General Thingen, who was left with a Body of Troops on the other side the Rhine, to pass that River, and join our Army. The French made likewite several Batteries on their side, and cast up several Works for the greater security of their The 15th several Pieces of Cannon were placed in Battery against the Castle of Witzingen, ficuate near Neuftad: on this fide the Spirebach. Our Hussars brought in several Prisoners, and divers Deserters came over to us, who reported, that our Cannon had killed many of the French. Cannonading continued on the 16th and 17th, and this last day in the Evening 300 Men were ordered to give an Assault to the Castle of Witzinger, our Cannon having made a sufficient Breach, and were soon Masters of it, the Garifon retiring by the Lines of Communication they had made, to Neuftadt; We lost but two Men in this Occasion.

Cologne, Sept. 21. The last Letters from the Upper-Rhine left the German and French Armies encamped very near each other, but the River Spierbach was between them, and the French had very strongly intrenchd their Camp; The Cannon had play'd for several days on both sides; and Prince Lewis of Baden was resolved, if he

found any opportunity, to attack them.

Hamburgh, Sept. 21. N. S. Mr. Crefeet is arrived here from the Court of Lunenburg, to asfift on the part of His Majesty of Great Britain at the Treaty for Adjusting the Differences be-tween the King of Dumark and the Duke of Holstein-Gottorp; and Monsieur Hop is come hither with the same Commission from the States-General of the United-Provinces. The Ministers have begun to meet together on Visits, and to settle the Preliminaries. The last Letters from Poland give us reason to believe, that the Election of a new King will be deserred till March or April next.

Dublin, Sept. 18. We have an account from Capt. Cross, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Down, by his Letter dated the 8th Instant off Galway, That on his coming into that Station he fell in with a French Squadron Commanded by Monsteur Nesmand, which he believes are come there to wait for some East India Ships. The Letters of the 8th from Limerick say, that a Virginia Ship of 12 Guns, laden with Tobacco for London, was chased up that River by a French Privateer.
