This day came in the Mail from Holland of Tuesday last, and brought the Advices which follow.

Camp at Mariekirke near Ghent, June 11. N.S.

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THE 8th and 9th His Majesty continued to review the Forces, which were never more compleat nor in better order than now. Two Batallions of the English Guards and one of Dutch marched towards Brabant, as did also the Horse Granadiers. Yesterday His Majesty was picased to make a Promotion of divers General Officers. And this Morning His Majesty went from hence towards the Army in Brabant, which lies near Ische extending as far as Waure, where His Majesty will be to morrow, being this night at Malines. His Majesty has left the Army here under the Command of the Prince de Vaudement. The French Army Commanded by the Mareschal de Villeroy and Boussers continue in their Camps near Deynse, and the Pieton; from whence there is the greatest Desertion of their men that has been known.

Hambourg, June 8. The Troops of Holstein continue their march towards the Meuse.

Cologne, June 8. The Forces of Hesse and Lunenburgh intend to pass the Rhine at Coblentz, those of Munster will pass the River Lippe the 10th, and the Rhine the 14th at Keysermaert, and so continue their march towards the Meuse.

Francfort, June 6. The Confederate Army is still encamped near Eppingen; But the French are removed towards Episheim and Munisheim, and have sent a Detachment of Horse towards Wiseloch. Prince Lewis has ordered a great many Boats to be got together on the Neckar and the Rhine, to be made use of in making of Bridges, which makes us think he will undertake some enterprise so soon as the rest of the Confederate Forces have joyned him.

Vienna, May 30. The Elector of Saxony arrived the 24th of this Month

at Buda, and the day following took a review of the Imperial Forces encamped near that place, who in a day or two would march towards Effecke. They write from Transilvania, that a great Body of Tartars was drawn together at Jassi, in order to conduct a Convoy of Provisions to Caminies.

Turin, May 28. The French Army commanded by the Mareichal de Catinat continues at Veillane, their Artillery not being yet come up, by reason the late rains have made the ways very bad, and besides, there is a great scarcity of Provisions in their Camp. The Forces of the Allies remain in their Camp near Moncalier; The Duke of Savoy, and the. other General Officers go every day to view the new Lines, and other Works that are a making about this City, and omit nothing that may conduce to the There come a fecurity of this City. great many Deserters from the French Army.

Paris, June 8. The Letters from Piemont of the 30th of the last Month say, the French Army was then still encamped at Veillane, expecting their Artillery The French Galleys are fitting out at. Marseilles, and 8 Ships of War at Toulon.

Hague, June 12. N.S. We hear that de Bart who was lately seen off the Vlie, is gone more Northward. Letters from Madrid of the 24th of May say, they are string out 10 Spanish men of War, at Cadis and that the Flota would depart in July for New-Spain.
