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Genova, August 26. N. S.

ON the 24th Instant arrived here 4 French Gallies from *Marsilles*, upon wha. design is not known; The rest, 25 in number, are gone to *Catalonia*, with Provisions and Ammunition for their Army in those parts. The French Resident here has acquainted the Senate with the Peace between his Master and the Duke of *Savoy*, and desired that this Republic, or any of their Subjects on pretence of being Creditors to the Empire, will not assist the Germans with any Sums of Money; For if they do, the French King will expect the same from them; To which the Senate have made a general Answer; To wit, That they will endeavour, as they have hitherto done, to maintain an exact Neutrality.

Leghorne, Aug. 27. The *Gospriger*, Capt. *Appilly* Commander, sailed out of this Road the last week for the *Levant*; From whence we have received advice, that Capt. *Brosme* (who was thought to be lost) was arrived at *Alexandria*, and that he was in that Port the 6th of the last month.

Venice, Aug. 31. By Letters from *Porto-Porto* of the 6th Instant we understand, that the Venetian Fleet was sailed thence towards the *Archipelago*; being joined by the Auxiliary Gallies, and the great Convoy commanded by Signior *Duado*; and that a Council of War having been held before their departure, it was proposed by some of the Generals to attack *Negerpone*, but others thought it more advisable to endeavour first to beat the Enemies Fleet, that they might receive no disturbance from them in so great an Undertaking; and the latter was resolved on. Letters from *Smirna* of the 20th of *July* say, the Grand Signior's Fleet, commanded by *Mezzomorto*, was at Anchor near *Foggia*, intending to sail towards *Scio*; It consisted of 22 Ships and 20 Gallies. From *Dabnatis* we have advice, that the Provéditore General *Deifino* having formed a design to attack *Dulcigno*, (being a Harbour for the Corsairs of *Barbary* and Pirates who intercept the Navigation of the Gulf) he drew together a Body of 12000 Men, and having caused them to Embark on several Vessels provided for that purpose, he sailed thither and landed his Men, with some little opposition from the Enemy who endeavoured to hinder it; after which the Venetians took and burnt the Suburbs of *Dulcigno*, having cut off 500 Turks that were posted there, and raised several Batteries against the Castle; and there are Letters from *Andona* which say, a Bark was arrived there from *Dulcigno* with the News, That the Town and Castle were taken the 20th Instant by Assault, many Turks being killed, and 200 taken Prisoners; To which we refer bearing giving an entire credit till we receive it by Letters from the General.

Turin, Sept. 1. Marshal *Catinat* is come hither, and has had a long Conference with the Duke of *Savoy*, at whose desire the Truce is prolonged to the 15th of this month, to see if the Allies will yet accept the offered Neutrality for *Italy*. In the mean time the French make preparations for their march towards the *Milanese*; Their Army decamped this day from *Macello*, and moved towards *Chivasso*; and their Artillery is come to *Moncalieri*, where it will be shipped and sent down the *Po*. The Army of the Allies decamped the 21th from *Chivasso* to approach nearer to the Frontiers of the *Milanese*; and after having lain several days at *Saingo*, they are marched to *Morona* in *Monterrat*; they have laid a Bridge over the *Po* at *Valence*, and have sent a strong Reinforcement to the Garrison of *Alexandria*. 'Tis said, that the Duke of *Savoy*'s Forces are to join with the French after the Expiration of the Truce.

Vienna, Sept. 5. On the first Instant arrived here an Express from the Imperial Army in *Hungary*, who left the Christian and Turkish Armies in sight of each other, being encamped between *Temeswar* and *Titul*; and says, the former were computed to be about 50000 strong, and the latter between 70 and 80000; And this day arrived another Express with the News of a Battle in *Hungary*, which was long and bloody, and ended to the

advantage of the Christians, the Turks retiring in the night, and their loss being much the greatest; but we know not yet the Particulars. We have advice, that the Troops of *Croatia* made themselves Masters on the 14th past of a place called *Chiaplia*, which was fortified, and provided with a good Garrison; They took the Town by Storm, afterwards burnt it, and brought away a great many Prisoners; In their return they met with a Body of 4 or 500 Turks and defeated them.

Cologne, Sept. 11. The Confederate Army under the command of Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, passed the *Rhine* the 31th of the last month, over two Bridges at *Cosbim* and *Menz*, and by several days marches advanced to *Lambshelm*, where our Letters left them encamped the 8th Instant; The Landgrave of *Hesse* with the Troops from the *Meuse*, was come within an hours march of Prince *Lewis*'s Camp; and they intended to join the next day, and then to continue their march towards *Philipsburg*. The French apprehending a design upon that place, had reinforced the Garrison, and Marschal *Choiseul* had posted his Army between *Neustadt* and *Philipsbourg*, intrenching his Camp, and expecting a Reinforcement under the command of the Marquis de *Harcourt*.

Hamburgh, Sept. 11. Letters from *Dresden* of the 7th Instant say, that Major General *Roses* arrived there the same day from *Hungary*, and gave the Electors of *Saxony* an account, that there had been a Battle in *Hungary*, the Christians having attacked the Turks, who were encamped on a rising Ground between *Titul* and *Temeswar*, and had drawn their Baggage Wagons round them in the nature of a Fortification; The Fight was very obstinate; but at last the Turks quieted their Camp, and retired towards *Temeswar*, leaving several Pieces of Cannon behind them, and a Bassa and an Aga were taken Prisoners; Their Loss is computed at 9 or 10000 Men; That of the Christians not so great by almost one half, between 5 and 6000 at the most. The Elector of *Saxony* was in great danger, being in the hottest of the Action, but received no hurt; several of the Imperial General Officers are killed and wounded; General *Heuser* and General *Pasfarc* mentioned among the slain, and Prince *Charles* of *Lorraine*, Son of Prince *Audenant*, among he wounded; The Imperial Army marched the day after the Fight to *Beats* on the River *Therzse*. Letters from *Moscow* of the 16th of the last month advise, That by several Expresses from the Army they had received the News of their having taken the strong Forts of *Asaf*, which surrendered the 28th of *July* upon Articles, in pursuance whereof the Garrison, consisting of 3000 Turks besides Tartars, marched out with their Arms and Baggage, the Moscovites found in the Town 90 Pieces of Cannon, with a great quantity of Ammunition, but the Garrison wanted Provisions; The loss of this Place is like to be of very ill Consequence both to the Turks and Tartars; it giving the Moscovites a passage into the Country of the latter, who will be thereby hindered from sending any Assistance to the Turkish Army in *Hungary*. They write from *Warsaw* of the 29th past, that the General *Dyer* met that day, but had not yet chosen their Speaker. Yesterday the *Hamburger* Convey, with 15 Sail of Merchant Ships, arrived in this River from *London*.

Paris, Sept. 10. The French King keeps his Chamber, and for the most part his Bed; The Swelling was again Launched on Saturday last, and his Illness continues with no very good Symptomes. The Dukes de *Choiseul* and de *Foix* go hence to morrow for *Turin*, and will be soon followed by the Ladies that are to meet and attend the Princess of *Piedmont*. The Peace with *Savoy* will, 'tis said, be published here this day. Marshal *Catinat* marched the first Instant from *Macello* to *Serrino*, two Leagues from *Turin*, and thence would continue his March towards the *Milanese*, when the Truce expired, which is continued till the 15th of this month. The Count de *Chastillon-Rensut* failed the second time from *Bress* on the 27th Instant with a Squadron of 12 Men of War, one of which is since returned, not being in a condition to keep the Sea; They say he is gone

gone to the Mediterranean. In Catalonia the French Army was by our last Advice encamped at *Bagnols*, and the Spanish at *Offabricks*. The French Gallies paied by *Palamos* the 20th Instant, going to *Barcelona*. We have advice of the Death of the Queen of *Spain*, who was several months gone with Child. The Duke of *Chartres*, the Duke of *Bourbon*, Prince of *Conti*, and the rest of the Princes of the Blood, are returned hither from the Army in *Flanders*.

Brussels, Sept. 14. The Army commanded by the Elector of *Bavaria* continues near *Grammont*, from whence the Duke of *Wirtemberg* was debarred yesterday morning with 10 Battalions, to join Prince *Vaudemont*, who, upon the Motion of *Marschal Villeroy*, is marched nearer to *Bruges*. 'Tis Liked, that the *Marschal de Boufflers* has sent some of his Troops to join *Marschal Villeroy*. One of our Parties, consisting of 75 Men, defeated some days ago one of the Enemies of 20 Men near *Grammont*, and brought away 17 Prisoners.

Leo, Sept. 13. The Earl of *Portland* went hence the 6th Instant to *Cleves*, to wait on the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and returned the next day. The 8th the Duke of *Zell* arrived here. The King intends to go hither to-morrow to *Dieren*, and the day following to *Cleves*; whither the Duke of *Zell* will accompany His Majesty. We have this day advice from *Flanders*, that *Marschal Villeroy* was detached from *Torlis* towards *Bruges*, encamping at *Torhout*; that the Prince of *Vaudemont* had thereupon pulled the *Canal*, and was encamped with his Lett at *St. Michel* near *Bruges*, and the Right at *Stalbil* near *Plaffendale*, expecting a Reinforcement from the Camp near *Grammont*.

Hague, Sept. 14. N. S. We receive from several Parts the News of a Battle in *Hungary*; The truest comes from *Dresden*, where General *Roses* arrived the 7th in 5 days from the Army, and brought an account of the defeat of the *Turks*, who after a great slaughter of their Men, retired towards *Temeswaer*. The Particulars we expect by our next Letters. General *Sekoning* died at *Dresden* the 7th Instant. They write from *Germany*, that Prince *Lewis* was marching towards *Philipbourg*.

Edinburgh, Sept. 3. This day were Read in Council His Majesty's Letters Patents, creating the Lord *Murray* (one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and His High Commissioner for Holding the Ensuing Parliament) a Free Baron of Parliament by the Title of Earl of *Tullibairne*, Viscount of *Glenalmond*, and Lord *Murray*. This day also the Council were informed, that the Earl of *Scaforth* (who some months ago made his Escape out of the Castle of *Edinburgh*) had surrendered himself to the Governor of *Brernefs*.

Pembroke, Sept. 7. The 2d Instant came into our Harbour the *Lincoln* Frigate without 150 Sail under her Convoy from *Plimouth*. And this morning the *Lincoln* sailed for *Bristol*.

Hull, Sept. 7. Yesterday sailed out of this River about 30 Sail of Merchant Ships bound for *Holland*, under Convoy of several Dutch Men of War.

Deale, Sept. 6. This day came into the Downs 14 Sail of outward-bound Merchant Ships from *Holland*.

Shoreham, Sept. 7. On the 3d Instant was Launched here a Fifth Rate Ship Named the *Gesper*, of 32 Guns; built by Mr. *Collins* and Mr. *Chasfield*.

Whitehall, Sept. 8. The Association of the Gentlemen of the County of *Stafford*, together with the Associations of the several Parishes and Conitables of the Hundreds of *Seisdon*, *Cutliffon*, and South part of *Totonflow* in the same County, being subscribed by 9215 Hands, was presented to their Excellencies the Lords-Justices, by the Honourable *Henry Paget* Esq; one of the Knights of the Shire for that County.
