“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

**W**HEREAS by section 16 of the Pluralities Act, 1878, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other
