Falmouth, Decemb. 8.

He Fleet of Metchant thips which to long were detained in this Port, put to fea the 5th inftant with a fair wind. The 6th inftant arrived here the Concord of London, intended for Caliz, and after one Nights flay put again to fea the next

day, in pursuance of her Voyage, with a favourable wind.

Tarmouth, Decemb. 9. About a week fince were caft away to the Northwards about the Spoorne three thips, two of them belonging to Linne, an 1 one to Nea cafile, 7 or 8 only of the men, who were floa ing upon a piece of a wreck, being accidentally taken up and preferved by another thip belonging to Newcaftle, which happily paffed that way.

This day arrived here two thips from Bourdeaux, laden with French Wines, three or four Merchant thips from Lonlon, and one Swede laden with Pitch and Tarre, who in her paffage from Stockholme faw wrecked upon the rocks of Burnt Zoam in the Sound 14 thips, most of which were posed to be Dutch.

Lisbonne, November 24. The Prince Regent has been for four or five dayes diverting him'elf in hunting at Parols about 6 leagues diftant from this City. The Baron de Bape taville Ambaffadour from the Court of Spain, who fome dayes fince arrived at Addea Galega, is lately privately and incognite entred this City, and intends to continue o for about 15 dayes; by which time his Train and Equipage may be fitted up for his publick appearance : which is like to be, with much fplendor and magnificence, he having brought with him 6 rich Coaches, a numerous Train of Servants, and much Baggage 5 for which he is freking out amuch larger Houle than what was here p epared to receive him. The Prince Regent having notice of his arrival, has fent privately to complement him, and prefented him with a large Wild Boar taken by him in his hunting.

The Fountain Fregat having spent her Maft at Sea, was forced to put in here to refit, and may in 2 dayes put out again to sea.

Vienna, Decemb. 2. The Turkish Chiaus having made many Complaints in the Audiences he had from Count Montecuculi Prefident of the Council of War, of the continual acts of hostility practified upon the borders by the Hussis; and with much earnestness prefided the demolition of a Fort which was lately reinforced and fortified by the Count de souches, which they would pretend to be inconfistent with the late Treaty between both Empires; or at least defining liberty for the Bassia of Offen to build another on the other fide the Danube: is forme time fince departed honce, having first received the usual Prefents of Plate for himfelf, and Cloth for his Followers, as has been usually made to Perfons of the fame Character.

Fresheft Letters from Hungary inform us, that three of our Towns of confiderable note have lately called in the Turk and Iworn fidelity to him, and its feared that Deckelburgh may also hearken to the fame pernicious counfel: whatfoever truth there may be in this report, certain it is, the Emperour has ordered the haftening of the Affembly of the Diet of Hungary, wherein care will be taken for the redrefs of all Grievance, and the remedying of all diforders.

The Sieur de Gremonville the French Minjster, is tiere endeavouring to to agree all affairs between the Duke of Nieuburgh and the young Prince of Lorrain, that the Competition between them for the Succession to the Grown of **Poland** may be taken off, and one of them be contented to recede : which 'tis believed will provo a bufinets of lema difficulty.

Hambourgh, Decemb. 7. From Poland we are informed, that the Diet has refolved on the 15 of January next enfuing to proceed to the Election of a Succeffor to the Crown of that Kingdom, faverely enjoyning the Nuncio's to concur with them in this refolution, but Ly no means to attempt any thing that may occasion a Rupture; In or tr to the faid Election, Powers are islued out to leveral Officers to mark out a convenient place for the Camp in the Fie ds near the City of War-(1w, where the Electors are according to the Cuftom on the like occasions, to make their appearance in their Arms. 'Tis confidently faid that the Primate of Poland, the Archbishop of Gnezne and Prince Radzeville, have openly declared in favour of the Prince of Conde; and that by the influence of the Grand Marthal the Sieur Sobiesky, the greatest part of the Army are inclined to his Election : of which, though with much confidence reported,, we must yet expect a farther account.

The Polish Ambassadour sent into Rassia with the News of His Majesties late Resignation, has by his Letters to Warsaw signified, that about the time he was ready to depart from Moskow, there happened in that City a sudden and yielent fire, which had destroyed about 30 thousand Houles, 500 Churches and Chappels, and a Magazine; where was burnt a great quantity of Cloth, to the value of above 50 thousand Ducars.

The Oath agreed upon by the Affembly of the States, to be proposed to all fuch Persons as have Voices or Suffrages in the future Election, is in Effect as follows:

I Swear, That I neither already am; or hereafter will be, bound or engaged either by word or writing, to any Foreigner or Stranger in the Ele-Etion of a Prince: That Ineither already have, nor will enter into any Party or Faction, in order to fuch Eleflion; nor suffer my self to be corrupted through Gifts or Rewards by any Foreign Princes is That I will not give my Vote or Suffinge for any Person but such as I shall judge fitteft for the Administration of the Government of this Kingdom; and if I have formerly obliged my felfeto any Foreign Prince, I do hereby renonnce the said Obligation, and leave his party.

Briges, Dec. 12. Yesterday strived at Offend, one ship from the Canaries, and two from Corunna with 1000 Soldiers, which are to be employed in the service of these P.ovinces.

The conference at Litle is carried on but with little hopes of coming to any agreement in the point of pretentions, the French appearing higher in their demands then formerly.

'Tistai', the Council of spain has thoughts of fixing a Council Soveraign at Bruffe's, to cor fift of four Spaniards, viz. the prefent Governour, Don Pin entel, Don Eftevan de Gamarra, and the Count Salazar. to whom are to be joyned the Prince de Ligne, the Duke de A.rfchot and Prince de Limay, of which we impatiently expect the confirmation.

Hague, Dec. 13. The States of Holland fill continue to take into their confideration the grievances of the people, by reaton of the great number of Officers which are entertained for the levying of the Taxes laid upon Provisions, and are thinking of fome other way of railing moneys, which may prove more beneficial to the publick, and lefs fentible to the people.

The Heer Hu)gens, with some other of the States Deputies, having conterred with the Spanish Ambassador about the discovery and due punishment of those eight persons who committed the late infolency upon the Minister and People at Oudeman, have fince made their report of their faid Conference, in which the Spanifk Ambaffador was pleafed to declare in th name of the Spanish Government, his detestation of tie fact, and to promife, that all poffible care should be taken for the discovery of the perfons, that they might be delivered up to juffice ; and for an encouragement to fuch perfons as shall be active to their apprelientions, the States have publickly declared, that wh foever shall give notice of them, To that they may a 1, or any of them be fecu ed, shall be rewarded will the simme of 1000 Crowns.

Upo confideration of a Memorial delivered to the States by the Spanish Amba⁴⁷ for, containing fome complaints againft the proceeding of the Magistrates of Ulubing, in feifing three men of War belonging to his Cathol . Majeflies Fleet, upon a pretence of a Debt due to _____ erchant of that place, Gilbert Clseffer, for Money expended in that Kings lervice, the proceedings of the Officers were found to be ill advile 1 and is regular, and the fhips ordered to be difcharged : but the Ambaffador also defired to use his interest for the discharge of what shall appear due to the Me chant upon account.

The Danish Admiral Adelaers ftill expected here, upona whole arrival 'tis believed, the dilputes between that King and these Provinces will be ftated, as to the measures of luch thips as thall be allowed freedome of Trade into Denmark and Morway, and the Cuftomer which are to be required of theth in their passage.

The Prince of Parma is lately arrived here, the time of his continuance not yet faid.

The body of the Herr Boreel, late Ambaflador from the States to the Court of France, is faid to be removed from Paris , and may in little time be expected here. We fudden-ly expect here the Ambaffador defigned hither from Partugal, who we are inf rmed fome time fince is arrived at Ro-theile, having taken the opportunity to embath himfelf upon the French squadron which came lately from Lisbonne. We have also advice of two Caraques from Gos, which are lately come into Portuga! with a rich freight, having aboard them above four Millons of Crufado's in Diamonds, and three Millions in other Merchandiles-

His Majesty being informed that the Couriers between France and Spain have received frequent interruptions in therpassige, has sent to Bayonne, St. Fean de Luz, and o-ther places upon the frontiers, expressly commanding, that for the future. free likerty and paffage be given to all Couriers without any hindrance, moleftation, or fearching, (as has been formerly practiled) expecting the Spaniards will likewife allow the fame freedom to fuch as pais between France and Portugal.

The roth inftant, the Marquis de Dethune, was solemn-ly contracted to the Demoifelle d'Arquien, one of the Q eens Maids of honour in prefence of their Majefties at the Louvre, after which, His Majesty began the Ball, which was attended by an excellent Collation, which concluded the divertifement of that day.

His Majefly has given Orders to the Officers of his Galies, fo to order all affairs under their charge, that all his Gallies may be in readinefs to put to fea by the 20th of March next caluing.

Some days firce appeared in this Town, a perfon pretending himlelf to be called Don Balthafar d' Auftria, Marquis de Menefe, and fon to the late King of Spain, and with fome presended Lerters from the Marquis de St. Romain, made his addreffes to Monfieur Colbert, from whom he obtained at the prefert an affiftance of 400 Piftols, but upon forther examination, has been discovered to have been a Jew, perfonsting the decealed Prince, (as he confelles) only to gain a lublifience, for which he flands committed priloner to the grand Chastelet, till farther Order be taken for his due chaflifement.

From Swifferland we are advised, that the Baron de Grify the Savoyard Minister, has had to powerfu an influence upon three of the fmaller Cantons, that he has induced them to quit the affistance of Geneva, and the Countrey of Vaux; but that the other nine Cantons continue firm in their protection; and that the Protestant Cantons have refolved upon an Assembly at Arau, to be held the 10th instantswhere they intend to confult about their Alliances, and other affairs of highest concernment.

From Marfeilles we are told, that a veffel lately ar ived there from the Levant, adviles, that the Grand Mafter of Ma tha, having called a Counfel to confider of the most effeeual means of affilting the befieged City of Candia; many confiderable perfons of the Order of all Nations, freely obered to hazard their lives in that fervice ; and that the Grand Master had made choice of 60 Knights, to each of whom he ordered an hundred Crowns by way of advance, and alf a Crown a day for their pay, with an allowance to eth for their pay; with whom are also to be fent 300 Set jers, bendes such others as are willing to leave their en-p ment on the Galli.s. The Chevalier de la Tour, one of the most ancient Knights, is made choice of to command them; who has accordingly nominated his inferior Officers; and four thips are ordered to attend them for their Transpor-

tations, with a confiderable supply of all forts of necessaries Weymouth, Decemb. 9. There are now riding in the Downs above 40 fail of English and Dutch thips, outwards bound.
