

# The London Gazette.

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Deal, Novemb. 17.

**E**ight or ten ships are lately returned from *Burden* much damaged by the late ill weather; we expect about 80 sail more, which came lately thence, which 'tis feared have had also their shares in the same Tempests. About ten Spanish ships, fifty Dutch, and several Hambourgers are now riding in the Downs.

*Plymouth, Nov. 17.* Here are now in this Port near 30 sail of Merchant ships outwards bound for *Spain, Portugal, the Canaries, and West-Indies*, expecting a fair wind.

*Lisbonne, Octob. 10.* All things continue in this Kingdom in a quiet and peaceable condition, the Prince *Don Pedro* having made a full inquiry into the actions of several of his Nobility, whom upon several informations and jealousies he had ordered to be secured, and finding them not guilty of those practices which were imputed to them, has been pleased to free them from their confinements, and restored them again to their liberties to the satisfaction of all people, and the better to settle the Kingdom in peace, and to preserve a right understanding with the States of the *United Provinces*, has dispatched away *Don Francisco de Melo*, under the character of his Ambassador to the said States, with an answer to all their demands, which 'tis hoped will be to their satisfaction and procure the re-establishment of their ancient friendship.

*Tangier, Octob. 17.* On the 29th of September, Sir *Thomas Allen* with the Squadron under his command, arrived before *Algier*, where he has made a new peace with the people, and obtained the restitution of those English to their liberty, which were formerly taken near the *Streights*; the Peace was solemnly signed and sealed on both sides the 6th of this instant *October*.

*Tangier, Octob. 18.* The great successes which *Taffaletta* has of late had in the last Summers Expedition, makes all the Neighbouring Cities stand upon their Guard; having by his Conquests taken on him not onely the Title of King, but Emperour of *Barbary*: which he has now settled under his obedience.

The Seas are of late well secured from the *Sally* Men of War by the diligence of Captain *Richard Roob*, who with the *Garland* and *Francis* Frigate cruising upon their Coasts, on the 25th of September last forced a Pink with 8 Guns and about 80 men, with her Prize, another Pink of 70 or 80 Tuns, belonging to *Dublin*, over the Barre of *Sally*, within the Command of the Castle; which fired many Guns for their rescue: but the Pinks striking several times on the sands, both of them sunk upon their entrance.

On the 27th of the same Moneth they put on shore about 4 leagues to the Southward of the Barre, a French Prize belonging to a revolted *Atgerin*, laden with Sugar, Silks, and Linnen, of about 120 Tuns, where she in little time perished.

The 28th they had view and gave chase to the revolted *Argerine*, being a Frigate of about 200 Tuns, 16 Guns, 6 Murderers, and 150 men; forcing the Pyrate on shore upon the Barre, where he immediately overset and split into pieces.

*Off. 5.* They put two Men of War on shore about 4 leagues to the Northward of *Sally*, the one judged to be a Caravel with 4 Guns, 4 Murderers, and about 80 men; the other a French built ship with 8 Guns and about the same number of men, which they seeing grounded, and the Sea to break over them, stood off to Sea; but about two

hours after standing in again to the same place, could not perceive any part of them above water: after this service, which has sufficiently cleared these Seas from these *Sally* Corsaires, the two Frigates are gone to *Cadix* to rest.

*Madrid, Nov. 4.* We have here many reports of the motions of *Don Juan*, but this onely seems assured, that he is gone from *Arragon* into the confines of *Catalonia*, but with what designs is not yet known, and hath dispatched away his Secretary to *Rome*. The Council Royal of *Castille* hath declared, that what his Highness hath hitherto done, amounts not to Treason against the Crown. Three thousand Horse were ordered to be quartered about *Madrid* and forces ordered to be raised, but 'tis said are principally intended to be sent for the security of our places in *Affrica* against the great power of *Taffeta*, who has appeared already before *Massagon* a Garrison belonging to the Portugueses.

The Marquis *de Castel Rodrigo* is safely arrived here by Post from *Flanders*.

*Venice, Novemb. 10.* On Wednesday Morning last arrived a ship from the Isle of *Corfu*, which in her way overtook his Excellency Signior *Alessandro Molino* Captain of the Fleet, on his return hither; but having received some damage in his ship by ill weather, was constrained to put into some Port by the way to rest; and may be suddenly expected here.

Letters from *Castile* of the 9th past inform us, that the Turks being very sensible of their great losses sustained in their assaults and several sallies made by the besieged; by which their numbers are much diminished; have forborn of late to make any farther attempts: which encouraging the Defendants, the General *St. Andre Mosbrun* with a choice party, made another brisk Sally upon them the 4th of *October* from the Fort *St. Andre*, beating the Turks out of their Line, and possessing themselves of a Battery; from whence they drew off a Mortar Piece, and were endeavouring also to carry off their Cannon; but the Turks coming on with all their force, prevented them; so that they were obliged to make their retreat into the Town. In this service Signior *Francisco Bartaglia* a Duke in *Candia*, and Brother to the General of that name, gave singular marks of his valour; but as he was letting his own hand to draw off one of the Turks Guns, was killed by a Musket shot; but his body was by the valour of Signior *Carlo Dona* and *Pietro Badoar* carried off; though with extraordinary opposition: besides this noble person we lost in this Sally about 80 men, several others hurt, and amongst them Signior *Matto Semitecola* received a Musket shot in his arm. A fugitive from the Enemies Camp has since informed that the Turks in that days service lost about 2000 men, and amongst them the Aga of the Janisaries, the Grand Vicers Lieutenant, and two other Officers of Note; and had above 1500 wounded, which had so discouraged them, that many of the Army were fled into the Mountains; and 300 Janisaries had seized upon some little Barks, and were put to sea, being quite tired out with the service. They farther tell us, that the Turkish Gallies had not landed above 1000 Janisaries for the reinforcement of their Army; which upon a strict enquiry consists not of 20000 men, any more which might be accounted about 7000 Pioneers.

*Brussels, Nov. 23.* On Friday last returned hither the Deputies sent from this City to the Constable of *Castille*, and with them the Count *de Salazar*, who the next day was present at the Assembly of the States of *Brabant*, where he moved for the payment of the summes demanded of them by the late Governour; and consented to by the said States, but

was not able to effect it; the Commons who are most concerned therein not concurring with them in the point, nor a they yet satisfied in the other point of quartering the Spanish Regiments as is desired by the Constable, alledging a former agreement with *Albuquerque*, the last Duke of *Evreux*, for an exemption upon the payment of 30 000 Forins: farther urging, that whensoever there should be a necessity of drawing Soldiers into the Town, the King is to be at the charge of building Huts, &c. to entertain them.

Several persons having been lately apprehended and imprisoned for robberies committed by night in the streets of this City, but since found to have been Soldiers; the Constable ordered the Auditors of the Army to take cognisance of them, & soon after much debate, and the interposal of the Constable by two of his Letters, the Magistrates at the last delivered them, desiring that justice might be done upon them according to their demerits.

The Plague being much decreased in this City, the Magistrate on Sunday last ordered solemn and publick thanks to be given to God in the great Church of this City.

The Abbot *Airoldi*, the Popes Internuncio is lately arrived here, but as yet appears not in publick.

From *Lille* we have advice, of the arrival there the 15th instant of our Commissioners for the debating the difference about the dependencies on the late French Conquests, but that none of the persons expected from *France* were yet arrived.

From *Franche Comte* they write, that 3 or 400 of the Townsmen of *Dole* are daily employed in cleansing the Ditches and repairing the Fortifications, the Bastions being not so entirely ruined, but that in little time they may be again repaired, as may also those at *Gray*, and that the Citadel at *Besançon* is much advanced.

Information being given, that some persons were privately raising men about this Town for the service of the Duke of *Lorraine*, Order was given to make search after a Colonel, who had undertaken the care of such levies, but he suspecting the event, concealed himselfe.

The Baron *de Limbes*, who commands our forces about *Ghent*, lately seized on a French Colonel in that City, who was privately lifting of men, and endeavouring to withdraw some of the Officers from the Spanish service.

*Paris*, Novemb. 24. From *Rochelle* we are informed of the arrival there of the *Sieur de Belle Isle*, lately sent thither with His Majesties Orders to the Count *d'Estrees* the Vice-Admiral, to put a stop to his design of sailing with five ships for *America*, till the arrival of the *Sieur Augeron* Commander of the French Colonie in the Isle of *Santo Domingo*; who is upon his way homewards to give His Majesty a full account of the state of affairs in those parts; to desire assistance to ballance the Spaniards, and to make some Proposals for removal of the Plantation, and settling them in such convenient place as may suit best with the advantage of Trade.

From *Auxonne* we are advertised, that about 4000 foot are ordered to be sent down the *Rhone* into *Languedoc*, and from thence to pass into *Roussillon* to secure the peace of those Countreys, which have been of late disquieted upon the account of the Gabels; with whom are to be joyned about 2000 more, which are now quartered in *Auvergne*; the whole Body to be commanded by the Count *de Gadagne*, and to be in readiness to secure the frontiers, if any troubles should arise in *Spain*. The Marquis *de Monselas* a *Catalunian* has likewise a Commission to raise a Regiment of 2000 foot for the same service. His Majesty intends to entertain in his service a Regiment of 2000 Germans, and another of Portuguezes; and upon the solicitations of the Popes Nuncio, has given his consent that the Clergy of *France* may upon their own expences raise and entertain 2000 men, which may be in readiness to march for the assistance of the Republick of *Venice* by the next Spring.

On Wednesday last the *Portugal* Resident in his private Audiences desired His Majesty in the Name of the Prince his Master, what he would please to take on him the Arbitra-

tion of the Differences between that Kingdom and States General of the *United Provinces*, touching the pretensions upon *Cochin* and *Conanor* in the *East-Indias*; and the sums of money which the said States demand upon the account of a former Treaty.

The Marquis *de Monterey* second Son to Don *Louis de Haro*, is lately passed by *incognito* from *Spain*, on his way to the *Netherlands*.

The Duke *d'Albret* Nephew to Monsieur *de Turenne* is lately nominated, and to be recommended to the Pope, to be promoted to the Dignity of Cardinal.

Upon complaint of several abuses and injustices in the Chambers of Edict, here and at *Rouen*, His Majesty hath by his Declaration suppressed them, which is accordingly to be verified on Monday next.

From *Arragon* we are told, that Don *Juan* has secured the Receipts of Publick Moneys for the payment of some forces which are raising there, and that he has caused the Citizens of *Saragossa* to put themselves into a posture of defence. From *Madrid* we are also advised, that the Queen has ordered most of the Publick Officers to repair to their respective Charges and Emploiments, and to secure the peace of the Kingdome; that some forces are raising about *Madrid*, but that the Queen hath sent the Admiral *de Castille*, the Chancellor of *Arragon*, and some other persons, to confer with Don *Juan*, and if possible to put an end to all Disputes.

On Saturday arrived here from *Madrid* Seignior *Guignozes*, Envoye Extraordinary from that Court, to complement their Most Christian Majesties upon the birth of the Duke *d'Anjou*; but has not as yet had his Audience. 'Tis said the Marquis *de Fuentes* is designed hither from the Queen Regent, and the Count *de Marach* from His Imperial Majesty, to assist in their Names at the Baptisme of the said Duke.

Yesterday and the day before His Majesty had a review of the Companies of his own Household, which were drawn out and encamped near the *Chasteau de Vincennes*, with above 70 new pieces of Cannon, which were frequently discharged.

*Bruges*, Nov. 25. Several vessels have by the late tempestuous weather been cast away upon the coasts: the Vice-Admiral of *Flanders*, being at the same time at sea not far from the coasts, was by a great wave washed from the Deck into the sea and drowned, his body was afterwards cast on shoar near *Ostend*, and afterwards entered with much solemnity.

*Portsmouth*, Nov. 18. The Dutch Fleet of Merchant ships of about 20 sail, continue still riding at *St. Ellens-road* expecting a favourable season to invite them out to sea.

*Tarmonth*, Nov. 18. Yesterday sailed out of this road three ships for the *Streights*, and one for *Cadix* with their lading of Lead and Herrings; this day sailed four others for *Bordeaux*, *Rochel* and *Nantz*, and this evening as many more for the *Streights*, their lading for the most part Herrings. Several other ships are gone off for *London*, many more are here lading for the *Streights*, and may in two or three days be ready to put to sea; about 12 ships more are at Anchor in our roads, three of them laden and outwards bound, the rest light ships intending for the Northwards.
