Madrid, May 23. N.S.

HE Queen Mother of Spain died this day feven-night, about half an hour path 11 at night; the lay in State 4 days, and on Sunday last at 9 at night the Copy was cruised to the Elegrid; with the Solemnity usually Practifed here on such Occasions. write from Cadiz of the 15th inftant, That the 8th ar rived there the Marine Galley from Legherne, who failed a ain the 12th with the Spy Brigantine, 5 Fluffingers, and Leveral other Veffelsbound home. The 9th arrived there the Prijetla and the Union in two days from Libbin; bound to Turk y. The 14th came in the Rochester from Libbin, as also the Komney, Adventure, Falmouth and Camerbury, who had been Cruting. The 13th initiant parted from Malaga 6 Sareas with 2000 Soldiers for Caraimia, convoyed by two Spanish Galleys. We are told, That there has larely been a Cessain of Arms between the Girison of Cruta and the Moors; and that Alcayd Ally who commands the latter, had sent some of his Chief Offices to the Spanish General, to let him know, That he had Orders from Maly Image! to raise the Siege, if the Spaniards desired it, upon these Conditions, That they should deliver up all the Moors they had taken; should give diverspices of fixe Scarlet Clotch, to Clothe Kuly Image!'s Guard of Negroes, as also a Sum of Money; should demosish the Place of Arms, and for the future thould not take any Vessels going into the River of Tetuan, nor burn any the Prijetla and the Union in two days from Lubon, any Vessels going into the River of Tetuan, nor burn any Fields of Corn belonging to the Moors: Which were rejected by the Spamaras. Corunna, June 9. The 1st instant arrived here an Ostend Man of War of 40 Guns, called the Queen of Spain, who in her Voyagehither took a French Frize of 150 Tuns and 8 Guns, laden with Salt for Newfoundland: They write from Madrid. That the Governor of Cadiz, Don Francisco de Velasco is to succeed the Marquis de Gastanago in the Government of Catalonia.

Genous, May 27. The 23d instant was brought in here by a Baik belonging to Final a French Ship bound from Marsalles to Leghorne, worth about 12000 Dollars. 'Tis said the Emperor has sent to this Republick to borrow a Sum of Money of them at Interest, in the same manner as

Penice, June 1. The last Letters from the Morea; dated the 2d of the last Month, say, The Captain General would sail with the Fleet in sew days; He had received advice, that the Ottoman Fleet would consist of 20 Ships of War or Sultanes, 12 Ships of Barbary; and 24 Galleys. Another Convoy is preparing here for the Lewant.

Tarin, June 2. We have advice that the French Army which has been Encamped several days near Veillane marched this Morning; but instead of advancing rowards this Place, they turned to the Right towards Rivalia and Orbassan, in order to approach towards Pignerol. Our Orbaffan, in o der to approach towards Pignerol. Our Army continues near Moncalier to observe the Enemy. Mareschal Catinat has, as we are told, sent to the Duke of Sawey to let him know, that he would hang all the Pealants that were taken bearing Arms, and his Royal Highness has answered him, It he did hang any of his Subjects whom he thought fit to Emp'oy in his Service, he would hang all the French Soldiers he took. The Country recople in the mean time are abroad in several small Bands, and do greatly annow the Enemy.

A great many Desertes come daily from the French Army Aimv.

Paris, June 11. An Express arrived here 2 days ago from Catalonia, being dispatched by the Duke de Vendosm, to acquaint the French King, That he passed the River Ter on the 30th of the iast month with the Forces under his Command, and understanding that the Prince of Hesse Darmstadt, with the Spanish Cavalry, reckoned to be about 4500, was separated from the Foot, being advanced to a place called Massaner, while the Infrantry lay Encamp'd near Offalrick, he made a long march the 31th, and came to a place called Villoui: The day following the Spanish Cavalry endeavoured to rejoin their Foot, but before they could do it, they were attack d by the Count de Coigny Lieutenant General, and the Count de Mailly Mareschal de Camp, who were advanced with the foremost of our Troops; The Duke de Vendosme came up to support them, with the Counts de Dusson and Longueval Lieute. nant Generals, and 600 Carabiniers, 4 Regiments of Dragoons and 1000 Grenadiers, and the Count de Chazeron and the Count de Quincon, both Lieurenant Generals, were ordered to follow with the rest of the Horse and Foot. The Spanish Horse charged our Troops very bravely, and maintained the Fight some time, but were at last forced to retire; the Foot continuing in their Intrenchments, and having no part in the Action. We reckon of the Enemy about 1000 Men are killed or taken, and the Count de Tilly Commissary General of the Walloon Cavalry, is among the latter; We lost about 300, of which number are fmail Bands, and do greatly annoy the Enemy.

Vienna, June 2. We do not yet know, whether the Inspectal Captains, Lieutenants and Cornets; and perall corces that by our last Letters were Engineed near the Count de Maily is wounded: After the Astion

was over, the Count de Longueval went to view the Enemy's Camp near Offalrick, and was killed by a Cannon Bullet; and the Duke de Vendosme Encamped at Rie A. Arcmes, where he was still on the 2d instant. This is the Account the French give of this Action, but they that are acquainted with their way of relating every thing to their own Advantage, will think it necessary to expect to hear what they fay of it on the other side. The Letters from Piedmont tell us, That the Mare-Ichal de Catinat would march the 2d instant from Veillane, and encamp at Orbassan, about 5 miles from Turin They write from Provence, that 2 French Frigat commanded by the Sieur de Grenonville was taken by 4 Spanish Galleys on the Coast of Naples. 'Tis reported that the Marquis de Nefmond is returned to Breft.

From His Majefty's Camp at Basse Waure, June 14. The King came hither the 12th in the Evening from Malines, being met on theway by the Elector of Bavaria, and General of the General Officers; His Majesty's Quarters are at Basse Wines on the River Dile, 4 miles from Louvain. Yesterday His Majesty viewed the disposition of the Camp, and the Our-guards on the other tide of the River, and this Morning His Majesty began to review the Forces, which will take up two or three days. This day the Troops of English Guards, and 14-Batallions from Namur, joyned the Army. Mareschal de Bouffers continues near Pieton, and has for-tified his Camp, his head Quarters are at Gosse-liers. The Troops of Hesse were to pass the Rhine this day between Coblentz and Bon. One of our Parties met with one of the Enemies of 25 Men, of whom they killed 5 and took 7, the rest escasing.

Hagne, June 15. N. S. Several English Yachts with their Convoy arrived yesterday in the Maese, having on Board the Venetian Amballadors, and several Persons of Quality and Officers that are going to the Army in Flanders. The Prince de Vaudenone was by our last Letters still Encamped near Ghine; and the Mareschal de Villeroy near Deynse.

Falmouth, June 6. On the 4th instant failed hence Capt. Fordker in the Refolution with three Men of War more, having under their Convoy the Noffan from India, several Ships from Ber-Jador, and other Merchant Men bound to the Enstwerd. A Fleet of Ships has for some days been seen off the Lizard, supposed to be Suedis and Danes bound home from St. Ubes.

Plimouth, June 7. Yesterday came into this Port His Majesty's Ships Edgar, Medway, and a Fire-

Thip, from the Fleet, which is in Torbay.

Tarmouth, Jane 8. Reer Admiral Benhow, who failed from hence on Thursday last with the Fleet of Merchant Ships bound to Holland, came yesterday to an Anchor again on the back of our -Sands.
