- 3. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—
 - (a) That they are unmarried or widows;
 - (b) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.

No person will be eligible who is not a natural-born British subject, and the daughter of a father who is a natural-born British subject.

- 4. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz.:—
 - 1. English Composition (including Spelling).
 - ing).
 2. Handwriting.
 - 3. Précis-writing.
 - 4. Arithmetic.
 - 5. General Knowledge.

5. Candidates must obtain such an aggregate of marks in the examination as a whole as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a sufficiently high standard of

general proficiency.

If the number of Candidates who attain the necessary aggregate of marks is insufficient to fill the vacancies, the candidates next in order on the list will be summoned for interview by a Selection Board, the number of such candidates to be determined by the Commissioners; and appointments may be offered to those who appear to the Selection Board to be best qualified.

The Selection Board will give marked preference to candidates who have had adequate experience in administrative, higher clerical, or

responsible executive work.

6. Warning.—Any attempt on the part of a candidate to enlist support for her application through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, will disqualify her for appointment.

 Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil

Service Commissioners.

10. A Fee of 5s. will be required from every candidate upon application; and a further Fee of 10s. from every candidate attending the

Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice, that a Competitive Examination will be held in London, Birmingham, Bristol, Cardiff, Leeds, Manchester, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Nottingham, Plymouth, Southampton, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, and Glasgow, under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 6th July, 1920.

Appointments will be offered to not fewer than 50 of the Candidates highest on the list, provided they obtain the necessary aggregate of marks and are duly qualified in other respects.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 6th May, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
