person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and enquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands, tithes rent charges, tenements or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England: "And we further recommend and propose

that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said Scheme has been ap-

proved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act:

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar

of the Diocese of Canterbury.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Act of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 17th day of June, 1920, in the words and figures follow-

ing, that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 33rd and 34th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 39, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 113, the Act of the 4th and 5th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 39, and the Alct of the 31st and 32nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 114, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or

perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called "the said Benefice") of Saint Mary, Cleeton, in the County of Salop and in the Diocese of Hereford:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Mary, Cleeton, is vested for an estate in fee simple free from incumbrances in certain Trustees upon trust in the first place for Gertrude Pardoe, formerly of No. 3, Pinnocks Lane, Baldock, in the County of Hertford, but now of Saint Simon's Vicarage, Bethnal Green, London, Widow, during her life, and the said Gertrude Pardoe is therefore the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said Benefice in case the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said Gertrude Pardoe is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Mary, Cleeton, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Herbert Hensley, now Bishop of Hereford, and his successors in the same

"And whereas the said Herbert Hensley, Bishop of Hereford, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore men-tioned Act recited, or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Herbert Hensley, Bishop of Hereford, has executed this

Scheme as hereinafter mentioned: "And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Saint Mary, Cleeton, which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the New Parish of Saint Mary,

Cleeton:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Gertrude Pardoe, being the person whose consent as Patron is required by the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts and of the Act of the 1st and 2nd years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 106, (in testimony of which consent she has signed and sealed this Scheme) and with the consent of the said Herbert Hensley, Bishop of Hereford, (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Saint Mary, Cleeton, shall be transferred to the said Herbert Hensley, Bishop of Hereford, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Herbert Hensley, Bishop of Hereford, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.
