Madrid, Nov. 24. The Council of State meets often to consider of the preparations to be made against the next Campagne, and has ordered Supplies of Money to be sent to Flanders, Gales, and Milan. Upon the death of the Marquis de Bourgomanero, Ambassador from the King of Spain at Vienna, three Persons are in Nomination to succeed him, and of that number is the Duke of Giovinazzo, at present Viceroy of Arragen, upon whom 'tis believed the Choice will fall. The Moors continue the Siege of Ceuta; On the 24th of the last Month they threw 12 Bombs into the Town, one of which fell in the House of the Marquis Valparaiso, the Governor, but did little damage; The Moors having made a Mine about the same time under the Bastion of St. Paul, the Besieged made a Countermine, which

had all the success they could desire, by ruining entirely the Enemy's Mine, and blowing up above 200 of their Men, six of which fell in one of the Outworks of the Town, and one of them alive, who has been since Examined about the Condition of the Moorish Forces; and he Reports, they are very weary of the Siege, which has cost them a great many Men, without making any considerable progress in it.

Turin, Nov. 25. The German Forces in Italy have taken their Winter Quarters in the Duchies of Mantua, Parma, and Modena; as they did the last year, and Prince Eugene of Savoy, who commands them, is gone to Vienna. The Duke of Savoy has ordered Magazines to be made at Asti and other places; and the Officers both in Piedmont and the Milanese use great diligence to recruit their Troops; They shake Levies likewise in the State of Milan to compleat the Italian Regiments in Catalonia.

Vienna, Nov. 30. The Elector of Saxony is still at this Court, and the time of his departure is not yet fixed; His Horse Guards are returned from Hungary, and he took a Review of them two days ago near this City, after which they continued their march homeward. By the Account that is come from the several Regiments in the Emperors Service, of the Recruits they want, it appears their number, is not so great as was at first imagin'd, and as it was the year before; The Officers are order'd to be diligent in raising them; and to have their Troops compleat by the beginning of March at farthest; And Directions are given to the Commissaries to provide Magazines in such places as may be most convenient for supplying the Imperial Forces when they take the field again. All is at present quiet on the Turkish Frontiers; They write from Adrianople, that they were surpris'd at the Grand Signiors returning so hastily from Hungary, and much sooner than is usual for the Turks to end the Campaign, who begin it late; The same Letters say likewise, that the Sultan intended to pass the Winter at Constantinople.

Frankfort, Dec. 7. The Count de Straatman, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, arrived here yesterday, in his way to the Hague, whither he will continue his Journey to morrow.

Hanover, Dec. 8. A Marriage being concluded between the Duke of Modena, and the Princess, Eldest Daughter of Fredericke late Duke of Hanover, the Ceremony of the Espousals was performed here this day, in the presence of their Electoral Highnesses of Hanover, the Dutchess Dowager of Hanover, and other Persons of Quality; and in few days the Princess will depart hence for Italy; The Marquis d'Este being sent with the Character of Ambassador from the Duke of Modena, to conduct her Highness thither.

Hamburg, Dec. 9. The Princess Louisa, Daughter to the late Duke of Mecklenburg Gustraw, who is married to the Prince Royal of Denmark, intended, according to the last Letters from Gustraw, to begin her Journey yesterday towards Denmark, where great preparations are made for her Reception. They write from Moscow of the 29th of October, that 36 Merchant Ships, of several Nations, who were lading in the Port of Archangle, were by a sudden and unexpected Frost frozen up, so that they must continue there the whole Winter.

Paris, Dec. 9. They talk here very much of augmenting their Forces against the next Summer, and divers Commissions are given out to new Colouels, of whom there are already above 50 said to be named; These are to form their Regiments of the Battalions and Independent Companies that now serve in Garisons; but the new Levies that are to supply their room are not yet begun, the Officers finding difficulty enough to get Men for their Recruits, and forcing most they list into the service, which occasions great Complaints. 'Tis said there will be suddenly a Promotion of 4 new Marshalls of France, and that Monsieur de Montcal and the Count d'Arvergne are to be of that number.
