

for service in an emergency and to receive the following gratuities on retirement:—

After 10 years from date of first commission	£1,200
After 13 years from date of first commission	£1,600
After 16 years from date of first commission	£2,000
After 18 years from date of first commission	£2,400

Note.—The retired pay of Lieutenant-Commanders who have retired voluntarily in the past under the age of 40 to be re-assessed in accordance with the scale in (1) above, if more advantageous to an Officer than the scale on which his retired pay was awarded, in cases where an Officer has qualified for re-assessment of retired pay.

VI. Mates and Mates (E) and Officers promoted therefrom.

Mates and Mates (E) to receive retired pay of £120, with an addition of £10 for each year's service in the rank, or retired pay on the Warrant Officers' scale if more advantageous, all service as Mate or Mate (E) being reckoned as service as a Warrant Officer.

Lieutenants and Lieutenant-Commanders.—If invalided under 40 years of age to receive retired pay of £120, with an addition of £10 for each year's service as Mate, Lieutenant and Lieutenant-Commander, or retired pay on the Warrant Officers' scale if more advantageous, all service in Commissioned ranks being reckoned as service as Warrant Officer. The minimum for a Lieutenant-Commander to be £200.

VII. Officers on the Supplementary List of Lieutenant-Commanders and Lieutenants.

An Officer retired at his own request over the age of 40, or compulsorily at the age of 45, or for physical unfitness due to causes beyond his own control, to be entitled to receive a gratuity, or retired pay on the following scale:—

(a) If with less than 10 years' full pay service (including service in the Royal Navy as Royal Naval Reserve Officer, Acting Sub-Lieutenant and Sub-Lieutenant, Royal Navy).	} A gratuity of six calendar months' full pay for each complete year of such service.
(b) If with 10 years' full pay service as above	
If with 11 years' service as above, or if 41 years of age with 10 years' service as above	£225 per annum.
If with 12 years' service as above, or if 42 years of age with 10 years' service as above	£240 ,,
If with 13 years' service as above	£255 ,,

If with 13 years' service as above, or if 43 years of age with 10 years' service as above £270 per annum.

If with 14 years' service as above, or if 44 years of age with 10 years' service as above £285 ,,

If with 15 years' service as above, or if 45 years of age with 10 years' service as above £300 per annum maximum.

VIII. Commanders, Lieutenant-Commanders and Lieutenants of all Branches promoted from Commissioned Warrant Officer or Warrant Officer for long and zealous service.

Commander £400 a year.

Lieutenant-Commander—

£350	£300	£10 for each year's service in rank.

Lieutenant—

Max.	Min.	Addition.
£300	£250	£6 for each year's service in rank up to 7 years; £8 for 8th year.

Note.—The age limit of 55, entitling an officer to the minimum pension, to be abolished.

IX. Commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers of all Branches.

Commissioned Warrant Officer—

Warrant Officer—

£180	£120	£5 for each year's service in the rank.

X. Schoolmasters.—To be pensioned according to their relative ranks on the scales for Commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers, except that Officers entered in the relative rank of Warrant Officer to be pensioned on the following special scale, if invalided:—

To be granted a Service Pension of £10 for each complete year's service up to 10 years. On attaining 10 years' seniority to be pensioned on the scales for commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers.

XI. Coast Guard Officers.
