Genova, June 10. N.S. The Duke de Veraguas, the new Viceroy of Sicily, went hence the last week to take Possession of that Government; this Senate having lent him two of their Gallies to carry him to Palermo. Several Vessels are arrived here from Provence, and we hear by them, that the French fit out their Gallies at Marseilles, and some Men of War at Thoulon.

Vence, June 15. They are fitting here two new Men of War of about 60 Guns each, which may be ready to sail towards the end of this Month with divers other Vessels laden with Provisions, Ammunition, &c. for the Levant. The last Letters from those Parts give an account, That the Captain-General was gone to Sea with the Fleet of this Republick, and that he would endeavour to meet with, and engage the Turkish Fleet, which was come to Scio, consisting of 35 Ships of War, including those of Barbary. The last Advices from Dalmatia, &c. all was very quiet on that side; and that the Turks had sent all the Forces they could spare to their Army in Hungary.

Vienna, June 20. The young Duke of Lorraine arrived here this day from Insprucke, and after a stay of few days at this Court, will proceed for Hungary to make the Campaign in the Imperial Army. The last Advices from thence do all speak of the Siege of Temeswar, as a thing that was fully resolved on; The Army was, when these Letters were written, in the Neighbourhood of Segedin; and some of them give us reason to believe, that the Place before this time is Invested, and the Trenches opened. We do not yet hear that the Enemy have any Forces together to disturb us in this Enterprize: The Sultan, according to our last accounts from Adrianople, was still there, and the time of his Departure for Hungary was not yet fixed, by reason several Bassa's, whom he expected with their Troops were not arrived. Count Teckley is with his Family at Constantinople, but seems to have no great Credit at the Port. The Count de Starckenberg, Governor of this City, took the 15th instant a review of the 4000 Saxons, who came hither by Water from Lintz, and on the 17th they went again on Board their Vessels and proceeded for Hungary. A Regiment of Foot, which the Elector Palatin sends to the Emperor's Assistance, arrived here the 15th, and is likewise gone on to join the Imperial Army.

Berlin, June 26. The Letters from Poland tell us, That the Archbishop of Gnesna had, according to Custom, taken upon him the Administration of the Government during the Inter-regnum, and had ordered Summons to be sent out for the Gentlemen that have Voices at the Election, to meet in the usual manner. Whether any Body will be set up, besides Prince James, Son of the deceased King, is not yet known; But 'tis probable there will on such an Occasion be several Parties (who have not yet had time to form themselves;) and that the French will be as Bullie at this, as they have been at all former Elections.

Vifet, June 29. All the Troops that compose the Army commanded by the Landgrave of Hesse, (except those of Holstein who are expected in few days) are encamped near the Meuse. Those of Hesse near this Place where the Landgrave has his head Quarters; The Troops of Lunenburg near Dalen; and the Munsteriens at Esden. We expect Orders every hour to pass the Meuse, and for that purpose have made a Bridge of Boats between this Place and Esden.

Kinsale, June 21. The 18th instant arrived in this Fort Capt. Kenidge, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Swan, of 24 Guns, from Jamaica. He came thence about 7 weeks ago with 14 Sail of Merchant Ships; 3 of which were separated from him 3 days after their Departure; the rest kept him Company till the 6th instant in the Latitude of 45, when they fell in with a French Man of War of 50 Guns, with whom Capt. Kenidge engaged for the space of 3 or 4 hours, during which time the Merchant Ships altered their Course and got away. And yesterday two of the said Jamaica Ships called the Benjamin and Sarah, and the Nightingale, both belonging to Bristol, arrived in this Port, who give an account that two Ships of their Company, the Effingham and a Pink of London, are taken.

Kinsale, June 23. Yesterday put into Cork Harbour His Majesty's Ships the Resolution, Distance, Monmouth, Dunkirk and Dover, Commanded by Capt. Foulke, having under their Convoy the two East-India Ships from Galway, the London-Frigate and the Amity, as also a West-India Ship bound to London, which put into Ventry; a Virginia Ship bound to Plymouth, but lost from Ballymore; a Bermudoes Sloop for London, and a Dutch Ship laden with Rape Seed: And from Cork the said Men of War will take under their Convoy another East-India Ship called the Armenian Merchant, and the other homeward bound Merchant Ships that are now in that Harbour. His Majesty's Ships the Haverwich, Weymouth, Shoreham and Paul Fir. ship came in here this day.

Dublin, June 25. On the 17th instant a Proclamation was Published by my Lord Justice and Council for a General Fast, to be observed throughout this Kingdom on the 10th of July next, for Imploping the Blessing and Protection of Almighty God, in the Preservation of his Majesty's Sacred Person, and the good Success of his Army at Land and Sea.

Bristol, June 29. This Morning came in the George Frigate of this Place from Antegoa, but lost from Cork, whence she sailed last Friday in Company of 3 East India Ships and other Merchant Men, in all about 30 Sail, under Convoy of several Men of War, whom the George Frigate left yesterday off the Lands end. This day came in the Swift of this place, in 6 weeks from Antegoa; and the Planters Adventures of and from Antegoa.

Plymouth, June 28. This day a Fleet of Ships passed by this Place to the Eastward, which it's believed may be Capt. Foulke with the Men of War, and East-India and other Merchant Ships from Galway and Cork.

Cowes, June 29. The St. James is come in here in 8 days from Norway, the Master reports, that he met on that Coast du Barz with 8 French Men of War and a Fireship.

Whitehall, July 1. My Lord Berkeley failed with the Fleet the 24th past out of Turbry, and was the 28th off Plymouth, the Winds having been contrary.
