TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

In accordance with the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for those branches of the trade in Great Britain as specified in the Trade Boards (Tobacco) Order, 1919 (that is to say, the manufacture of Tobacco, Cigars, Cigarettes, Cigarette Tubes and Snuff, including the preparatory processes, and including also the operations of storing and store-keeping, boxing, packeting, labelling, parceling and despatching, and all other warehouse and packing operations incidental to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles) give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time Rates of Wages for male and female workers as follows:—

A.—Male Workers.

When employed under 14½ years of age, 15s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 14½ and under 15 years of age, 17s. per week.

When employed at 15 and under 15½ years of age, 18s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 15½ and under 16 years of age, 21s. per week.

When employed at 16 and under 16½ years of age, 23s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 16½ and under 17 years of age, 25s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 17 and under 17½ years of age, 28s. per week.

When employed at 17½ and under 18 years of age, 30s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 18 and under 18½ years of age, 35s. per week.

When employed at 18½ and under 19 years of age, 37s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 19 and under 19½ years of age, 41s. per week.

When employed at 19½ and under 20 years of age, 43s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 20 and under 20½ years of age, 46s. per week.

When employed at 20½ and under 21 years of age, 50s. per week.

When employed at 21 years and upwards 55s. per week.

B.—Female Workers

When employed under 14½ years of age, 12s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 14½ and under 15 years of age, 13s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 15 and under 15½ years of age, 14s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 15½ and under 16 years of age, 15s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 16 and under 16½ years of age, 17s. per week.

When employed at 16½ and under 17 years of age, 18s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 17 and under 17½ years of age, 20s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 17½ and under 18 years of age, 22s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 18 and under 18½ years of age, 27s. per week.

When employed at 18½ and under 19 years of age, 28s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 19 and under 19½ years of age, 29s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 19½ and under 20 years of age, 30s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 20 and under 20½ years of age, 31s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 20½ and under 21 years of age, 32s. 6d. per week.

When employed at 21 years and upwards, 35s. per week.

The above rates are for a week not exceeding 48 hours.

The above Trade Board also give similar notice that they propose to fix overtime rates under Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, to apply in respect of male and female workers as follows:—

Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

For the first two hours' overtime on any day, except Sundays and customary Public Holidays, the overtime rate shall be equivalent to time and a quarter, that is to say, one and a quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

For overtime after the first two hours on any day the overtime rate shall be equivalent to time and a half, that is to say, one and a half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

For all time worked on Sundays and customary and statutory Holidays the overtime rate shall be equivalent to double time, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.

In compliance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work per week to be 48.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposals to fix which may be lodged with them within two months from 12th May, 1919. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary of the Tobacco Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.
