander, with 9 or 10 Merchant Ships more for the *Dowries*.

Farmouth, Nov. 20. Yesterday came into this Road the *Affiance*, Capt. *Robinson* Commander, having retaken two small Vessels, and given chase during several hours to the Privateer who took them; but the night coming on the Privateer escaped. The *Affiance* and *Mermoid* sailed this day with a Fleet of Light Colliers to the Northward; and the *Saphire* is come in with divers laden Colliers.

Deal, Nov. 21. His Majesties Ship the *Charles* Galley, Captain *Elliot* Commander, returned yesterday into the *Dowries*; who cruising on the French Coast, fell in on Thursday last with a fleet of about 50 French Coasters near *Havre de Grace*, and though they were protected by 5 Privateers, Capt. *Elliot* took two of them laden with Corn, Salt, and Tobacco, and forced most of the rest ashore.

Hull, Nov. 22. The *Anne* and *Barbara* is come in here from *Archangle*; whence she parted about 7 weeks ago in company of two other Merchant Ships commanded by Capt. *Allison* and Capt. *Martin*, but was separated from them the 3th Instant; The *Abraham* came out 14 days before them; and they left at *Archangle* the *Dove*, and the *Robert Bonaventure*.
