PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Order in Council dated the 10th January, 1910 (hereinafter referred to as "the Consolidated Order"), and other Orders in Council dated respectively the 22nd March, 1918, the 23rd October, 1918, the 18th December, 1918, the 15th April, 1919, the 18th August, 1919, the 9th December, 1919, and the 11th March, 1920, provision was made for testing the qualifications of persons proposed to be appointed, whether permanently or temporarily, to situations or employment in His Majesty's Civil Establishments, and for regulating the conduct of the said Establishments and the conditions of service therein:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 5th February, 1918, certain persons were appointed to be His Majesty's Commissioners for testing, in accordance with the Consolidated Order or such further Orders as His Majesty might issue in that behalf, the qualifications of persons proposed to be appointed as aforesaid, and for certain other purposes:

And whereas it is expedient to make further provision in relation to the matters aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1.—(1) The persons appointed to be His Majesty's Commissioners as aforesaid by the said Order of the 5th February, 1918, or such other persons as His Majesty in Council may from time to time approve, shall be His Majesty's Civil Service Commissioners (hereinafter called "the Commissioners") for certifying the qualifications of the persons proposed to be appointed to any situation or employment in His Majesty's Civil Establishments.

(2) The Commissioners shall hold office during His Majesty's pleasure, and shall have power, subject to the approval of the Treasury, to employ from time to time such assistants as they may require for the discharge of the duties assigned to them.

2. The qualifications of all persons proposed to be appointed, whether permanently or temporarily, to any situation or employment in any of His Majesty's Civil Establishments shall, before they are appointed, be approved by the Commissioners, and no person shall be so

appointed until a certificate of his qualification has been issued by the Commissioners:

Provided that—

(a) the provisions of this Article shall not apply to any of the situations enumerated in the Schedule to this Order; and

(b) it shall not be necessary for any person who, at the date on which this Order comes into operation, holds a certificate of qualification from the Commissioners to obtain a new certificate of qualification on being appointed either by transfer or promotion to a situation which, in the opinion of the Commissioners, is similar to the situation in respect of which he already holds a certificate or may properly be filled in customary course of promotion from the class or grade of situation in respect of which the existing certificate was issued.

3. On the application of the Head of any Government Department the Commissioners may by order, made with the approval of the Treasury, from time to time add any situation to the Schedule to this Order or withdraw any situation therefrom.

4. The Commissioners may, subject to the approval of the Treasury, make regulations prescribing the manner in which persons are to be admitted to His Majesty's Civil Establishments or to any situation or class of situations therein, and the conditions on which the Commissioners may issue certificates of qualification for the purposes of this Order.

5. The Commissioners shall publish in the London Gazette notice of all appointments and promotions with respect to which certificates of qualification are issued by them.

6. The Treasury may make regulations for controlling the conduct of His Majesty's Civil Establishments, and providing for the classification, remuneration, and other conditions of service of all persons employed therein, whether permanently or temporarily.

7. All orders and regulations made under this Order, whether by the Commissioners or the Treasury, shall be published in the London Gazette.

8. Articles 2 and 10 of the Consolidated Order shall be repealed as from the date on which this Order comes into operation, and the other provisions of the said recited Orders shall, so far as those Orders are in force on that date, be repealed as from the date on which regulations are made under this Order repealing or re-enacting, with or without modifications, those provisions:

Provided that—

(a) the repeal aforesaid shall not affect the validity of anything done under or by virtue of the said Orders; and

(b) nothing in this Order shall affect any right, privilege, or exemption enjoyed by any person in His Majesty's Civil Establishments under or by virtue of the provisions of the said Orders, so far as those Orders are in force at the date on which this Order comes into operation.

And whereas Article 6 of the principal Order provides that the Treasury may make regulations for controlling the conduct of His Majesty's Civil Establishments, and providing for the classification, remuneration, and other conditions of service of all persons employed therein, whether permanently or temporarily:

And whereas section one of the Sex Disqualification (Removal) Act, 1919, provides that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, authorize regulations to be made providing for, and prescribing the mode of, the admission of women to the Civil Service of His Majesty, and the conditions on which women admitted to that Service may be appointed to or continue to hold posts therein, and giving power to reserve to men any branch of or posts in the Civil Service in any of His Majesty's possessions overseas or in any foreign country:

And whereas it is expedient to authorize the making of regulations as aforesaid:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Subject to the provisions of this Order, the powers of the said Commissioners under Article 4 of the principal Order shall include power to make special regulations providing for, and prescribing the mode of, the admission of women to the Civil Service, and regulations reserving to men any branch of or posts in the Civil Service in any of His Majesty's possessions overseas, or in any foreign country, and the power of the Treasury under Article 6 of the principal Order shall include power to make special regulations with respect to the

conditions on which women admitted to the Civil Service of His Majesty may be appointed to or continue to hold posts therein.

HAT, CAP AND MILLINERY TRADE BOARD (ENGLAND AND WALES).

PROPOSAL TO VARY THE GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES, PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME- RATES AND OVERTIME RATES FIXED FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in England and Wales under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Hat, Cap and Millinery Trade as defined in the Trade Boards (Hat, Cap and Millinery) Order, 1919, hereby give Notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918 (the Minister of Labour having given his consent to such Notice being given), that they propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male Workers at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated the 7th May, 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour dated the 6th May, 1920, in their application to certain classes of Male Workers, so that in lieu of such Minimum Rates the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for the following classes of Male Workers shall be as follows, that is to say:—

SECTION I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates.

SECTION II.—No variation is proposed in the Minimum Rates for Male Workers set out in the above-mentioned Notice, in respect of any class of Male Workers other than those specified in Part I of this Notice.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 30th July, 1920. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary of the Hat, Cap

and Millinery Trade Board (England and Wales), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

*Effective as from 3rd August, 1920.**

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Hair, Bass and Fibre Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Hair, Bass and Fibre) Order, 1919, having given due notice on 5th May, 1920, of Proposal to Fix General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates, hereby give Notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have fixed General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates, and have declared the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, and that the Minimum Rates as fixed are as shown in the Schedule set out below.

* And the Trade Board further give Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 29th July, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates as fixed by the Trade Board, and specifying 3rd August, 1920,* as the date from which such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in no case later than 9th August, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time-Rates for Certain Classes of Male Workers.

A. For Male Workers of 21 years of age and over who are employed in one or more of the following occupations, and who have had not less than three years' experience in one or more of such occupations:—

Horse Hair Sorter, Hackler, Drawer or Buncher; Power Loom Weaver, Winder, Damask Seating Hand Loom Weaver, Curler,

Spinner, Hair Dyer, Cloth Starcher, Carpet Weaver, 1s. 6d. per hour.

B. For Male Workers of 21 years of age and over who are employed in one or more of the following occupations, and who have had not less than three years' experience in one or more of such occupations:—

Fibre Drafter, Dresser or Dyer, Bass Sorter, Dyer, Cutter, Rougher, Mixer or Finisher, 1s. 5½d. per hour.

C. For all other Male Workers:—

Workers of 21 years of age and over, 1s. 2d. per hour.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 1s. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 10d. per hour.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 8½d. per hour.

Workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 17½ years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers of 16½ and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 16½ years of age, 5½d. per hour.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 4¾d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 4d. per hour.

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

Workers under 14½ years of age, 3d. per hour.

Provided that the Minimum Rates set out in paragraphs A, B and C above shall Not apply to Hand Loom Weavers (other than Damask Seating Hand Loom Weavers), to Home-workers, or to Apprentices as defined in Part VI of this Schedule.

PART II.

Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Certain Classes of Male Workers.

A. For all Male Workers employed in one or more of the occupations specified in Part I A of this Schedule, 1s. 8½d. per hour.

B. For all Male Workers employed in one or more of the occupations specified in Part I B of this Schedule, 1s. 8d. per hour.

In the case of all Male Workers employed on Piece-work in one or more of the occupations specified in Parts I A and I B of this Schedule, each Piece-Rate must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate as set out in Parts II A and II B respectively of this Schedule, to an ordinary worker, *i.e.*, a Male Worker of ordinary skill and experience in those occupations.

PART III.

General Minimum Time-Rates for certain Classes of Female Workers.

A. For Female Workers of 18 years of age and over who are employed in one or more of the following occupations, and who have had not less than three years' experience in one or more of such occupations:—

Horse Hair Sorter, Hackler, Drawer or

Buncher; Flower Loom Weaver, Winder, Damask Seating Hand Loom Weaver, Curler, Spinner, Hair Dyer, Cloth Starcher, Carpet Weaver, 9½d. per hour.

B. For Female Workers of 18 years of age and over who are employed in one or more of the following occupations, and who have had not less than three years' experience in one or more of such occupations:—

Fibre Drafter, Dresser or Dyer, Bass Sorter, Dyer, Cutter, Rougher, Mixer or Finisher, 9½d. per hour.

C. For all other Female Workers:—

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 8½d. per hour.

Workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 17½ years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers of 16½ and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 16½ years of age, 5½d. per hour.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 4¾d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 4d. per hour.

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

Workers under 14½ years of age, 3d. per hour.

Provided that in the case of any worker who enters the trade for the first time at or over the age of 16 years, and who is employed on time-work, the General Minimum Time-Rate payable during the worker's first 12 months' employment shall be the respective Minimum Rates set out above appropriate to a worker in the immediate junior age group in lieu of the General Minimum Time-Rates otherwise applicable.

Provided also that the Rates set out in paragraphs A, B and C above shall not apply to Hand Loom Weavers (other than Damask Seating Hand Loom Weavers), to Home-workers, or to Apprentices as defined in Part VI of this Schedule.

PART IV.

Piece-work Basis Time-Rates for Certain Classes of Female Workers.

A. For all Female Workers employed in one or more of the occupations specified in Part III A of this Schedule, 10½d. per hour.

B. For all Female Workers employed in one or more of the occupations specified in Part III B of this Schedule, 10¼d. per hour.

In the case of all Female Workers employed on Piece-work in one or more of the occupations specified in Parts III A and III B each Piece-Rate must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate as set out in Parts IV A and IV B respectively of this Schedule, to an ordinary Worker, *i.e.*, a female worker of ordinary skill and experience in those occupations.

PART V.

Overtime Rates for Certain Classes of Male and Female Workers.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3

(1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade in any week to be 48.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a Worker (so far as is allowed under the Factory and Workshop Acts) in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows, that is to say:—

A.—Workers employed on time-work.

(1) For the first four hours of Overtime in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(2) For Overtime after the first four hours of Overtime in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

Provided that for all time worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time.

B.—Workers employed on Piece-Work.

Workers employed on Piece-work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime a Piece-Rate which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker, at least the equivalent of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be, with the addition of:—

(1) As respects each of the first four hours of Overtime in any week, a sum equivalent to One Quarter of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be;

(2) As respects each hour in excess of four hours of Overtime in any week, a sum equivalent to One Half of the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be;

(3) As respects each hour of employment on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, a sum equivalent to the appropriate Piece-work Basis Time-Rate or General Minimum Time-Rate, as the case may be.

PART VI.

SECTION I.—For the purpose of this Notice the expression "Home-worker" means a worker who works in his or her own home, or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

SECTION II.—For the purpose of this Notice the expression "Apprentices" means Indentured Apprentices and Unbound Learners employed under an agreement, written or verbal, providing for the proper instruction of the Learner in one or more of the occupations specified in Parts I A, I B, III A or III B of this Schedule.

PART VII.

SECTION I.—The Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts and of this Notice, to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Hair, Bass and Fibre) Order, 1919; that is to say:—

The drafting, dressing or mixing of bass, whisk or similar fibres or horse hair or other hairs and the curling or weaving of hair or fibre, or of mixed hair and fibre, and all preparatory, finishing, warehousing or packing operations incidental to or appertaining to all or any of the above processes, but excluding any of the above operations or processes where they are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of brushes or brooms, and excluding also the dressing of animal skins.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorized by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION III.—The Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

AND FEMALE WORKERS.

EFFECTIVE AS FROM 3RD AUGUST, 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Acts, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Flax and Hemp Trade in Great Britain, as specified in the Trade Boards (Flax and Hemp) Order, 1919, having given due notice on 5th March, 1920, of proposal to fix general minimum time rates and overtime rates for male and female workers, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have fixed general minimum time rates and overtime rates for male and female workers and have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade for the purpose of the application of the overtime rates, and that the minimum rates of wages as fixed and the hours as declared are as shown in the Schedule set out below.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order

dated 27th July, 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the minimum rates of wages fixed by the Trade Board, and specifying 3rd August, 1920,* as the date from which such minimum rates of wages shall become effective.

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in any case not later than 9th August, 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

General Minimum Time Rates.

SECTION I.—*Female Workers.*

Workers of 18 years of age and upwards, 32s. per week.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 28s. per week.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 24s. per week.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 21s. per week.

Workers under 15 years of age, 17s. per week.

Provided that the above general minimum time rates shall not apply in the case of female workers of 18 years of age and upwards who have had less than six months' experience in the trade.

SECTION II.—*Male Workers.*

Workers of 21 years of age and upwards, 54s. per week.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 46s. per week.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 42s. per week.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 38s. per week.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 28s. per week.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 24s. per week.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 21s. per week.

Workers under 15 years of age, 17s. per week.

SECTION III.

The weekly rates set out in Sections I. and II. of this part of this Schedule are based on a week of 48 hours and shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

Provided that in the case of whole time workers employed by the week or longer period, where the normal number of hours per week in the establishment as agreed between the employer and his workers is less than 48, but not less than 44:

(i) The weekly wage payable for such shorter normal working week shall be not less than the weekly rates set out in Sections I. and II. of this Part of this Schedule.

(ii) The weekly rates set out in Sections I. and II. of this part of this Schedule shall be subject to a proportionate deduction or increase up to 48 hours, according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less or more than the agreed normal number of hours in the establishment.

PART II.

Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers (All Ages).

SECTION I.

In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board hereby declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be:—

In any week, 48.

On any week day other than Saturday, 8½.

On Saturday, 4½.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays, Statutory Holidays, and any days which are Customary Holidays in the district in the Flax and Hemp Trade (but so that the total number of such days, including Statutory Holidays, but excluding Sundays, shall not exceed 11 working days in any one year) shall be regarded as Overtime, to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a Male or Female Worker, whether employed on time-work or on piece-work, in excess of the declared normal number of hours, shall be as follows:—

(1) For all time worked on any of the days mentioned in the proviso to Section I. of this part of this Schedule, Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time.

(2) For all time worked in excess of 4½ hours on Saturday, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

(3) (a) For the first two hours worked in excess of 8½ hours on any other day, One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(b) For all time worked in excess of 10½ hours, One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

Provided that in the case of workers who, in accordance with the practice of the establishment, attend for nine hours per day on five days of the week, and for three hours on Saturday, the Overtime Rate fixed by Sub-Section (3) (a) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first quarter of an hour in excess of 8½ hours, but shall be payable thereafter till 11 hours have been worked, and the Overtime Rate payable fixed by Sub-Section (3) (b) of this Section shall apply in respect of all hours worked after 11 hours.

Provided also that to workers who, in accordance with the practice of the establishment, attend only on five days a week, the said rates fixed by Sub-Section (3) (a) of this Section shall not be payable in respect of the first three-quarters of an hour in excess of 8½ hours, but shall be payable thereafter until 11½ hours have been worked; and the said rate fixed by Sub-Section (3) (b) of this Section shall be payable for all time worked in excess of 11½ hours.

(4) For all time worked in any week in excess of 48 hours One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except where a higher amount is payable in respect of Overtime under Sub-Sections (1), (2) and

3 (b) of this Section with regard to Overtime Rates.

Provided that the above Overtime Rates shall not apply in the case of Female Workers of 18 years of age and upwards who have had less than six months' experience in the trade.

SECTION III.

The provisions set out in this Part of the Schedule are without prejudice to any agreement between an employer and his workers, providing for the payment at Overtime Rates of all hours in excess of the normal number of hours in the establishment, notwithstanding that such normal number of hours is less than 48 per week.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts to all Male and Female Workers in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Flax and Hemp) Order, 1919, namely:—

The preparing, spinning and weaving (a) of scutched flax, (b) of hemp, (c) of a mixture of scutched flax and any other fibre, or (d) of a mixture of hemp and any other fibre.

Including:

- (1) The preparing and spinning of waste reclaimed at any stage; and
- (2) All packing, despatching, warehousing, storing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned work;

But excluding:

- (1) The calendering, bleaching, dyeing or finishing of any of the above-mentioned materials; and
- (2) The preparing or spinning of materials required for the making or remaking of (a) rope (including driving rope and banding), (b) cord (including blind and window cord, but excluding silk, worsted and other fancy cords), (c) core for wire ropes, (d) lines, (e) twine (including binder and trawl twine), (f) lanyards, (g) net and similar articles when such spinning or preparing is carried on in the same factory or workshop as the said making or remaking; and
- (3) The making or repair of sacks or bags; and also
- (4) The weaving of carpets, rugs and mats.

Provided that, notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained, the above Minimum Rates of Wages shall not apply to Watchmen, Gate-men, Enginemen and Firemen.

PART IV.

SECTION I.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

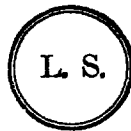

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BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS

MADE BY THE

SCARBOROUGH TRAMWAYS COMPANY

UNDER THE POWERS CONFERRED ON THE
COMPANY BY THE TRAMWAYS ACT, 1870.

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Company and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make Bye-laws and Regulations.

2. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Company and having charge of a carriage.

The expression "interior of a carriage" shall not include the upper deck of covered carriages.

3. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindmost or conductor's platform and not otherwise. When a carriage stops, no person shall board the carriage until all passengers desiring to alight therefrom shall have done so.

4. No person shall enter, or mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount or leave any carriage in motion.

5. No passenger shall smoke in the interior of any carriage, and no person shall spit in, on, from or against any carriage.

6. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

7. A person in a state of intoxication shall not enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall leave the carriage immediately on being requested to do so by the conductor.

8. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

9. No person shall commit any nuisance in, on, or against any carriage, tramway station, waiting room, or premises used in connection with the Company's tramways.

10. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or

scratch any window of, or otherwise wilfully damage, any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

11. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not mount, enter or remain on or in any carriage, and may be prevented from so doing, and, if found on or in any carriage, shall, on request of the conductor, leave the same upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned: Provided that on carriage specially run for artisans, mechanics and daily labourers no person shall be prevented from entering or remaining in or on a carriage under the provision of this Bye-law on the ground of the condition of his dress or clothing, if such condition is solely due to the nature of his employment.

12. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Company the fare legally demandable for the journey.

13. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any) when required so to do to the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

14. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the statutory provisions relating to the Company, shall not use or attempt to use any Ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

15. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not elsewhere.

16. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall travel on the steps or platform of any carriage, or stand on the upper deck, or sit on the railings, guards, or buffers of any carriage, and any person so travelling, standing, or sitting shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

17. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage.

18. No person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage or travel therein or thereon otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers, except in the interior of the carriage with the consent of the conductor.

19. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers, a conspicuous notice to that effect shall be placed on the carriage.

20. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

21. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage, except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into or

on any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this Regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

22. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Company with loaded fire-arms.

23. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company, and no person other than the conductor or driver shall change or remove the route indicators or destination boards or interfere with the controllers, brakes, lights, ventilators, trolley cord or any other part of a carriage or its equipment.

24. If at any time a carriage becomes disabled, or in any way damaged, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall, upon request of the conductor, leave the same, and if such passengers have paid their fares, they shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid, but on production of their tickets shall be allowed to travel by the next available carriage, the remainder of the distance in respect of which they have paid their fares. No person shall, except with

the leave of the conductor, enter a disabled or damaged carriage.

25. Any person who shall commit, whilst in or on any carriage, any breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations, shall, if the offence is continued, be liable in addition to incurring the penalty hereinafter provided to be immediately removed from the carriage by or under the direction of the conductor, and if such person shall have paid his fare, he shall not be entitled to claim its return.

26. The conductor shall enforce these Bye-laws and Regulations and prevent the breach thereof to the best of his ability.

27. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws and Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Forty Shillings.

28. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

29. These Bye-laws and Regulations shall come into force on the first day of September, 1920.

Carmarthenshire.—(1) An area comprising the parish of Llanedy, in the administrative county of Carmarthen.

(2) An area comprising the parishes of Quarter Bach, Llanddeusant, Myddfai and Llangadock, and Llandilo-Fawr Rural (except its detached part), in the administrative county of Carmarthen.

Inverness.—(1) An Area comprising the Islands known as the Outer Hebrides (*except the islands of St. Kilda, Dune, Socy, and Boreray*), in the county of Inverness.

(2) An Area in the county of Inverness, comprising the islands known as Skye or Inner Hebrides.
