## WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1906.

THE PROFITEERING ACT, 1919.
MOTOR SPIRIT.

Whereas under the powers conferred upon them by the provisions of the Profiteering Act, 1919, the Board of Trade, by Order dated the 2nd day of October, 1919, fixed maximum prices for the sale of Motor Spirit used or capable of being used for supplying motive power to vehicles whether taxed or not, both wholesale and retail, and such Order was entitled "The Profiteering Act, 1919, Maximum Prices Order (No. 2)":

And whereas the Board of Trade think fit to revoke such Order:

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade do hereby order that the Profiteering Act, 1919, Maximum Prices Order (No. 2) shall as and from the date of the signing hereof be revoked, but without prejudice to any liability incurred under or any penalty, forfeiture or punishment incurred in respect of any offence committed against such Order.
