Venice, August 31. N.S.

HE Venetian Fleet is sailed from Ports Porro towards Andros. In Dalmatia our Troops had, according to the last Advices from thence, possessed themselves of the Suburbs of Dulcigno, with the loss of 300 Turks, and intended to attack the Castle the 19th of this

Turin, Sipt. 1. The French Army marched this day from Macello towards Chivas; and the Mare-schal de Catinat is himself come hither. The Army of the Allies was by our last Letters still Encamped near Salugio. 'Tis said, The Truce is prolonged till the 15th of this month.

Vienna, Sept. 5. An Express is just now arrived here in 3 days from the Imperial Army in Hungary, with the News of a Battle; the Account we yet have of it is, That the Imperialists came up with the Enemy between Titul and Temeswaer, being posted on a rising Ground, and having made with their Baggage-Waggons a kind of a Fortification round their Camp; notwithstanding which the Germans resolved to attack them. The Fight was very bloody, and the Turks retired in the night: on our side its Said we have lost above the night; on our side 'tis said we have lost about 5000 Men: The Enemies Loss is much greater; and a Bassa and an Aga are taken Prisoners. Cologne, Sept. 11. The last Letters from the Upper Rhine say, That Prince Lewis was on the 8th instant advanced to Lambjheim; The Landtgrave of Hesse was come within an hours march of him; and they intended to join the next day, and to continue their march towards the French Army, who lay Intrench'd between Neustadt and

Philipsbourg.

Hamburgh, Sept. 11. We have this day the News of the Defeat of the Turkish Army near Temeswaer, which was brought to Dressen by Major-General Roses, who arrived there the 7th, in 5 days from the Imperial Camp. The Dyet of Poland met the 29th, but had not chosen their Spraker when the Letters came away, which was Speaker when the Letters came away, which was the same day. The Hamburgh Convoy is safely arrived in this River from England.

Paris, Sept. 10. The French King's Illness continues, and the Swelling he has between his The Dukes Shoulders has been again Lanced. of Choiseul and de Foix go hence to morrow for Turin; and the Peace of Savoy will be Published here this day. The Letters from Piedmont say, Mareschal Catinat marched the first instant to Settino, two Leagues from Turin, intending to Encamp the 2d at Chivas, the 3d at Caluso, the 4th at Crescentin, the 6th at Trin, the 7th at Villa-Nova, and from thence would march on to Cazal. The Duke of Savoy's Troops would take the same way ? The Foot was to march the 3d by the way of Asia, and the Horse would follow the 5th. The same Letters fay, the Truce was continued till the 15th instant. One of the Men of War of Count Chasteaurenaut's Squadron is returned to Brest, being very leaky. The Death of the Queen of Spain is confirmed.

Loo, Sept. 13. We have advice from Flanders, That the Mareschal de Villeroy was marched from Thielt to Torhout, and that Prince Vaudemont had thereupon passed the Canal, and was Encamped with his Left near Bruges, and his Right near Plassendle; the Duke of Wirtemberg was marched that way with the English Foot from the Elector of Bavaria's Camp at Gramment to join Prince Vaudement, if there was occasion. The King intends to go hence to morrow to Dieren, and the next day to Cleves, where his Majesty will continue on Saturday, and then return to Dieren. The Duke of Zell accompanies His Majesty to

Hague, Sept. 14. N.S. By an Express from Dresden, which came thence the 7th instant, we have an account, That Major-General Roses was arrived there in 5 days from the Imperial Camp in Hungary, with the good News that the Imperialists had beaten the Turks, of whom 9000 are said to be killed; and of the Imperialists, about 5000; among the latter are the Generals Heister and Palfi. General Schoning died the last week at Dresden, They write from Germany, That Prince Lewis and the Landtgrave of Hesse being joined, they marched to attack the French, who were Encamped near Neustadt.
