And We do bereby Declare and Command. That from and after the Tirreenth Day of February not Clipped within the Ring, shall Pass in any Payment, except only to the Colletors and Receivers of Our Revenues and Taxes, or upon Loans or Payments into Our Exchequer; and that from and after the Said Second Day of March next, no such Shillings, Clipped within the Ring, shall Pass in any Payment whatsfeever.
