Legborne, Jan. 30. N. S. The 27th Infant arrived here the Holder Capt. Snapes, and the Postillion Capt. Dent, both from London; and two Dutch Ships from Moscow. The 28th came in the Johanna Capt. Reed, from Newfoundland, and the Samuel Capt. Houghton, from London. They all came from Cadiz with the Turkey Convoy, from whom they parted to the Southward of Sardinia. The Mary Rose, Capt. Broom, who sailed hence the 17th to Cruise on the Coast of Provence, met a Ship bound from Marseilles to Genoa, called the St. Gis Batla, and after a short running Fight under French Colours, the Commander and Seamen got into their Boats, and carried away several Bales of fine Goods; and Capt. Broom took Possession of the Vessel, and brought her in here the 27th, being chiefly laden with Bourdeaux Tobacco, Almonds, Soap, &c. Capt. Broom did likewise chase on the Coast of Provence a Bark laden with Corn, whereupon the French left the Vessel, and Capt. Broom sent her hither. The Beske Gally, Capt. Scruiston, and the Danby Gally, Capt. Walton, sailed hence the 27th bound to London. The Great Prince of Tuscany is gone to Venice to pass the Carnival there: The Great Duke is come to Pisa, and intends to be here the next week with the Princess and Young Prince.

Venice, February 3. The Ambassadors of this State set out on Saturday last for England. The Great Prince of Tuscany is come hither with a numerous Attendance, and several Senators are appointed to wait on him during his stay; and 'tis thought some Affairs may be treated on this occasion between this Republick and the Great Duke. The Duke de Medina Celi, late Ambassador from the King of Spain at Rome, being made Viceroy of Naples, is going thither to take Possession of that Government.

Turin, Feb. 3. A Party of the Vaudois took some days ago from the French 120 Mules near Pignerol, after having surprized and routed their Convoy; in which occasion many of the Enemy were killed and wounded, with the loss only on our side of one Man killed and 5 wounded. But the Vaudois making haste in their return for fear of being intercepted by the Troops that might be sent from Pignerol, were forced to leave about 60 of the Mules behind them, the rest they brought away.

Vienna, Feb. 4. The last Letters from Hungary tell us the Imperialists go on with the new Fortifications of Tatal, without any disturbance from the Enemy: They are making likewise some new Works at Peter Waradin, for the greater Security of that Place. Magazines are laid up at Buda and other Places; and our Preparations are in such forwardness, that there is good reason to believe the Campaign
