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Lugburne, July 16. N. S.

THE account we received the last week of a Dutch Privateer's having taken a French Ship, commanded by the Sieur *Bremont*, is since confirmed; and we hear they have carried the Prize to *St. Fiorenzo*, a Port in *Corsica*. The King *William* Galley failed hence two days ago for *Scanderon*.

Turin, July 17. The Armies continue still in the same Posture: The Allies at *Moncalier*, and the French at *Voliera*: The Marquis de *Taffe* and the Marquis de *Pouzole*, the two French Hostages are come hither; and ours, the Marquis de *Ferne* and the Marquis de *Aix*, are sent to *Pignerol*. The Cessation of Arms is to continue 30 days from the Exchanging of the said Hostages, which was on the 12th instant; in which time the Answers of the Allies are expected.

Venice, July 20. Signior *Soranzo* and Signior *Venier* returned hither on Wednesday last from *England*, and the next day went to the College, where they gave an account of their Embassy, and were afterwards Complimented by the Nobility at the Palace; Signior *Soranzo* appeared on this occasion in a black Gown, with his under Habit of Crimson Colour, as all new Knights wear for the three first days. The Pope's Gallies, with those of *Malta*, departed from *Messina* the 22th of the last month for the *Levant*; From whence we have no fresh News.

Vienna, July 21. The Letters from the Imperial Army in *Hungary* of the 17th instant, tell us, They were then Encamped near *Chonza* on the side of the River *Marosch* towards *Timiswarer*. That upon advice of the Enemies having some Design in hand against *Titul*, the Lieutenant-General Count de *Heiterheim*, was sent thither on the 11th, to take care that the Place was provided with all things necessary for its Defence. The 12th the Elector of *Saxony* received advice by an Express from *Transylvania*, That the Grand Signior was passed by *Philippopolis*, in his march towards the *Danube*; which was confirmed by several Prisoners taken by our Parties that had been sent out towards *Timiswarer*. On the 16th 4000 *Saxons* joined the Army; and the Count de *Heiterheim* returned from *Titul*, having left that Garison in a very good Posture to receive the Enemy, in case of any attempt upon them. The 17th Orders were sent to General *Rabutin*, who lay at *Dobra* with the Forces from *Transylvania*, to advance nearer to *Chonza*, in order to join the Army if it were found necessary. The Emperor is sending the Count de *Waldstein*, in quality of his Ambassador, to *Poland*.

to be present at the Election, which is appointed for the 29th of the next month; And by all that appears hitherto we have reason to believe, that Prince *Famas*, Eldest Son to the last King, will be chosen with little or no opposition.

Francfort, July 29. Five Regiments of Horse, of the Elector *Palatine's* Troops, are come into our Neighbourhood; and the Count d'*Autel*, who Commands them, has sent an Express to Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, Encamped at *Rauchsburg* near *Welsloch*, to receive his Orders, whether the said Regiments shall march to the main Army, or join the Troops of *Neuburg*, *Paterborne*, and *Welfembuttell*, who lie at present near the *Neckar*, and seem designed to act in a separate Body. Prince *Lewis* has detached from his Camp two Regiments of *Hussars* under the Command of Count *Capli*, with Orders to pass the *Rhine* at *Meyers*, and post themselves near that City, to protect the Country thereabouts from being insulted by the Enemies Parties. The French Army continues near *Stolhofen*, on the other side the *Rhine*.

Paris, July 30. Several Expresses have arrived here within these few days from *Brittany* and *Poitou*, with an account of the Motions of the Enemies Fleet, which have given a very great Alarm all along those Coasts. The Letters from *Piedmont* of the 22th instant say, The French Army was still at *Voliera*; That the Marechal de *Carnat* had the day before sent away two Regiments towards *Fenestrelle*; That several others would soon follow; and that the whole Army would repass the Mountains, so soon as they saw the *German* and *Spanish* Troops retired out of *Piedmont*. 'Tis said, That the Duke of *Orleans* will go hence towards the end of the next month, to receive the Princess of *Piedmont* at *Lyons*. The Marquis de *Croissy*, Secretary of State, died here the 28th, in the 67th Year of his Age, in which Office his Son, the Marquis de *Torci*, succeeds him. The Marquis de *Nesmond* is sailed from *Brest* with the Squadron under his Command.

Brussels, August 1. The Marechal de *Boufflers* has sent a Detachment from his Army towards *Flanders*, which passed two days ago by *Conde*, in their march to *Pont Esperies* near *Townay* upon the *Schelde*, whither the Marechal de *Villeroi* has likewise sent a Detachment of 8 Regiments to secure that Post. The Marquis de *Harcourt*, the Count de *Tollard*, and the Count de *Gustcard*, continue in their former Posts to cover *Dinant*. And the Landgrave of *Hesse* lies with the *German* Forces near *Namur*. A great Convoy of Provisions goes hence to morrow to His Majesty's Camp near *Artois*; after whose arrival its believed the Army will march again.

From His Majesty's Camp at Attre near Aoch, August 2. On Tuesday last the Prince de Vaudemont came hither to wait upon the King, and having had several Conferences with His Majesty, returned again yesterday to his Camp at Marickirke. The Marechal de Boufflers continues near St. Gestain; and the Marechal de Villeroy at Machten: They have posted considerable Detachments at Pont d'Espieres, and other Places along the Schelde. Yesterday a Party of Spanish Horse met and defeated two of the Enemies Parties; one of 50 Horse, from the Marechal de Villeroy's Army, and the other of 150, from Marechal Boufflers; They brought in 80 Horses, and 74 Prisoners, among which are a Captain, Lieutenant, and two Cornets.

Hague, August 3. N. S. The Count d'Aversberg, the Emperors Minister, is going to His Majesty's Army in Flanders. 'Tis said, That the Emperor will not accept the Neutrality proposed for Italy, but is resolved to carry on the War on that side. The Letters from Paris of the 30th past tell us, that a Squadron is fitting out at Brest, to be Commanded by Monsieur de Chasteauneau.

Youghall, July 17. A small French Privateer, being a Shalop with 24 Oars carrying one Gun, 4 Patereroes, and 30 Men, commanded by one Patrick Cummerford, having taken some Fishing-Boats belonging to this Place, a Boat was Man'd out from hence on the 15th instant, with about 40 Men, Seamen and Soldiers, who finding the said Privateer at an Anchor under a little Island, within a League of this Harbour, fired into her a Volley of small Shot, and boarding her, after a short Dispute, took her, and brought her into this Port; of the French 5 were killed, and the Captain, Lieutenant, and 16 more were very much wounded; the rest are Prisoners.

Kinsale, July 19. The 16th instant arrived here His Majesty's Ship the Crowne, Capt Wade, Commander, with the Muscovia Merchant, and Greenfish Storeships, and several other Merchant Ships under their Convoy, from Plimouth.

Falmouth, July 23. Yesterday came into this Port two Zealand Privateers, called the King William and the Middleburg, and brought in with them a French Privateer of 8 Guns, which they took some days ago.

Plimouth, July 24. Rear-Admiral Nevill, with the Ships under his Command, sailed hence the 22th instant to join the Fleet in Torbay. The Portland and Sunderland are come in with a Re-taken Merchant Ship, called the Dolphin of Boston in New-England: The Sunderland has brought in a small French Privateer taken on the French Coast.

Newcastle, July 25. This day arrived before our Harbors Mouth two Merchant Ships, called the Mary, Capt. James Mawn Commander, and the Speedwell, Capt. Arthur Smith, in two months from Nevis, coming North about: They met in the Lat. of 41. the Oxford and Arundel Frigats, with several outward bound Merchant Ships under their Convoy. There are come into

our Harbour two Men of War with 12 sail of Merchant-Men from Rotterdam.

Hull, July 25. On Thursday last came here our Rotterdam Fleet, consisting of 16 Sail of Merchant-Ships, under Convoy of two Dutch Men of War; who proceeded with several other Merchant Ships to the Northward.

Deal, July 27. Yesterday came into the Downes Rear-Admiral Benbow with the Squadron under his Command, from the Northward.

Westminster, July 28. The Parliament met this day, and was, by Commission, farther Prorogued to the first day of September next.

Whitehall, July 29. The Association of several of the Gentlemen, and most of the Inhabitants within the Hundreds of Brantou, Sherwill, and Fremington in the County of Devon, was Presented to the Lords Justices by the Right Honourable the Earl of Stamford, Lord-Lieutenant of the said County.
