Messina, Nov. 5.

THe Popes Gallies arrived here the last week from the Levant, and will sail again in few days for Civita Vecchia. The Danby Galley is just now arrived in 17 days from Smirna The Turkish Fleet, when he came away, was at Foggia; and 12 Algerine, and 3 Tripolin Men of War, were on their departure homeward.

Genoa, Nov. 13. They write from Thoulon, That the French have sent 6 Men of War to the Levant, to Convoy home their Merchant Ships.

Vienna, Nov. 23. The Count de Haysersheim, Com-military General, returned hither 150 days ago from Hun-gary, where he assisted at the Conferences held between the Imperial Officers and the Deputies of the States of that Kingdom, to regulate the Winter-quarters for the Forces, and the Provision that is to be made by the Coun-try for their subsistence during the Winter; all which has been adjusted with mutual Satisfaction. An Account has been sent hither of what Men are wanting to Recruit our Troops, and thereupon Orders are given for raising them with all Expedition; and for this Service the States of Austria are to send in a certain number. The Elector of Saxony purposes to return the next week to Dresden, and to be here again about Christmas; The design of re-inforcing his Troops in Hungary goes on; and we hear that Officers are dispatched to several parts of Germany, who are to be employes in the new Levies. The last Advices from the Turkish Frontiers say, That the Enemies Forces were all dispersed in their Winter-quarters, and that the Grand Vicer was gone back with the Sultan to Adrianople, hav-ing left strong Garrisons at Belgrade, Temeswar, Widin, and other Frontier Places. VVe have had Reports of General Veterani's being still alive, but several Persons who were taken Prisoner in the Action of Lagos, and have since been Released, or made their escape, assure the con-trary, and that being ready to expire when he fell into the Enemies Hands, they cut off his Head; of the truth of which no Body now makes any doubt. The Letters from Transylvania say, That the Repartition of the Winter-Quarters for the Imperial Troop in that Principality was sent by the States, and the several Regiments were march'd to those assigned them. The Hospodar of Mol-davia, upon some Complaints made against him, was lately sent for by the Grand Signior, and 'twas thought he would have been displaced; but he excus'd himself with a Sum of Money. The Marquis d'Armales, Ambassador from the King of Portugal, prepares a splendid Equipage, and in the mean time remains here incognito.

Stuttgart, Nov. 30. Prince Lewis of Baden is at present at Gunsburgs, from whence he will go shortly to Vienna. He has given Orders for streng hening the Garrisons of Eppingen and Sins-zheim to secure the Country against the Excursions of the Garrison of Phillipsburg; and for the same purpose, several Regiments are posted near the Neckar. The Imperial Officers in these Parts are making their Recruits, and the Commissaries provide Magazines here, at Heilbrun and Mainz. The French

make new Levies in Alsace and Lorraine, and their forcing Men into the Service, occasions great Complaints among the Inhabitants. They write from Straubourg, That the Marquis d'Uxelles and the Marquis de Chamilly, who Command the Forces in those Parts, are sent for to the French Court, to assist at a Council of War, about the Affairs of the War in Germany.

Cologne, December 2. The Elector of Cologne will be at Bonn the next Week, and intends to pass most of the Winter at Liege; his Officers are very careful to hinder the supplying the French with Horses out of these Territories.

Hamburg, Nov. 29. The English Convoy failed out of this River the 25th instant for England with a fair Wind, which changing the day fol-lowing to the Westward with a Fog, several small Vessels, who had left Company with the Convoy, returned back, whilst the rest proceeded on their Voyage. A Marriage being concluded between the Prince Royal of Denmark, and the Princess Louisa, youngest Daughter to the Duke of Meck-lenburg-Gustraw, lately deceased; Monsieur Plesse, Minister and Privy Counsellor to the King of Denmark, is sent to Gustraw, to conduct the Prin-cess to Copenhagen.

Paris, Dec. 2. The French King has made a Promotion of Marine Officers, having named 20 new Captains of Men of War, 11 of small Fri-gats, 7 of Fireships, with other Inferiour Officers; and the Discourse continues, that the Fleet at Thou-lon will be fitted out against the Spring. The Marechal de Lorge's Indisposition continuing, 'tis believed the Marechal de Choiseul will be appoint-ed to Command the French Army in Germany in his stead, with the assistance of the Marechal de Joyeuse; and no Body doubts but the Marechal de Villeroi will Command again in Flanders the next year. The States of Languedocque, who are at present assembled at Montpellier, have granted the French King a Free Gift of 3 Millions, and 1400 thousand Livres besides for the Poll Tax, and 1700 thousand Livres to be freed from the new Creation of Offices. They talk here of augmenting the number of the new Regiments to be raised by the French this Winter.

Brussels, Nov. 4. The Elector of Bavaria has given Orders for Recruiting the Cavalry in the Service of these Countries; and great Magazines are providing in our Frontier places. A French Party came two days ago to the Village of Scar-becke, about a League from hence, to raise Contribu-tions, but soon retired upon the notice they had that a Detachment of this Garrison was sent

They write from *Mons*, That the French Intendant had sent to the Magistrates of all the Bourgs and Villages in the Province of *Hainault*, to give in a List of all the Inhabitants, and their Conditions, in order to raise the Poll-Tax. The French make new Levies; and talk of being early in the Field the next year.

Hague, Dec. 6. N. S. The States of *Holland* and *West-Friseland* separated last Saturday, and are to meet again on the 14th of this month. The Count de *Cannitz* the Emperor's Minister is expected here in few days from *Brussels*. The Letters from *Denmark* give an account, That the English Convoy failed out of the *Sound* the 25th past for *Gottenburg*, where they would joyn with some other Men of War and Merchant Ships, and then proceed together for *England*.

Falmouth, November 25. Yesterday put to Sea the *Spanish Alliance* Packquet Boat, for the *Groyne*. And the same day came in two Dutch Privateers from Cruising on the *French Coast*.

Plymouth, November 26. The 24th instant came in the *Flying Hart*, and the *Striving of Jacob*, both belonging to *Copenhagen*, and bound home; as also, two *Suedish* Ships called the *Prince Charles*, and the *Nerva* from *Cadix*.

Yarmouth, November 29. The 27th came into our Road, a Merchant Ship, whereof *George Martins* is Master; and on the 28th, another, *Thomas Allefon* Master, both from *Russia*, and bound to *London*. The *Sweepstakes* and *Winchelsea* failed this Morning with divers light Colliers to the Northward.

Deal, November 29. Last Night came into the Downs the *Virgin's Prize*, with ten Sail of Coasters from the Westward, and one Merchant Ship laden with Sugars from *Antegoa*, who are all sailed for the River,
