Davis, Cardeil Goodman. Higgens, Pendergroß alias Prendergras, Trevor, Sir George Maxwell, bailit. Brycsiv,

Bryceiv, Tievor, Sir George Maxwell, Durance a Fleining, Christopher Knightley, Lieutenant King, Holmes, Sir William Ferkins, Rookwood, wherever they may be found, and to carry them before thenext Justice of Peace, or Chief Magistis, who is hereby Required to Commit them to the next Goal, there to cemain until they be thence Delivered by due Confe of Law. And this Majesty does kereby require the said suffice, or other Magistrice, immediately to give notice thereof to Itim, or this Privy Council. And for the Prevention of the zoing of the said Persons, or of any other the land, or other Parts beyond the Seas, His Majesty Legitire and Command all His Officers of the Customs, ines Require and Commandad His Officers of the Cultims, and other His Officers and Subjects of and in the respective and other His Officers and Subjects of and in the respective Pores and Maritime Towns and Places, within His Kingdom of Englan!, Dominion of Wales, and Townof Burwick upon Twe-d, That they and every of them in their respective Stations and Places be Careful and Deligent in the Examination of all Persons who shall Pass or endeavour to Pass beyond the Seas; and that they do not permit any Person what server to go into Ireland, or other Places beyond the Seas without a Pass under His Majelfy's Royal Sign Manual, until further Order. And if they shall discover the said Persons above-named, or either of them, then to cause them to be Apprehended and Seewed, and to give Notice as aforefuld. And His Majesty duth hereby Publish the [aid Perfois above-namina, or either of them, then to cause them to be Apprehended and Secured, and to give Notice as associated. And His Majesty doth hereby Publish and Declare, to all Persons who shall conceal the Persons above-named, or any of them, or be Aiding and Assisting in the Concealing of them, or surface in their Escape, that they shall be proceeded against so such their Office, with the unnost Severity according to Law. And for the Encountagement of all Persons to be Diligent and Careful in endeavouring to Discover and Apprehend the said Persons, We do hereby surface processes that whosever shall Discover and Apprehend the Persons above named, or any of them, and shall bring them before some Justice of Peace, or Chief Mazistrate, as a sort said, shall have and Receive, as a Reward, the Sam of One Thousand Pounds, the Lords Commissioner, as a Reward, the Sam of One Thousand Pounds, the Persons above-named shall Discover and Apprehend any of their Acompletes, so as they may be brought to Justice, His Majesty alus hereby Declare.
