Turin, March 30. N. S.

**T**HE Governor of Milan arrived here on Tuesday last; and has had several Conferences with the Duke of Savoy; and intends in a day or two to return to Milan. The Imperial and Spanish Forces, as well as the Troops in the Service of his Royal Highness, are all ordered to be in a readiness to march.

Venice, April 6. They write from Dalmatia, that the Morlaques have lately made an Incursion into the Turkish Dominions, and brought back a great Booty. The Convoy that is preparing here for the Levant will be ready to sail in ten days or a fortnight, with which a great Supply of Stores and Ammunition will be sent thither for the use of our Fleet and Army. They are building here 6 new Men of War.

Vienna, April 7. Prince Lewis of Baden intends to leave this place about the 15th of this month, and to return to Germany, to command the Confederate Army on the Rhine. An Envoy is arrived here from the Czár of Moscow, and from hence he will go to Venice. The Advices from Turkey say, they make great preparations there for the next Campaign; and that the Sultan will be at Belgrade by the beginning of June. The Preparations on our side are at the same time carried on with great vigor, and the Imperial Army will not only be much stronger, but likewise earlier in the Field this year than they were the last. Their Rendezvous is appointed near Esbeck about the 20th of the next month. There is a Treaty on foot between the Emperor and the Elector Palatin, concerning the Forces which his Electoral Highness will employ on the Rhine this Summer in conjunction with those of the other Allies.

Frankfort, April 15. The Forces of the Allies quartered in these parts, are preparing to take the Field; 'tis said, their general Rendezvous will be near Eppingen. The Regiments newly raised by the Landgrave of Hesse are compleat, and are marching towards the Rhine.

Bamberg, April 17. The Affairs between Denmark and Rostein are at a stand. The Danes and Swedes have finished their Levy of Seamen in this Town; The former have raised about 800, and the latter 300; and Monsieur Allenburg has raised a Levée of 150 for the Emperor's Service on the Danube.

Paris, April 16. The Letters from Toulon of the 8th Instant say, a small Vessel was come in there from the French Fleet, which brought an account, that they had met with very bad Weather, and had received much damage, and that two of the great Ships were so disabled, that they were forced to bear away the 26th past for Roses to refit, which having done as well as they could there they sailed again the 28th to rejoin the Fleet, which had Anchored several days near a small Island called Sa's at the Mouth of the River Ebro in Catalonia, to repair the damage they had suffered, and to take in Refreshments. We are told, that Orders are sent to Toulon, to fit out 5 Ships from 40 to 60 Guns, which, 'tis believed, are designed for Cruisers. The Letters from Calais of the 13th left the Inhabitants there in a great alarm, occasioned by the Enemies having

begun to Bombard that place; and they were removing all their best Goods; We have yet no account of the damage they have sustained. The late K. James continues at Bologna, but the Forces that were designed for the Invasion are gone back to their Quarters.

Brussels, April 18. The Earl of Athlone is gone to Maestricht to take a Review of the Cavalry there, and in other Garisons on that side. All the Officers both of Horse and Foot in the Service of the Allies are ordered to be in a readiness to march by Sunday next. The Advices from the Frontiers say, that Monsieur de Pauban is expected at Dinant in few days, to visit that and the other French Frontier Garisons. The French have marked out a Camp near Dinant; and the Mareschal de Boufflers is to command the French Army, which is to act near the Meuse, and the Mareschal de Villeroy that in Flanders. The Allies are forming a Camp near Ghent; and they will have an Army likewise near the Meuse.

Hague, April 20. N. S. The States of Holland and West-Friseland met on Wednesday last, and intend to separate again to morrow till after the Holidays. The Count de Nassau Sarbrucke is to command the Forces of this State this Summer as Velt-Mareschal General; and the Duke of Holstein-Ploen will continue at his Government of Maestricht. The Letters from Ostend of the 18th give an account, that the English when they Bombarded Calais on Friday last, threw 300 Bombs into the Town, which destroyed about 60 Houses, and divers Transport Vessels.

Plimouth, April 12. The 10th failed hence a Suedes Man of War, with two Merchant Ships, to the Eastward. The same day came in the Swan of Rotterdam from Bristol. And yesterday failed out of this Port the Bear of Norway, bound home.

Portsmouth, April 14. Yesterday came to Spithead His Majesty's Ship the Norwich from the Downes, having under her Convoy divers outward bound Merchant Ships, and about 50 Sail of small Vessels and Coasters.

London, April 14. The Ambassadors of the Republick of Venice arrived here on Saturday last; and will in few days make their publick Entry.
