Malaga, Nov. 15.
WE have an Account from *Barbary*. That the Moors being withdrawn from before *Malilla*, and the Spaniards believing they had quite quitted the Siege, a Party of the Garrison went out, but were attackt contrary to their expectation by a greater number who lay in Ambush, and were forced back to the Town, with the loss of 4 men, and several wounded. The last Advices from the Garrison of *Couta*, confirm their having destroyed a great number of the Moors by a Countermine, which had very much discouraged them. Last week 4 Spanish *Barco Longs* coming from *Cadiz*, laden with Merchant Goods for this place, were taken by two Algerine Satees.

Barcelona, Nov. 19. There are several French Privateers on this Coast. We hear from *Toulon*, That 6 of their Men of War are failed to the Levant to Convoy their Merchant Ships.

Cadiz, Nov. 20. The 7th instant, the *Carlisle*, *Dragon*, *Falmouth*, and *Adventure*, went out to Cruise. The 10th arrived 4 Ships from *Ostend*, having been 47 days in their passage from thence. The 11th arrived the *Endeavour*. Captain *White*, in 5 weeks from *Newfoundland*: He came out in Company of the *George*, the *Hopefull*, the *Munford*, and a small Irish *Pink*, but they were separated in bad Weather; In the Lat. of 42, the *Hopefull* was taken by a French Privateer of 30 Guns, but Captain *White*, who was with her, having only 14 Guns and 29 Men, made so good a defence, that after an Engagement of 9 or 10 hours, the Privateer left him. The 12th arrived here two other Ships from *Newfoundland*; and the *Two Brothers* from *Plymouth*. The *Romney* and *Portsmouth Galley* failed from hence to Cruise. The 14th, all the English Men of War in this Port put out their Flags and Penants, and discharged all their Cannon, with several Vollies of small Shot, to Celebrate His Majesty's Birth-Day; and in the Evening they made an Illumination with Lanthorns hung round the Ships; and Sir *Martin Beckman* prepared a very fine Firework. The 15th arrived here the *Cowentry*, Captain *Myster* in 20 days from *Plymouth*, with the *Entrian* for *Barcelona*; the *Rest for Seaveren*; The *Join* for *Alicant*; The *Two Brothers*, the *Loyal Merchant*, the *Tryal*, the *Andrew*, the *Anne* and *Elizabeth*, and the *Daniel* and *Elizabeth*, bound to this place: Another Merchant Ship Commanded by *Caleb Stocker* put into *Faro*; and *John Eliper* into *St. Lucar*, the rest of the Merchant Ships that came with Captain *Myster* from *Plymouth*, were bound to *Portugal* and the *West Indies*: Ever since the coming in of these Ships, we have had a strong Levant Wind, which we believe is the reason Sir *George Roke* is not yet arrived. The 16th came in Captain *Stokes* in the *Munford* from *Newfoundland*, bound to *Naples*, who had been several days beating it in the *Straits*, but could not get in, which made him put for this place. The same day arrived the *Buff* Galley in 12 days from *Leghorne*, with two Dutchingers, who failed again the next morning for *England*. And the 17th came to an Anchor off

this place about 10 fail of English, Dutch, and Hamburgers from *Malaga* and *Alicant*; and they all failed the 18th to the Northward. The *Cambridge* is gone out to Cruise; and the *Pembroke* will follow in few days.

Madrid, Nov. 30. The Conde of *Montezuma* is made Viceroy of *Mexico*. In *Catalonia* the Forces are in their Winter-quarters.

Genova, Nov. 27. Yesterday arrived here seven Spanish Gallies in 8 days from *Port Mahon*, being the Squadron Commanded by the Duke of *Turfs*.

Leghorne, Nov. 28. The two Gallies that lately went from hence to *Marseilles* are come back. The French have 6 Men of War abroad in these Seas, and several Privateers. A Vessel is come in here in 13 days from *Argiers*, and brings Advice, That 6 of their Cruisers were gone out, and their Ships that were in the Grand Signior's Service this Summer are returned from the *Levant*.

Turin, Nov. 27. There are quartered at *Pignorol* and in the Vallies of *Pragelas* and *Perouse*, 22 French Battalions; The rest of their Troops that served in *Piedmont* this Summer are gone back to *Dauphine*; and *Mareschal de Catinat* is returned to *Paris*. The Officers in the Service of the Duke of *Savoy* are very busy in making their Recruits.

Venice, Dec. 2. 'Tis said the Ambassadors of this State design to set out the next week for *England*. The Senate continues to give out Commissions for new Levies. By a Ship arrived here from *Constantinople*, whence she parted the 28th of *October*, we have received Letters dated at *Gallata* two days before, which give an account, That the Sultan arrived the 18th at *Adrianople*, and was expected in the beginning of this month at *Constantinople*, where he would make a publick Entry by way of Triumph, for his Victory over the German Forces Commanded by General *Veterani*, tho' the Turks themselves own it cost them very dear, having had above 12000 of their best Men killed and wounded in that Action. The French Ambassador, and Count *Teckely* with his Wife, were arrived at *Constantinople*. The Ottoman Fleet was returned to the *Dardanelli*; and 6 great Ships were Building for the Turks in the *Black Sea*, which they proposed to have ready for the Service of the next year.

Vienna, Dec. 3. The last Letters from *Hungary* tell us, That a Party of Turks had made an attempt upon a small place called *Hawcecke*, but were beaten off with the loss of above 100 of their men: And that the *Radians* and *Heydukes* have possessed themselves of several places near *Lugos* and *Cavanbes*, where they intend to keep Garrisons during the Winter for the security of their Frontiers. The Elector of *Saxony* continues still here. The Ambassador of *Portugal* has had a private Audience of the Emperor.

Frankfort, Dec. 11. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* has sent Orders to the German Troops quartered near the *Rhine*, to be in a readiness to march upon the first notice, to oppose the French, who seem to be preparing for an Excursion on this side the *Rhine*. The Parties of the Allies do very much disturb the Enemy at the same time.

Cologne, Dec. 13. The Elector of Cologne is arrived at *Ben*. The Palatin Troops are returned from the *Upper Rhine*.

Paris, Dec. 12. The Marechal de Catinat returned hither some days ago from *Piedmont*, and has since assisted at a great Council of War at *Verfailles*. They seem resolved at this Court to begin the Campaign very early in *Flanders* the next year, and for this purpose the augmentation of the Forces, and the Preparations for the Artillery, are very much hastened; and the Troops in *Poitou*, and on the Coast of *Britany*, are ordered to march to *Picardy*. The French King made yesterday a Promotion of several Officers of the Gallies. 'Tis said, the Fleet at *Thoulon* will be fitted out against the Spring. They write from *Brest*, That an attempt had been made by several Persons to rob the Warehouse where the Goods of the *East India* Prizes were laid up, but they were discovered, and most of them taken.

Brussels, Dec. 14. The motion of the French Troops, whereof you had account in my last, seems to have been only to cover their new Lines. The Marechal de Boufflers is gone from *Charleroy* to view the Garisons at *Mons*, *Dinant*, and *Philipville*. The French do Bake a great quantity of Bread in all their Frontier places. They have not yet begun to Work on their new Lines between the *Sambre* and the *Muse*, though they have Summoned in a great many Pioneers in order to it.

Hague, Dec. 16. N. S. The States of *Holland* met again yesterday. Don *Bernardo de Quiros*, the Spanish Envoy, was very ill last Wednesday, inasmuch that his Recovery was much doubted, but he is somewhat better since yesterday. The last Letters from *Flanders* say, That the marching of the French Troops between the *Sambre* and the *Muse*, is to cover their Pioneers that are to Work on their new Line from *Chasselez* to *Dinant*.

Newcastle, Dec. 6. On Tuesday last the *Windmill* and *Sweepstakes* came into our Harbour with about 30 sail of *Colliers*, and several Vessels laden with *Corn*.

Hull, Dec. 9. On Saturday last arrived here our *Rotterdam* Fleet, consisting of about 16 sail, under Convoy of 2 Dutch Men of War. The same Tide came in 3 Ships of this place, and 2 *Suedes* from *Narva*, and other places in the *Balticke*; and yesterday arrived here two Ships more of this place; who came from the *Sound* under the Convoy of His Majesty's Ships the *Lincoln*, *Prince George*, and the *Coronation*, in Company of about 25 sail bound to *London*.

Falmouth, Dec. 7. The 5th came in the *Elizabeth* of *London*, John Dudley Commander, with Wine and Fruit in 22 days from *Alicant*. The Spanish *Albion* is arrived here in 6 days from the *Groyne*.

Plimouth, Dec. 8. On the 4th came in the *Bonaventure* with Wine from *Vigo*; and this day sailed hence the *Roake* Frigate of *London*; and the *Amiable* of this place, both for *Leghorn*.

Weymouth, Dec. 7. Yesterday arrived in our Road the *Firebrand* Fireship, who came from *Jamaica* in Company of His Majesty's Ship the *Dunkirk*, but was separated in bad Weather.

Cowes, Dec. 7. The outward bound Ships sailed out of this Road yesterday with a fair Wind.

Farmouth, Dec. 9. On Friday last a Danish Hoy of 65 Tuns ran ashore at *Winterton*, 6 miles to the Northward of this place; but the Men and Goods are saved.

Plymouth, Dec. 10. Last night came to Spithead His Majesty's Ship the *Lion*, with divers outward bound Merchant Ships from the *Downes*. The

Experiment arrived at Spithead some days ago from *Jamaica*. His Majesty's Ship *Prince George* is arrived at Spithead with several Store-ships bound hither from *Gottenburg*: They left the *Lincoln* and *Coronation* with the other Merchant Ships under their Convoy, the 7th instant off *Laystall*.

Deal, Dec. 10. Yesterday a Vessel was driven ashore on the *Goodwin*, where she is lost, but the Men were saved by the Boats of one of the Men of War in the *Downes*; The said Vessel came from the Eastward, but we do not know whether she was English or Dutch; it blowing so hard at E. N. E. that no Boats can come ashore.

Whereas Roger Leavens, Iron-Monger, of London, returning with his Wife from *Croxbourne* in *Hertsfordshire*, was on the 25th of November last, between the hours of 4 and 5 in the Evening, set upon at Stone-Bridge, about half a Mile from *Showeditch*, by 7 Highwaymen, one of whom shot the said Roger Leavens, of which he immediately Died. For the better discovery of the said Offenders, and bringing them to Justice, His Majesty upon the Petition of the Widow of the Deceased, is Graciously Pleas'd to promise a Reward of the said Murder and Robbery, to any one of the said Highwaymen (except the Person that actually committed the said Barbarous Murder) who shall voluntarily come in and discover the Murderer, and the rest of the Offenders, or the greatest part of them, so that they may be Apprehended and Convicted of the same.
