Beveral fhips are lately come in here from Tarmouth, bound for France; feveral other fhips from Plymouth and other parts outwards bound; allo one Hollander from Burdeaux with, Wines, and one fhip of Apfom from St Lucars.

The 27th inflant came in the William and Anne of Southhampton with Wines from Burdeaux, being part of a Fleet of near 50 fail, which were leparated by ftorm; but 'tis hoped may be fafely put into leveral Ports.

ped may be fafely put into feveral Ports. Plymouth, Decemb. 1. Yesterday arrived here a ship of this place from the Canaries, and another from Burdeaux. A new ship of this place, which a week since sailed hences tending for the West-Indies, was by the V olence of the late ill weather forced back and cast away, to the Westward of the Ramme Head, about two leagues distant from this Port, and lost, together with all her men.

Malaga, Novem. 13. From Tangier we are informed, That the Frovidence Firefhip being fent from Algier by Sir Thomas Allen with the Releafed Prifoners, was the Ninth inftant, by fome Misfortune, put afhoare in the Bay near Old Tangier, where the Captain defpairing to get her off, and to prevent her from falling into the hands of the Moores, was forced to fet fi.e to her, himfelf, with the Meo, efcaping in their B.at.

Vienna, Novemb. 25. The Turkish Chizus some dayes fince left this City, and returned again towards Hungary. Another Minister is lately arrived from Jurkey, but has not as yet been admitted to his Audience from the Emperor, or the Count de Montecuculi, his President of the Council of Yesterday the Envoye from the Cham of Tartary, War. was with the usual Ceremonies conducted to his Audience, wherein he prefented his Imperial Majefly with his Credential letters, and an excellent Horse as a present from the Cham his Master. He kas fince entred upon his business, which tends principally to follicite the Emperor not to favour the Great Duke of Molcovy in his defigns of obtaining the fucceffion to the Crown of Poland for the young Prince his fon, but rather to imploy his Arms to oppole film ; affirming that the Grand Seignior has lo far interefied himself in this affair, that he intends to imploy fome Minifter to the Diet held at Warfam, to declare openly against the defigns of the Mofcovite, and to oppole, what may be, the Election of the young Prince.

The fame Envoye gives out that the Grand Segnior having dtawn a great part of his forces out of Hungary, for the carrying on G bis wars against the Venetians, is refolved to supply their room with a Body of Tartars, which shall be placed in all the Frontier Garrisons.

Harabourghs Novemb. 30. The Marriage of the Prince of Hannouer with the Princels Benedicte Palatin, has been celebrated at Hannoster with extraordinary folemnity

From Copenhaghen we are told, that the French have made a Propolal to the King of Denmark for the prohibiting the Importation of all Spanish Salt into his Kingdome, and f ruhe introducing a Trade of French Salt in the room of it; and that a French Company might be establish there for the management of the Trade. His Majelty communicated these Propoluls to the Colledge of Commerce, who upon confideration thereof, returned their Answers to this effect: That the Spanish Salt was necessary for them, for the support of their t islaing, no other Sat being at le fo well to prelerve their Fish; and that they could not at all approve of the Eftablifhment of a French Company, which for feveral reasons they judged prejudicial to their Commerce.

Major General Eillert the Governour of Cronenbourgh, having paffed fome dayes at Copenhaghen, is returned again to his Government, much facisfied with his Reception in that Court; His Majefty at his departure prefenting him with his Picture fet with Diamonds, to a confiderable value, in acknowledgment of his paft fervices.

Count Oxensterne, lately dispatcht from the King of Swedeland for Portugal, is passed by Gottembourgb, on his Voyage. The Count Coningsmark is also on his way from swedeland to the Palatinate, where he designs to be inftrumental in the composure of the Differences between the Prince Elector Palatine and the Duke of Lorrain: but in case the Treasy between them should not meet with that hapy iffue, then to affish the said Prince Palatine with his Regiment and some other forces which Le intends to draw into that fervice.

Dantzick, Dec. 1. From Warfaw we are told, that the Convocation there had spent much time in petty and particular disputes, so that 'twas believed, the short time allo ted for their Seffion would pals over without any confiderable effect. The Generality feem to fear left the Great Sums of money which 'is reported are remitted from France, may have too great an influence upon the Election, which had occasioned the propolal of two points : First, that no pe fon should have a Voice in the laid Election, unless he would first rake an Oath, that he had not directly, or indirectly taken or received any bribes for his endeavour to promote any perfon to the Succeffion, and that he would according to his conficience vote only for the interest of the publick. And fecondly, that no Candidate should be nominated out of France. Which proposals, though meeting with strong oppoficion and long debates, 'twas yet/believed would be at the last agreed to, if they were not already passed. They farther tell us, that the young Prince of Mofcovy and Prince of Lorrain leemed at prefent to have the greatest interest amongst the Electors; but the latter to ftand in greateft probability to fucceed.

We hear nothing as yet of the relolution of the Conftable to relide here. The Commonalty fland firm in their opinion, that they cannot without loss of Priviledges, comply with the Governous defines in quartering the Spanish foldiers; but 'tis hoped that fome expedient may be yet found due for the fatisfaction of all parties.

On Wednelday laft arrived here Don Francesco Marcos de Velasco from his Employment as Envoye from the Constable into England; from whence he returned much latisfied with the honours he received in that Court, and on Thursday departed hence for Malines, to give an account of his Voyage withe Constable.

Voyage to the Conflable. Count salazer has lare'y received Orders' from the Queen Regent, to attend her Commands in the Court at Madrid, which he at prefent defires to be exculed from, upon the account of a debt of 300 thousand Florins, in which he stands. engaged in these Provinces, which will for fome time oblige him to continue here.

Paris, Decemb 8. His Majefty has lately ordered his Camp-Masters to disband Ten thousand foot out of his Army: the method intended to be used, is to dismise 20 men out of each Company, which from 200 is to be reduced to 80 men.

Y Here is faid to be lately arrived a Secretary belonging to Prince Charles of Lorraine, to negotiate for the advance of the interest of that Prince in the Election to the Crown of Poland.

From Swifferland we are advertifed, that the Diet is broken up at Bade, without coming to any full refolution about the protection of those Cities which defined it, or of Franche Conte. They gave a full hearing to Colonel Molendin, and the Captains Erlach and Stopas, and at the last acquity led them; and 'tis faid have given the Franche Companies time till March for their return home into Swifferland from the French lervice.

• From the Ille of Cerigo we are informed, that the French fuccors are in 9 thips at ived at Candia but were much in commoded in their pathage 5 their Bisket being conrupted, and a general want of water much afflicting them for 8 dayes; and that the Orand Matter of Mattba, to make reparation for the default of his Gallier, has lent 50 choice Knights and 306 Foot to the afflictance of the Venetians for the prefervation of Candia.

• Purits, Der Mb. 12. From Kachele we have advice of the atrival there of the Marquiß de Grancey, with the Squadron under in Command from Lisbonne, where he affirms he has left all things in a quiet poflure, and the Portugais in a resolution to define His Most Christian Majesties-Mediation for the ending of all Disputes between that Kingdom and the States of the United Provinces;

His Majefty has refolved upon the suppression of the Chamber of Justice, ordering that all Affairs and Caules. left depending fir that Court be committed to the hearing and determination of the Masters of Requests, 'Tis faid the Affembly of the States of Lang. cdos which was wont to be Annually called, shall for the nuture be Triennial, and that his Majeffywill eafe that Province from the charge of feveral Governments of Towns which are nor upon the Frontiers, and of feveral Officers in the Province which are judged unnecessary.

His Majefty has lately conferred the Charge of Chief Prefident of the Parliament of Normandy, upon the Sicur Pelos his Intendent of Juffice in Guienne; and as a Mark of his favour, has ordered him a Pref nt of 50 thouland Livres, towards the payment of as many Crowns, with which this Office flands charged by His Majefty, to be paid to the Sieur de Ris, Son to the late Prefi ent of that Parliament, in acknowledgment of his good Setvices. His Majefty has moreover beflowed the Biftoprick of Vatres upon a Erother of the faid Sieur Pelos, a Religious Perfon of the Charsroux.

By a Courrier lately arrived from Perpignan, 'tisconfidently faid, their Majefties have received Letters from Don *Juan* of Auftria, defiting the honour of their protection against that Spanish Minister, who he layes endeavors his oppression.

Hague, Dec. 11. This Week the Spanish Ambasiladout by a Memorial gave in his Complaints to the States against the severity used by the Bailiss of Viushing to two Chaplains belonging to the Spanish Fleet, which had been taken and supplied, and since imprisoned, and denied their Habetty, though much prefied by the Spanish Admiral 3 defiring their Orders for their speedy enlargement. He has also by another Memorial complained of the proceedings of the Zealanders, in putting an Embargo upon several Spanish ships, at the instance of some of their Merchanus, which the States have committed to the Examination of some of their Depaties.

The States of Holland have upon the defires of the other United Provinces communicated to them their late refolution for the disbanding of 27 Companies, and have given in a Lift of the faid Companies to the Council of State, which is to confider and examine the Conveniencies of this Reformetiona

We luddenly expect here the Heer Adelaer, the King of Denmark's Admiral, who is defigned hither to agree upon the Measures and bulk of such thips as shall be permitted to trade in the Northern Seas.

The States General having in April last undertaken the Tutilage of the young Counts, Sons to the late Count Edfard of Friefland, have nominated the Heer Dornum for their Substitute, to take the care of them.

Portfmouth, Decomb. 3. The late ill weather has forced into Spitthead three Veffels of North-Tarmouth bound homewards from Burdsaux. Several Wrecks have been feen on the back-fide of the Ille of Wight; where was run on fhore in the late rempetituous weather a Swede from Stockholme latden with Tarre, Deals, and other Commodities; the meli sicaped failert land, but the fhip was broken to pieces; and most of the Goods loft, thoogh all possible diligence has bren yield to preferve them.
