weing tellrous to give all due Encouragement to all such Scamen, as have not been in Our Service the last year, or being in the Service have been regularly Discharged therefrom, and also to able bodied Landmen, who shall Admintarily Enter themselves in Our Service, and remain on Board any of Our Ships of Mar in Our Royal Paby, have thought sit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; And the do hereby Promise and Occlare, That all Seamen and able bodied Landmen, who shall after the Date of this Our Royal Proclamation, and before the Seventeenth Day of this Pour Royal Proclamation, and before the Seventeenth Day of this Pour Holuntarily Enter themselves and Remain on Board any of Our Ships of Mar, or Fire Ships, or on any Press Aestels, or Tembers belonging to Our Fleet, at Poulmouth, the Downs, Buoy of the Nore, and in the River of Thames and Medway,
