He has never been away from duty, and always set a splendid example to his men by his courage and cheerfulness under most trying conditions.

For skill, initiative and devotion to duty at Jisr Ed Damieh on 1st May, 1918. He was in charge of a flank gun, acting under his control and independently of the rest of his battery. He fought his gun most ably and gallantly, and undoubtedly checked the right flank of the enemy. The enemy got to within 500 yards of his gun before being driven back, and he was under shell, rifle and machine-gun fire during a great part of the time.
