And for Prevention of the going of the said Persons, or of any other, into Ireland, or other Parts beyond the Seas, We do Require and Command allow Officers of the Customs, and other Our Officers and Subjects of, and in the respective Ports and Maritime Towns, and Places within Our Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, and Tewn of Birwick upon Inced, That they, and every of them, in their respective Stations and Places, be Careful and Diligent in the Examination of all Persons who shall Pass, or endeavour to Pass, beyond the Seas; and that every of them, in their respective Stations and Places, be Careful and Diligent in the Examination of all Persons Who static pass, or endeavour to Pass, beyond the Seas; and that they do not permit any Person what sever to go into Ireland, on other Places beyond the Seas, without a Pass under Our Royal Sign Manual, until surther Order. And if they shall Discover the said Persons above-named, or any of them, then to easile them to be Apprehended and Secured, and to give Notice, as aforesaid. And We do hereby Publish and Deciare, That who sover shall Conceal the Persons above-named, or any of them, or be Asing and Assisting in the Concealing of them, or Furthering their Escape, shall be, for such their Offence, Proceeded against with the utmost Sewerity according to Law. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be Disigent and Careful in endeavouring to Discover and Apprehend the said Persons, We do hereby further Declare, That who sever shall Discover and Apprehend the said Persons, we do hereby further Declare, That who were mentioned in Our said sorner Proclamation, or any of them, and shall bring them before some suffice of Peace, or Chief Magistrate, as aforesaid, shall have and Receive, as a Reward, the sum of Cine thousand Pounds promised by Our said Proclamation; which said Sum of One thousand Pounds, the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury are hereby Required and Directed to Pay accordingly.
