HE whole Fleet under the Command of the Right Honourable the Lord Berkeley sailed the 3d in-tint from Ulbant towards Bell-Isle, and in the fint from Ulhant towards Bell-Isle, and in the Afternoon, upon a Signal from the Admiral, Sir Martin Beckman with the Bomb-Vessels separated from the Fleet with a Convoy of 10 Men of War and 5 Fire-passenmanded by Captain Mees. On the 5th we arrived towners and a aclock in the Afternoon before St. Martin, ware the Men of War came to an Anchor; But the Bemb-Vessels went in as far as they could ze, which ru then they all set fast on a soft Ground. After one hour's bombing, there appeared five several Fires in the middle of the Town, some were put out, but two commend with great sud lesty Flames; At 3 in the morning the Bomb Vessels hauled off to restell the Men, and it recruited with all Necessaries. They fired from the Town with 18 Pieces of Cancarand 4 Mertars, but without doing us any damage. The 7th in the morning we gave out bombing of St. Martin, having left one of their Ships on fire in the Read, and breizh away a Danish Flybast laden with Brandy and Sali, upon suspicion of being French; We took also a Soft sing inhesias several Basts laden with Provisions, &c. The Encry had planted four Pieces of Cannon upon the Foint going into the Harbour, from whome at our coming 10 Anchor the Commander of the Society Bomb-Ship. Captain Jennifer, was killed. We freed here Nineteen humaned ninety six Bombs and Carcassis with very good effect. The fairness of the Weather, and the light Moon, very much facilitated this short and successful Expedition, To which Sir Martin Beckman and Captain Mees contributed very much by their extraordinary Care and Diligence, very much by their extraordinary Gare and Dilgence, being present both night and day in the hottest of the Astion, to direct and encourage the Service; Which having thus performed, the Men of War and Bomb-V. sels rejoyned the Fleet.

This Evening came in also a Mail from Holland with Letters of the 16th Instant from His Majesties Camp at Nivelle; They inform us that the Army was come to that place in two days march from Gemblours, and was to march again the 17th towards Soignies. The Mareschal de Boufflers decamped the 15th from St. Gerard, and was marching likewise on the other side of the Sambre towards Flanders, Part of our heavy Baggage was fent to Hall, and our Parties had out off and taken several imall Parties of the French on their march the 16th. They write from Piedmont that the French Army continued at Volvera, and the Allies at Moncalier; and that the Generals of the latter had refused to Sign the Cessation of Arms. On the Upper Rhine the Confederate Army continued at Zeiteren; and the French at Oltofen. Two Regiments of Herse and Three of Dragoons of the Treath of the Elector Pulvision were compliant the Naiol. Troops of the Elector Palatine were come into the Neighborhood of Franciort in their march to jayn the Germins, The Letters from Vienna of the 14th teil us, they had advice from Hungary that the additional Troops of Saxony being 4000 Men had jayned the Imperial Army, which had thereupon passed the River Marosh, and advanced towards Temeswaer.
