

# The London Gazette.

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Cadix, January 23. N. S.

**O**N the 2d Instant sailed hence Eight English Men of War, the *Yarmouth* Capt. *Mudy*, the *Coventry* Capt. *Misters*, the *Glocester* Capt. *Polton*, the *Dragon* Capt. *Rigby*, the *Humber* Capt. *Clarke*, the *Medway* Capt. *Cleveland*, the *Rochester* Capt. *Kirton*, and the *Lime* Capt. *Boules*, with two Fire-Ships, and 25 Merchant Ships under their Convoy, bound to *Turkey* and other Ports in the *Mediterranean*. The 4th came in two Dutch Men of War from *Holland*. The 8th returned into this Port the *Lizard* Frigate with a small English Merchantman; The same day arrived here the *Hamborough* Convoy, being 12 Sail. The 11th sailed the *Carlisle*, the *Portsmouth* Galley, and the *Lizard*, with 11 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to the North; They are to touch at *Lisbon* for the Ships that are ready there; and the *Portsmouth* and *Lizard* after having executed their Orders, are to return hither. The 19th came in two English Merchantmen from *Barcelona*, and the 21th one from *Malaga*. This morning sailed hence the *Ofend* Convoy with several English and Dutch Merchant Ships, in all about 26 Sail, bound to the North. We have received advice, that the French are fitting out their Fleet at *Toulon*, and pretend to have it ready to sail towards the end of the next month. The English and Dutch Men of War in this Port are *Carceening*. The *Falmouth* and *Adventure* are come in from *Cruising*.

*Malaga*, Jan. 31. Yesterday came in here a Vessel from *Cadix*, the Master whereof says, one of the English Men of War had taken a French Merchant Man near the Bay of *Tetuan*, and carried her to *Cadix*. We hear a French Privateer has taken a Ship called the *Gianada*, Capt. *Keeble* Commander, bound hither from *Hamburgh*. The Town of *Ceuta* is still besieged, but the Moores have attempted nothing considerable against it of late. Here are several Merchant Ships ready to sail for *England* with the Convoy, which is ordered to touch here in its return from *Alicante*.

*Madrid*, Febr. 8. The King of *Spain* has named the Marquis d'*Astorgas* to be Viceroy of *Galicia*; Don *Alonso de Gusman* Viceroy of *Valencia*; The Duke de *Veraguas* Viceroy of *Sicily*; The Duke de *Medina Celi* Viceroy of *Naples*, and the Marquis de *Constance* Viceroy of *Navarre*. The Conde de *Altamira* is to go Ambassador to *Rome*; and the Marquis de *Casfel Rodrigo* to the Emperor. The Marquis de *Val Paraiso*, who is now Governor of *Ceuta*, is made General of *Oran*. The Marquis de *Gastanaga*, Viceroy of *Catalonia*, having lately caused one, against whom there was a very strong suspicion

of his being a French Spy, to be seized at *Barcelona*; The Inquisitor sent an Officer to the Prison to demand him, and upon refusal to deliver the Prisoner, Excommunicated the Keeper of the Prison, and refused to receive any Message from the Viceroy concerning him; This raised a great Tumult in the City, which was increased by the Account that was brought thither about the same time, that the Magistrate of a Village not far off having ordered a Soldier to be quartered in a Widows House, whose Husband many years before was a Servant to the Inquisition, she pleaded her Privilege, and complained to the Inquisitor, who to punish the pretended Violation of their Rights Excommunicated the whole Village; The Viceroy dispatched an Express hither to give the King an account of what had passed, and the Disorder it occasioned among the People; and his Catholick Majesty thereupon sent Orders to banish the Inquisitor from *Barcelona*, who was accordingly sent away to the Kingdom of *Valencia*: and the Priors of several of the Chiefest Convents were likewise ordered to retire from thence; and his Majesty has appointed a Council of 12 Persons, (two of which are of the Council of State, viz. the Marquis of *Manzana*, and the Conde d'*Aquilar*.) who are to Examine and Declare what is the Jurisdiction of the Tribunal of the Inquisition, and how far it extends. In the mean time the Magistrate of the Village and Keeper of the Prison continue Excommunicated; The Inquisition here would willingly take off the Excommunication, but that will not satisfy, unless they declare it void in its self as inflicted without sufficient ground, and till this be done the King refuses to see the Inquisitor General, who has demanded Audience several times. The King has given leave to Don *Manuel Arias*, President of *Castile*, to retire from that Station, and has conferred it on Don *Antonio Arguelles*, who was before one of that Council. The Conde de *Canette* is named to be Viceroy of *Peru*. The French are fitting out their Men of War at *Toulon*, and give out, they intend to repass the *Straits*. Several thousand Seamen are gone from their Western Ports towards *Toulon*.

*Corunna*, Febr. 18. N. S. The *Portland* Frigate, Capt. *Smith* Commander, took upon the Coast of *Ireland*, a French Ship laden with Fish from *Newfoundland*, and ordered his Prize for *England*, but by contrary Winds and bad Weather she was forced to put into this Port, where she arrived the 3d Instant. A small Vessel called the *Mary of Guernsey* was driven on this Coast by the late Storm, and lost, but most of her Men saved. They write from *Vigo* of the 18th of the last month, that the *Oxford* Frigate, Capt *Fogg* Commander, arrived there the 11th with 15 English Ships from *Newfoundland*, bound to *O-Porto* and *Bilboa*; The Convoy had received some damage in the late Storm, which having refitted, they sailed again the 4th Instant, but by contrary Winds were put back the 6th, and were the 12th still at *Vigo*.

**Kinsale, Febr. 11.** Yesterday arrived here His Majesty's Ship the *Penzance*, Capt. Hooper Commander, bound for *Dublin*; He came last from *Plymouth* with 7 or 8 Sail under his Convoy, but they were separated by bad Weather. His Majesty's Ship the *Hsrwich*, Capt. Douglas, is come in here, and has brought with her the *Mary of Glasgow* of 170 Tuns, laden with Salt, Wine, and Brandy from *France*. The *Elizabeth* of *Whitby* is arrived here from *Amsterdam*.

**Dublin, Febr. 14.** His Majesty's Ship the *Dover* Prize and the *Speedwell* are still in this Bay, but will sail with the first fair Wind for *Waterford*.

**Edinburgh, Febr. 11.** This day was read in Council His Majesty's Commission, constituting the Marquis of *Tweeddale* Lord Chancellor, the Duke of *Queensbury*, the Earl of *Argyle*, the Earl of *Annandale*, the Lord *Rath*, and Sir *John Maxwell* of *Pollock*, to be Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in this Kingdom.

**Falmouth, Febr. 15.** The Spanish Alliance who sailed hence the 2d Instant for the *Groyne*, arrived here yesterday with 4 Spanish Mails in 3 days from *Bevero*, 26 Leagues to the Westward of the *Groyne*.

**Plymouth, Febr. 16.** Capt. Jumper Commander of His Majesty's Ship the *Weymouth*, brought the 12th Instant into this Port a French Privateer of 18 Guns and 120 Men belonging to *St. Male*, which he took the day before about 17 Leagues West of *Scilly*, after a chase of several hours, during which the Privateer threw several of his Guns overboard; he can carry 22. Capt. Jumper brought in at the same time a pretended Spanish Vessel, having a French Pass on Board and bound to *France*. The 13th came in the *Owners-Goodwill* of *London* from *Limerick*; and the 14th the *Forefight* from *Ireland*. The *Weymouth* failed again yesterday.

**Portsmouth, Febr. 18.** The Merchant Ships bound to the *East* and *West-Indies* will sail this day with their Convoys from *Spithead*, the Wind at *E. S. E.*

**Dale, Febr. 18.** Several Dances and Suedes outward bound came into the *Downes* two days ago. Yesterday failed thence the Men of War with the outward bound Merchant Ships and Coasters, in all about 300 Sail, the Wind being then at *N. E.* but it coming about to the *S. S. W.* many of them are returned into the *Downes*. We have an account of the unfortunate loss of the *Aiborough* Ketch, which being off *Bright-Helmstone*, while the Commander was gone ashore in his Boat, took fire by some accident, and blew up on the 9th Instant; of the Men that were on Board, 15 were taken up alive.

**Whitehall, Febr. 19.** This Evening came in Two Mails from *Holland*, and brought the Advices which follow.

**Genua, Febr. 5.** N. S. On the 30th past arrived here a French Frigate in 5 days from *Toulon*, the Commander whereof says, the French Fleet will be ready to sail by the end of this month.

**Legborne, Febr. 6.** The *Mary-Rose*, Capt. Broom, is gone out again to Cruise; and the *Dolphin*, Capt. Alkin, failed hence the first of this month for *England*.

**Venice, Febr. 10.** The Senate continue their Preparations for reinforcing their Fleet and Army in the Levant; and have sent two Persons to *Genua* to buy Ships for the Service of this Republick.

**Turin, Febr. 10.** The Duke of *Saroy* to compleat the Recruiting of his Forces, has ordered every Village in *Piedmont* to furnish a certain number of Men: They are very busie in the Arsenal of this City to prepare the Train of Artillery for the next Campaigne.

**Vienna, Febr. 11.** The Weather is very mild here, without any Frost, which gives an opportunity of sending the necessary Supplies of Ammunition and Provisions by the *Danube* to *Hungary*, which has hardly been known before at this time of the year; for this purpose a great many Vessels are now lading here, and we hope to have every thing in a readiness for an early Campaigne. The Emperor has ordered a new Regiment of *Heydukes* to be raised under the Command of Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*; and has appointed the Regiment of Horse of *Commercy* to march to the *Rhine*. The Letters from *Hungary* bring nothing of moment.

**Francfort, Febr. 19.** Mr. *Stepney*, Envoy from the King of *England*, came hither yesterday, and after a few days stay in this City, will proceed to the Courts of several other Princes. The Emperor sends a Regiment of Foot to *Piedmont* in the place of that of *Commercy* which is come from thence.

**Hamburg, Febr. 7.** 'Tis believed the Matters in Difference between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holslein-Gottorp*, will be adjusted. One of the Flag Officers in the Service of the King of *Sweden* is coming hither to raise Seamen to be employed on the *Suedish* Men of War that are now fitting out.

**Paris, Feb. 20.** The *Marschal de Boufflers*, who was sent for to *Toulon*, arrived there the 14th, and having received his Instructions, is returned to *Flanders*, and several Troops that Wintered in *Languedoc* are Marching thither. The last Letters from *Toulon* say, the Fleet, consisting of about 55 Sail, will be ready to go to Sea by the end of this Month; That most of the Ships were already in the Road; and that *Monsieur de Chateau-rouart*, who commands them, was gone on Board. They write from *Brest*, That the Squadron commanded by *Monsieur Nesmond* was ready to sail: They say he is to join the Fleet from *Toulon*.

**Brussels, Febr. 22.** The Elector of *Bavaria* is perfectly recovered of his late Illness. We have an account from *Flanders*, that *Lieutenant-General Fagel* has taken the Castle of *Oost Dunkirk*, in which was a Garrison of 200 Men, and demolished it. A great quantity of Ammunition, Provision, and Forage, are sent to *Flanders* for the service of the *Allies*, which has given such a jealousy to the *French*, that they have reinforced their Garrisons on that side. A Party of 400 *French* Horse, each with a Foot Soldier behind him, came some days ago from *Dinant* into the Neighbourhood of *Namur*, but being discovered, retired without attempting any thing. The *French* Troops begin to Canton themselves between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*; and Two Battalions are sent from hence to *Canton* with some other of our Forces near *Namur*.

**Hague, Febr. 24.** N. S. The States of *Holland* will separate to-morrow, and intend at their next meeting to raise the 200th Penny a third time this Year. We have an account, That two Merchant Ships, one called the *Great Fishery*, of 30 Guns and 40 Men, bound to *Malaga*, and the other the *Golden Roti*, Captain *Willcutt*, of 40 Guns and 180 Men; bound to *Turkey*, failed out of the *Macle* on Saturday last, and the next day fell in with nine *French* Men of War and Privateers, come from *Dunkirk*; the biggest of which carried 54 Guns: The 2 Merchant Men fought with them above 2 hours, when the Ship called the *Fishery* was forced to yield, but Captain *Willcutt* got away, and returned on Monday into *Goree*. We are told, That the King of *Suedea* has declared he will assist the *Allies* according to his Treaties, so soon as the Difference between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holslein* is composed.
