

captured over 100, including three officers. Later, he succeeded in capturing two machine guns, allowing the advance to proceed.

442117 Pte. J. L. Lawrence, Fort Garry Hse.

On October 9th, 1918, when the right troop charged at Bois-du-Mont-aux-Villes, they were fired on by an enemy machine gun. This man at once ordered his section to follow him and charged the machine gun, killing two enemy and capturing six, also the gun. He showed conspicuous gallantry and initiative.

704040 L./Sjt. A. Linn, 102nd Bn., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and determination during the fighting on the west bank of the Canal du Nord on 3rd September, 1918. Throughout the advance he showed marked courage and coolness under fire. He carried out a daring reconnaissance, during which he was badly wounded, but brought back concise and valuable information to his company headquarters.

115905 Sjt. A. McAlister, Fort Garry Hse.

On October 9th and night of 9th/10th, 1918, about Maurois, he was commanding a troop in support during the attack on the Bois-du-Mont-Aux-Villes Wood. He handled his troop splendidly, and on his own initiative charged a party of the enemy, cutting them off and capturing eleven prisoners and two machine guns.

92892 Sjt. D. R. McDougall, 2nd Bde., Can. G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On the 21st September, 1918, while the battery was being heavily shelled, a lorry, which was being loaded with ammunition, was struck by a shell and set on fire. He promptly rallied the men and succeeded in extinguishing the fire. He succeeded in putting out six different fires, thus saving many lives and much ammunition.

129801 Sjt. A. McDonald, 72nd Bn., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the operations near Dury, 1st-3rd September, 1918. In a counter-attack against the enemy he handled a section with fine dash and judgment, materially assisting in the capture of 100 prisoners. His work throughout was outstanding, and he set a very fine example of courage and determination to his men.

246309 Pte. J. G. McElligott, 38th Bn., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack south of Dury on 2nd September, 1918. With two men he rushed a machine-gun post that was holding up the advance, killing some of the crew and capturing a number of prisoners, amongst whom were four officers. Though subjected to intense bombardment he held on to this position, enabling the company to advance further, with slight losses.

739135 Cpl. E. E. McGill, 1st Can. M.M.G. Bde.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty on 2nd September, 1918, near Villers-Cagnicourt. In command of an armoured car, he several times pierced the enemy's lines, inflicting losses and bringing back information. He brought his car into action against a field battery, and caused losses to both men and horses, but his car was eventually hit and the crew killed. This N.C.O., though wounded, insisted on reporting to the group commander before being evacuated.

452571 C./S./M. T. D. McKenzie, 58th Bn., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and marked initiative at Bois du Sart and Boiry on 27th and 28th August, 1918. When his company was held up by machine-gun fire, he collected scattered men, and leading them forward, captured the guns and forty prisoners. Later, he rallied a platoon that was in disorder, having lost its officer and senior N.C.O., and used two enemy machine guns in thwarting an enemy counter-attack.

222410 Sjt. P. McLean, 85th Bn., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack on the Drocourt-Queant line on 2nd September, 1918. With two others he rushed an enemy machine-gun post. He killed the No. 1 on the gun with a bomb, and succeeded, with his party, in capturing the whole garrison, consisting of thirty. He showed splendid courage and determination.

690908 Sjt. A. J. McMillan, 116th Bn., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty near the village of Boiry on 27th and 28th August, 1918. There was a considerable gap between his battalion and the next unit, and he collected the scattered men of two platoons and established them in the centre of the gap, defending it during the day. At dusk he was counter-attacked and completely surrounded, but refused to surrender, and kept the enemy at bay.

292406 Pte. R. Maguire, M.M., 46th Bn., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Dury on 2nd September, 1918. Throughout the action he showed marked courage and resourcefulness in attending the wounded under very heavy fire. On one occasion, when the advance was checked by a machine-gun nest, he rescued two men, dressed their wounds, and assisted them to shell-holes before returning.

42718 B./S./M. S. Majury, M.M., 11th Bty., 3rd Bde., Can. G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative during the operations on 2nd September, 1918, on the Drocourt-Queant line, when his battery was in close support of the infantry. The battery captain and one of the section commanders having become casualties, this W.O. took charge of the battery. When enemy fire became intense he brought up the gun teams and successfully moved the guns to a position 200 yards in rear.
