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Turin, April 6. N. S.

THE Governor of Milan went from hence the 2d Instant, having adjusted Matters with the Duke of Savoy in relation to the next Campaign; which will be opened by the Forces of the Allies in these parts in the beginning of the next month, and the Troops have Orders to be in a readiness accordingly. The French seem very apprehensive that Pignerol will be besieged this Summer, and take great care to reinforce that Garrison, and to supply them with all things necessary for their Defence.

Vienna, April 7. Our Preparations for the next Campaign in Hungary are in very good forwardness; and the Imperial Regiments who have had their Winter Quarters on this side Buda, will now in few days begin their march to the Rendezvous which is appointed near Pest, that from thence they may proceed in a Body to join the rest of the Forces, who are to assemble near Esseck. The Elector of Saxony is expected here in the beginning of the next month: General Caprara is to command the Emperor's Army under him; and the Count de Heysterbeim and Count Guido of Staremberg are to be the first General of the Horse, and the other of the Foot. Prince Lewis of Baden intends to go hence the next week to his House in Bohemia, and after a stay of a few days there, to repair to his Command on the Rhine.

Oxon, April 16. The Thanksgiving for His Majesty's happy Deliverance from the Horrid Assassination designed against His Majesty's Sacred Person, and these Nations from the Dismal Effects of so Barbarous a design, was this day celebrated in the University here, with all the Solemnity and Magnificence that could be to Demonstrate our Duty and Affections to His Majesty. In the morning the Service was performed at St. Mary's Church with very fine Musick, and Excellent Anthems composed for this purpose. At Two of the Clock in the Afternoon was held an extraordinary Act in the Theater, which was extremely thronged, and Declamations and Speeches were made in Prose and Verse on Themes chosen suitable to this Signal Occasion, which Exercises were begun by the Orator of the University, and continued by several young Noblemen and Gentlemen for above 4 hours, with great pleasure of the Audience, and much to the Honour of the University; The whole was concluded with the usual Expressions of Joy, by Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and Entertainment of Strangers in the Colledges, with redoubled Wishes of Long Life and Prosperity to His Majesty and his Government.

Yarmouth, April 17. Yesterday being the Day of Publick Thanksgiving for His Majesty's Preservation from the late Horrid Conspiracy, was observed here with great Devotion and Loyalty. In the morning the Magistrates went to Church in a B-dy, and in their Formalitys, two Companies of Lieutenant Gen. Bellasis's Regiment quartered here, making a Lane for them; after Sermon they walked in the same order with the Town Musick before them to the Church Walls, where the great Guns were discharged, as likewise from the Milford Man of War then in the Road, and the Fort at the Havens mouth; after which they went to the House of one of the Bayliffs, and Drank His Majesty's Health. In the afternoon the Magistrates, with the Chief of the Inhabitants, went again to Church, and afterwards were Entertained by one of the Bayliffs at his House, before which the Soldiers were drawn up, and a Barril of Beer provided for them. At night all the Houses in the Town, and particularly those on the Key, were illuminated, and a great number of Tar Barrils fixed upon Poles, and filled with all sorts of Combustible Staff, for about half a mile in length, were fired, and abundance of Lanterns were hung upon the Tackling of the Ships, lying near the Key, which made a very noble and agreeable Prospect: The Soldiers giving several Volleys, and the Bells Ringing all the time.

Whitehall, April 16. This day being appointed for a General and Solemn Thanking to Almighty God for his Great Goodness and Mercy, in Discovering and Delivering His Majesty from the late Horrid and Barbarous Conspiracy of Pupils and other Traiterous Persons so Assassinate

and Murder His Majesty's Sacred Person, and from an Invasion intended by the French upon this Kingdom, whereby not only the Destruction of His Majesty's Royal Person was plotted and intended, but the total subversion of the Government, and of the Religion, Laws, and Liberties of this Kingdom: The same was Religiously and Devourly observed in the Cities of London and Westminster, with great Marks of Loyalty and Affection to His Majesty and his Government; and at night there were Illuminations, Bonfires, and other publick Rejoycings suitable to the Occasion.

Whitehall, April 17. His Majesty has been pleased to Constitute the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Stamford Lord Lieutenant of the County of Devon; and the Right Honourable Charles Bodvile Earl of Radnor, Lord Lieutenant of the County of Cornwall.

Whitehall, April 18. His Majesty has been pleased to cause a Proclamation to be published, bearing date the 17th of this month, by which His Majesty commands All the Collectors and Receivers of his Revenues and Taxes, that they shall receive in payment all Clipped Moneys being Sterling Silver, or being Silver Money of a Course Alloy than the Standart, from all or any of His Majesty's Subjects who shall tender the same for any of His Majesty's Taxes or Revenues at any time before the 4th day of May next, according to the Directions of an Act of this present Parliament, intituled, An Act for Remedying the ill State of the Coyn, and another Act of this present Parliament, intituled, An Act for Granting to His Majesty an Ayd of 4 s. in the Pound for one year for carrying on the War against France; and particularly, that the Collectors of the said Ayd of 4 s. in the Pound do accept and receive 2, 3, or 4 Quarterly Payments of the said Ayd from any of His Majesty's Subjects that shall tender the same in such Clipped Money as aforesaid, at any time before the said 4th day of May next, according to the Directions of the last mentioned Act; and the Receivers General, Head Collectors, and other Receivers of His Majesty's Revenues and Taxes, and their respective Deputies, are required to receive such Clipped Moneys from the Collectors, and that they do seal the same up in a Bag, and keep it apart from other Moneys, in such manner that they may be able when they bring any such Money to be payed into the Exchequer, to make Oath, that it is the very same Money which they received from the Col. of His Majesty's Taxes or Revenues, and the Commissioners, Receivers General, and Collectors, are required to use their utmost diligence and speed in Raising, Collecting, and Paying all such Clipped Moneys into the Exchequer; and all the Receivers and Collectors of His Majesty's Revenues and Taxes are strictly charged to accept in Payment such Clipped Moneys, and the several Quarterly Payments of the said 4 s. Ayd, according to the Directions of the said several Acts of Parliament, and that they do yield entire Obedience to the said Acts in every other Matter and thing therein contained relating to the Receipt of such Clipped Money, or otherwise, as they tender His Majesty's high Displeasure, and upon pain of such Punishments as may by Law be inflicted upon all such as shall refuse or neglect to observe and perform what by the said Acts, or either of them, they are required and enjoined to do.

Kensington, Apr. 19. The Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, attended by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of the Navy, the Commissioners of the Victualling, the Commissioners of the Sick and Wounded and Exchange of Prisoners, and the Officers of the High Court of Admiralty, presented to His Majesty the Association signed by themselves, their Secretaries and Clerks, together with the Officers of His Majesty's Yards, and Out Ports, and other their Inferior Officers.

The Association of the High Sheriff, several of the Deputy Lieutenants, and Justices of the Peace, most of the Gentlemen, Freeholders, and other Principal Inhabitants of the County of Oxon, being subscribed by about 7000 Hands, was presented to His Majesty by Thomas Went Esq; and several other Gentlemen of the said County, being introduced by his Grace the Duke of Sorebury.
