HE account we received the last week of a Dutch Privateer's having taken a French Ship, commanded by the Sieur Bremont, is fince confirmed; and we hear they have carried the Prize to St. Fiorenzo, a Port in Corfica. The King William Galley failed hence two days ago for Seanderoin.

Tarin, July 17. The Armies continue still in the fame Posture; The Allies at Monealier, and the French at Volucra: The Marquis de Teffe and the Marquis de Pouzole, the two French Hostages are come hither; and ours, the Marquis de Fine and the Marquis d'Aix, are fent to Pignerol. The Cessation of Arms is to continue 30 days from the Exchanging of the said Hostages, which was on the 12th in-fant; in which time the Answers of the Allies are expected.

Venice, July 20. Signior Soranzo and Signior Fener returned hither on Wednesday last from England, and the next day went to the College, where they gave an account of their Embassy, and were afterwards Complimented by the Nobility at the Palace; Signior Seranzo appeared on this occasion in a black Gown, with his under Habit of Crimson Colour, as all new Knights wear fot the three first days. The Pope's Gallies, with those of Malta, departed from Messina the 22th of the last month for the Levant; From whence we have no fresh News.

Vienna, July 21. The Letters from the Imperial Army in Hungary of the 17th instant, tell us, They were then Encamped near Chonad on the fide of the River Marofch towards Temefwaer. That upon advice of the Enemies having some Design in hand against Titul, the Lieutenant-Gemeral Count de Heitersheim, was sent thither on the 11th, to take care that the Place was provided with all things necessary for its Defence. The 12th the Elector of Saxony received advice by an Express from Transilvania, That the Grand Sigthe Danube; which was confirmed by feveral Prisonerstaken by our Parties that had been sent out towards Tem finaer. On the 16th 4000 Saxons joined the Army; and the Count de Heysersbeim returned from Tien!, having left that Garison in a very good Posture to receive the Enemy, in case of any attempt upon them. The 17th Orders were fent to General Rabacia, who lay at Dobra with the Forces from Translivania, to advance nearer to

Francfort, July 29. Five Regiments of Horse, of the Elector Palatine's Troops, are come into our Neighbourhood; and the Count d'Antel, who Commands them, has fent an Express ro Prince Lewis of Baden, Encamped at Rauch nburg near W.feloch, to receive his Orders, whether the faid Regiments shall march to the misn Army, or join the Troops of Mentler, Paterborne, and Welfembuttell, who lie at prefent near the Neckar, and feem defigned to act in a separate Body. Trince Lewis has detached from his Chung two Regiments of Hussars under the Command of Counce of se. with Orders to pass the Kline at Myses, and post themselves near that City, to protest the Country thereabouts from being insulted by the Enemies Parties. Paris, July 30. Several Expresses have arrived here within these few days from British and Poitou, with an account of the Motions of the Enemies Fleet, which have given a very great Allarm all along those Coasts. Brussells, August 1. The Marquis de Harcourt, the Count de Tollard, and the Count de Guilcard, continue in their former Posts to cover Dinant. And the Landtgrave of Heffe lies with the German Forces near Namer. 'Tis said, That the Emperor will not accept the Neutrality proposed for Italy, but is resolved to carry on the War on that side.
