Cadix, March 29. Sir George Rooke with the Fleet of English and Dutch Men of War, and Merchant Ships bound to England, sailed from hence the 23d Instant with a fair Wind at N. E. but yesterday he returned into this Bay with all the Ships under his command, being put back by the bad Weather and contrary Winds; None of the Ships have suffered any damage, and they will sail again with the first opportunity.

Madrid, April 4. We had yesterday an account from Ca-dix, that Sir George Rooke was forced back into that Port by contrary Winds, after having been's days at Sea; but that he intended to make use of the first opportunity of Weather to sail again. We have heard nothing of the French Fleet fince their being seen the 25th past off Barcelona; and in all probability they have selt the effects of the late Storms. Orders are sent to Gadiz to fit out the Spanish Armada with all expedition. In Catalonia, they are presented for the Camputers.

Corunna, April 10. This day arrived in this Port a Ship called the Sansa Theresa of Newport, who came from Oslend with 6 Ships more bound to Cadiz, and the 31th past, about 25 Leagues from Cape Finister, met with 6 French Men of War, two of them being 3 Deckt Ships, and the others from 50 to 70 Guns, This Ship made her escape, as did likewise another Flyboat called the Joseph, but the rest were taken. Here is also arrived an Ostend man of War of 24 Guns, in 2 days from that place, having on board the Count of Bergeycke, who is gone to Madrid.
