Rders are come from Madrid to hasten the fitting out the Flota designed for the West-Indies, which may be ready to fail against the beginning of July; with this Opportunity the Count de Montezeuma and the Count de Cagnette intend to go thither, the first being made Viceroy of Mexico, and the last of Peru. They are likewise fitting out here 6 Spanish Men of War under the command of the Count de Fireamones. The Alcayde who commands the Moores employed in the Siege of Centa, proposed not long ago to the Spanish Governor several Conditions, which being granted he offered to raise the Siege, but being very extravagant they were immediately rejected; and we hear, that he has fince made new Overtures for a Cessation of Arms, which the Spaniards have likewise refused; being persuaded, that the scarcity there is of Provisions and Ammunition in the Moorish Camp, and the Excessive Heats that are coming on, will quickly oblige them to retire; To which the Allarm oc-cassoned by the Advice of the March of the Al-gerines against Muly Ismael, will in all probability very much contribute, feeing he will stand in need of all his Forces to oppose them.

Vienna, June 2. The Elector of Saxony has fent an Officer hither, to acquaint the Emperor with the good condition he found his Forces in, which assembled near Euda; That the Train of Artillery had joined them; and that he had held a Council of War, where it was resolved to march with the Army towards Effecke, and afterwards to proceed the Enemies Motions; The freshest Accounts they had received concerning them, were, that two Balas were come with their Troops into the Neighbourhood of Belgrade; That the Sultan was expetted with his Army on the Daniele about the middle of this month; and that the general Opinion is, he will pais that River as he did the last year, and mirch towards Transfloania. General Rabella, who went hence the last week to command the Emperor's Army on that fide, has Orders to encamp with the Imperial Forces on the Trontiers of that Country, and to be in a readiness to advance and join our main Army if it be thought necessary; In the mean time Prince Charles of Vaudemont has taken care to secure the Peffes of that Principality, and has feized feveral Spies who were fent by the Turks to get Intelli-Sence of the posture the Imperial Forces are in.
