II.—CONDITIONS OF SERVICE.

2. Shipwrights, 5th Class, whether entered direct or rated from Boy Shipwright, to be advanced to Acting Shipwright, 4th Class, after not more than one year's service as Shipwright, 5th Class.

3. Shipwrights, 4th Class, to be advanced to Shipwrights, 3rd Class, after 3 years' service above Shipwright, 5th Class, including the period of Acting time allowed to reckon; to Shipwright, 2nd Class, after 7 years of such

service; and to Shipwright, 1st Class, after 12 years of such service.

4. Shipwrights, 2nd Class, and above to be eligible to pass for Chief Shipwright, 2nd Class, and to be advanced in vacancies. Shipwrights who may have passed the examination for Warrant Shipwright not to be required to pass for Chief Shipwright, 2nd Class.

5. Chief Shipwrights, 2nd Class, to be eligible for advancement to Chief Shipwright, 1st Class, after 6 years' service as Chief Shipwright, 2nd Class.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that “Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether Extra-Parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted Separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes,” it is, amongst other things, enacted, “That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a Separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, Parochial or Extra-Parochial, so as to form a Separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected,

and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect”:

And whereas the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, hath made a representation in writing, dated the 28th day of June, 1920, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

“I, Frank Theodore, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, in pursuance of the 26th Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

“There is in the County of Rutland and my Diocese of Peterborough the Vicarage or Benefice of Oakham with the Chapelries or Hamlets of Egleton, Brooke, and Gunthorpe belonging thereto.
