The Moors do still Besiege Ceura with 10000 Foot and 1000 Horse, and now and then throw some Bombs into the Town, but with little effect: Alcayde Alyben, who Com-mands their Army, has Built Houses and Hutts for the Soldiers, about two miles diftant from the place, being ordered by the Emperor, Muley Ismael, to continue the Siege (if he does

not take the place) as long as he lives.
