Cadix, May 16. N. S.

Orders are come from Madrid to hasten the fitting out the Flota designed for the West-Indies, which may be ready to sail against the beginning of July; with this Opportunity the Count de Montezuma and the Count de Cagnette intend to go thither, the first being made Viceroy of Mexico, and the last of Peru. They are likewise fitting out here 6 Spanish Men of War under the command of the Count de Franques. The Alcayde who commands the Moores employed in the Siege of Centa, proposed not long ago to the Spanish Governor several Conditions, which being granted he offered to raise the Siege, but being very extravagant they were immediately rejected; and we hear, that he has since made new Overtures for a Cessation of Arms, which the Spaniards have likewise refused; being persuaded, that the scarcity there is of Provisions and Ammunition in the Moorish Camp, and the Excessive Heats that are coming on, will quickly oblige them to retire; To which the Allarm occasioned by the Advice of the March of the Algerines against Maly Ismael, will in all probability very much contribute, seeing he will stand in need of all his Forces to oppose them.

Vienna, June 2. The Elector of Saxony has sent an Officer hither, to acquaint the Emperor with the good condition he found his Forces in, which assembled near Buda; That the Train of Artillery had joined them; and that he had held a Council of War, where it was resolved to march with the Army towards Essecke, and afterwards to proceed according to the Advices they should receive of the Enemies Motions; The freshest Accounts they had received concerning them, were, that two Batta-lions were come with their Troops into the Neighbourhood of Bilgrade; That the Sultan was expected with his Army on the Danube about the middle of this month; and that the general Opinion is, he will pass that River as he did the last year, and march towards Transylvania. General Ruben, who went hence the last week to command the Emperor's Army on that side, has Orders to encamp with the Imperial Forces on the Frontiers of that Country, and to be in a readiness to advance and join our main Army if it be thought necessary; In the mean time Prince Charles of Paudmont has taken care to secure the Passes of that Principality, and has seized several Spies who were sent by the Turks to get Intelligence of the posture the Imperial Forces are in.

Hamburg, June 11. The Negotiation for Adjusting the Differences between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holstein-Gottorp, goes on but slowly, for hitherto the Preliminaries are not adjusted. The King of Denmark demands, that the 500 Swedish Soldiers, now in the Service of the Duke of Holstein, be sent away before they enter upon other Matters; and that Lubbeck be the Place of Treaty; The first the Duke of Holstein

absolutely refuses; and the latter several of the Princes who have sent Ministers to this Meeting, are not willing to consent to. The last Letters from Warsaw say, the King of Poland was very much indisposed, which considering his great Age, put the Nobility upon making Interests and Parties in relation to a future Election. A Body of the Troops of that Kingdom was marched to hinder the Tartars from putting a Supply of Provisions into Caminiec as they seem'd to intend.

Dublin, June 10. The Letters from Gallway give an account, that on the 3d Instant the Dover and Shoreham came into that Road for the security of the two East-India Ships that are there, and that the day following Capt. Crosse, Commander of the Dover, sent out the Shoreham to cruise off that Harbour, till she meets with the Weymouth, Harwich, or Crown, who are cruising on that Coast, with Orders for the first she meets to come in and join the Dover.

Pembroke, June 7. His Majesty's Ship the Lincoln failed out of this Harbour the 5th Instant with 9 or 10 Sail of Ships under her Convoy for Bristol; and the Queenborough Frigate, who failed the 3d with several Vessels for Liverpool, was put back last night by contrary Winds.

Falmouth, June 8. On the 6th failed out of this Port the Spanish-Expedition for the Groyne; and the White-Lilly of Flushing for Bilbao.

Plimouth, June 9. This day failed His Majesty's Ships Edgar and Foresight, two Dutch Men of War, and two Fireships, with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy bound to Bilbao.

Bristol, June 10. The Lincoln Man of War is come into Kings-Road from Milford-Haven; where are also arrived the Chance Sloop in 10 weeks from Montserrat, and the Beginning of this Port in 8 weeks from Antegoa.

Hull, June 10. Yesterday failed out of Humber the English and Dutch Fleet of Merchant Ships of 170 Sail, bound to Rotterdam under Convoy of 5 Dutch Men of War. Our East Country Fleet, being about 20 Sail, went out the same time, with their Convoy, the Wind at N. W.

Portsmouth, June 12. On the 10th passed by, in sight of this place, to the Eastward, His Majesty's Ships the Lyon and Trident, having under their Convoy about 40 Sail of Merchant men. The same day the Hampton-Court came to Spithead from the Fleet, which she left in Torbay.

Deal, June 12. On the 10th came into the Downes from the Westward the Lyon and Trident, having under their Convoy the Nassaw from India; 4 Ships from the Barbadoes, 3 from the

the *Swaights*; and about 24 Coasters, the Wind at S. W.

Cambridge, June 11. This day it was determined and declared in the Regent House; That there shall be a Publick Commencement, beginning on the 5th of July.

Tarmouth, June 12. The *Reebuck* is come in, and gives an account, that yesterday at Noon he spoke with a Dane, who came from the *Sound* in company of 5 Dutch Men of War and about 70 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to *Holland*; and that 5 days ago *Du Bart* fell in with them near the South end of the *Dogger-Bank*, and took or destroyed divers of them; But we know not what credit is to be given to this Report. Rear-Admiral *Benbow*, who was with his Squadron in sight of this place, having notice hereof, set sail immediately, and soon after came up with the *Hull Fleet* under Convoy of 5 Dutch Men of War bound to *Holland*, who this morning saw Eight Sail to the S. E. of them, which they believed might be *Du Bart*; and Rear-Admiral *Benbow* is gone after the said Eight Ships.

Whitehall, June 13. An Account was brought hither yesterday, that on the 11th Instant, about 9 in the morning, two Persons were seized in a House at *New-Romney* in *Kent*; one of them went by the Name of *Thomas Ward*, but was known by some of the Town to be *Sir John Fenwick*; The other is *Robert Webber* an Attorney: And Orders are given for bringing them up in safe Custody. Capt. *Waugh* is apprehended at *Canterbury*, who intended likewise to go over to *France*.
