Breda, June 4. N.S.

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HE King left Loo on Sunday, and came hither in the Evening; To morrow his Majesty goes hence to Merchem, a mile on this fide Answerp, where the Elector of Bavaria and the Prince de Vaudemont will meet His Majesty, and the day following his Majesty intends to be with the Army near Ghent. The other Army Commanded by the Elector of Bavaria is removed from Park-Abbey to Neer Ische, about 4 miles beyond Louvain, and within one of Waure. The French continue in the Camps mentioned in our last, viz. the Mareschal de Villeroy at Mechlen near Dernse, and the Mareschal de Boufflers near Florus.

The Forces commanded by the Landtgrave of Hesse Cassest, with those of Lunenburg and Duke of Hossein, that were first designed for the Middle Rhine, are now marching toward the Meuse.

Hamburgh, June 1. Two thousand Foot and Five hundred Dragoons of the Troops of the Duke of Holstein, are on their march towards the Meuse, having passed the Elbe two days ago. We have Advice from the Coast of Norway, that Du Bart

is Cruizing in those Parts.

Francfort, May 31. The Army of the Alliest commanded by Prince Lewis of Baden, continues near Eppingen, the Head Quarters being at Step-pach, which is a very advantageous Camp, and the rest of the Confederate Forces that are yet behind, are marching with all diligence to joyn them. The French Army, under the Mareschal de Choiseul, is marched from Bruchsal to Sickingen, where he still was by our last Advice, the rwo Armies not being above 2 or 3 Leagues asunder. Lieutenant-General Thungen returning some days ago in his Coach from the Confederate Army towards Mentz, was furprifed by a Party of 15 French, and carried Prifoner to Philipf-burgh. The Forces of Helie and Lunenburgh continue their march towards the Rhine.

Floma, May 23. The Elector of Saxony having taken his leave of the Emperor at Laxemberg, fet out vesterday Morning for Hingary, to Command the imperial Army, which Rendezvous near Peft, and where all the Troops are to be together by the 25th of this Month. The Additional Forces, which his Electoral Highness sends to Hungary, are coming by Water from Linez; and we hear that his Electoral Highness will likewise send a Body of 3000 Men to the Rhine. The Emperor has given the Government of Traufilvania to Ge-

neral Rabutir.

Turin, May 22. The French Troops began to Enter into the Plains the 20th instant, and Encamped at la Veillane, where they continue to af-femble, and some of their Parties are come farther. The Duke of Savoy has fent two Battalions to reinforce the Garison of Coni; 9 Battalions are Posted on the Glacis of the Counterscarp of this City; and the rest of our Forces, that lay about Carignan, have passed the Po here and at Moncalier, and are now Encamped between this Place and Moncalier: They are very fine Troops, and in a good Condition; and his Royal Highness and the General Officers have chosen this Camp, as the most convenient, to oppose the Enemy's Designs.

Venice, May 18. The Great Convoy bound

to the Levant, is stopt by contrary Winds in Istria: Several other Ships are sitting out, which will be ready to follow in a short time, with fur-

ther Supplies for the Fleet and Army.

Leghorne, May 14. We have advice that two French Men of War are failed from Thoulen to Convoy feveral French Merchant Ships to the Levant. Capt. Broom has lately taken on the Coast of Barbary a French Ship laden with Allom, Wool, and Hides from Constantinople, and sent her to Port Farino; and Capt. Pickering has taken a French Bark laden with Corn.

Paris, June 1. The Letters from Brest fay, they are difarming a third part of the Fleet, and that the rest continued under the command of Mon-sieur Chasteaurenaut; That the English and Dutch Fleet had appeared off Brest, which greatly allarm'd all that Coast. In Society that were on board the French Men of War, are come afhore, and formed in two Battalions, and the Mareschal d'Estree had posted several Troops of the Marine, to defend the Coasts of Brittany against the Infults of the Enemy. They write from Pignerol of the 25th instant, That the March chal de Catinat had been encamped several days at La Veillane, and when these Letters came away, was marching towards Turin. We are told from Catalonia, that the Duke de Vendosme assembled the French Forces near Gironne, and the Spanish Forces commanded by the Landtgrave of Darm-flat were at Ostalricke. The news of the Death of the Quren Mother of Spain is confirmed.

Hague, Jone 5. The last Letters from Germany say, The French Army under the Command of the Mareschal de Choiseul was marched back several Miles from Prince Lewis's Camp; and 'twas reported they intended to fend a Detachment to-The Pentionary Heinfins, with wards Flanders. feveral Deputies of the States, went hence some days ago to wait upon his Majesty at Breda.
