A PROCLAMATION.

Hireas We have Received Information from the Governour and Company of Merchants of London Trading to the East-Indies, That one Henry Every Commander of the Ship called the Phancy, of Forty six Givis, and One bundred and thirty Men, has, under English Colours, asted as a Common Pirate and Robber upon the High Seas, and hath prejunced under such Colours to Commit several Asts of Piracy upon the Seas of India or Persia, which may occasion great Damage to the Merchants of England, Trading into those Parts; We have therefore thought sic (by the Advice of His Majissies must Honourable Privy Council) to Issue this Proclamation, hereby Declaring, That the Said Henry Every, together with divers other English Men and Foreigners, to the Number of about One hundred and thirty, did Steal and Run away with the said Ship then call dithe Charles, from the Pore of Corona in Spain; and that the Said Henry Every did Steal and Run away with the said Ship then call a the Charles, from the Port of Corona in Spain; and that the said Henry Every bath not any Commission or Authority from his Majesty to Command the Ship or the Men therein, out that the said Henry Every, and such as are with him in the said Ship, are Pirates, and Common Robbers upon the High Seas. Matrid, Jul., 5. N. S. Don Francisco de Velasco is gone to his Government of Castaloria, and has taken Money with him for payment of the Army, which by the last Letters, lay encamped mean Offalorete. Yetterday we received Adrice by an Express from Barcelona, that two Spanish Galleys had taken 25 french Vessels, laten with Meal and other Provincias, being bound to Ross for the use of the french Forces; one of which having a good quantity of Gun-powder on board, took hreasterwards, and was blown Gun-powder on board, took fireafterwards, and was blown up. Bilbon, July 5. The 2d Instant arrived here a Fleet of English and Durch Merchant Ships under Convoy of 4. Men of War; They came last from Plinoush.

Vienna, July 11. The Letters from the Imperial Army, dated the 4th Instant in their Camp near Chonad on the River Marosh, give an account, that it having been resolved to go with a Body of Troops to view Templomaer, the Flector of Saxons Troops to view Temeswaer, the Elector of Saxmy with Count Heytersheim, and Count Staremberg, Generals of the Horse and Foot, marched accordingly the 29th past with 4000 Horse, and a Regiment of Hussars; They advanced that day to a place called aranka, continued their march the 30th, and arrived the first Instant, early in the morning, near Temifwaer; Some of the Enemies Parties appeared, and skirmished with our Hussars, who had the Vanguard, but there was little harm done on either fide. In the mean time the Elector advanced, and placed his Troops within Cannon shor of the I own, and took a full view of its situation; The Enemy fired upon us all the while with their Artillery, and several small Bodies of Horse were fent out to disturb us, but they quickly retired again; We continued in this posture till the afternoon, when his Electoral Highness marched off; The Enemy did not pretend to fall upon our Rear, but let us go away very quietly; We had 10 Men killed, and some wounded, and took several Prisoners, who said, the Garison consisted of 10000 Men, commanded by 4 Baffa's, having been reinforced upon the apprehensions they are in of a Siege. The 2d the Elector returned to Aranka, and the 3d to the Camp at Chonad; where they expected the 4000 Saxons in few days. General Truchses is encamped with two Regiments of Horse, two of Foot, and two of Dragoons near Peterwaradin, and has put 1000 Men on boardife. veral Galleys and other Vessels to guard the Entrance into the River Therste. The Advices of the Grand Signior's being on his march towards the Danube is confirmed. The Emperor has named the Count de Harrach his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Spain, to make the Complements of Condoleance upon the death of the Queen

Francfort, July 18. The German Army commanded by Prince Lewis of Baden, marthed the 11th Instant from by Prince Lewis of Baden, marched the 11th Instant from Flekingen to Zeiteren, where they were still encamped the 16th, their Right reaching towards Langenbruck; But they expected to march again in a day or two, and twas believed they would move towards Hydelberg to pass the Neckar there. The French Army under the Marechal de Choiseal lies on the other side the Rhine near Stokesin, having possed Greens Derachements over against Manhaim ving posted several Detachements over against Manheim, and at other Places, to hinder the Germans from passing that River. A Reinforcement has been sent to the Garison of Rhinfelt.

Cologne, July 20. The Troops of the Elector Palatin continue their march to join the Confederate Army on the Upper-Rhine; From whence the last Letters give us ground to believe, that Prince Lewis would very fuddenly pass that River, in order to some attempt upon the Enemy.

Hamburgh, July 20. We have Advice from 1 Dinmark, that Du Bare was got with his Squadron into the Port of Manial in Norway, where he was cleaning his Ships; and that Rear-Admiral B.nbam having notice thereof, was gone thither to obferve him. They write from Wirfaw of the 5th of this Month, that leveral Disorders had been committed there, as is usual during the Interregnum; and particularly, that some of the ordinary sort of People, had got into the Apartment of the King deceased, and had carried away several rich Goods, though most of them paid very dear for their Booty, being cut in pieces by the Guard that was immediately fent thither. The Archbishop and many of the Senators were come to Warsaw; and the Circular Letters were dispatching for summoning the Gentry together, to make a new Election; 'Tisgenerally believed Prince James, the late King's Eldest Son, will be chosen with little opposition.

Liege, July 20. The Forces of Heffe, Lunenburg, Holstein, and Munster, decamped the 18th from Robermont, and having passed the River Out at Chenay on two Bridges of Boats, encamped that evening at Val St. Lambert near the Mense, about ewo Leagues from hence; and yesterday they marched again, and are now encamped near Huy.

Paris, July 20. The English and Dutch Fleet appeared the 11th of this Month before Brest; Which obliged the Marquis de Nefmond, who was going out with 5 Men of War, and divers Merchant Men, to return into Port with all the haste they could; The 12th the Enemy sailed towards Belle-Isle, and an Express is since come from the Mareschal de Tourville, who brings an account, that they were before St. Martins in the Isle of Ree, and had thrown 200 Bombs into the Town, but tells us no particulars. This is certain, that all our Coasts thereabout are greatly alarmed, and that for their defence they keep a great Body of Men in Arms, consisting as well of standing Troops, as of the Arrierban, which is a great Charge to the Country, and very much pre-judices their Harvest. The Letters from Piedmont of the 13th tell us, that a Cessation of Hostilities had been published for 30 days, and that for performance thereof Hostages had been given on both sides; For the French, the Grand Prior of France, the Marquis de Larrai, the Count de Tesse, and the Count de Rouci; and for the Duke of Savoy, the Marquis de Tana, the Marquis d'Aix, the Marquis de Canaillac, and the Count de Nom. In the mean time the French Army continued encamped at Voluera; The Troops of the Duke of Savoy lay near Turin; and the Allies near Monealier.
They write from Catalonia, that the Spaniards continued in their Camp near Offalric; and the French at Tordera.
