

General Tulligen, who was left with a Body of Troops on the other side the *Rhine*, to pass that River, and join our Army. The French made likewise several Batteries on their side, and cast up several Works for the greater security of their Camp. The 15th several Pieces of Cannon were placed in Battery against the Castle of *Witzingen*, situate near *Neustadt*: on this side the *Spierebach*. Our Hussars brought in several Prisoners, and divers Deserters came over to us, who reported, that our Cannon had killed many of the French. The Cannonading continued on the 16th and 17th, and this last day in the Evening 300 Men were ordered to give an Assault to the Castle of *Witzingen*; our Cannon having made a sufficient Breach, and were soon Masters of it, the Garrison retiring by the Lines of Communication they had made, to *Neustadt*; We lost but two Men in this Occasion.

Cologne, Sept. 21. The last Letters from the *Upper-Rhine* left the German and French Armies encamped very near each other, but the River *Spierebach* was between them, and the French had very strongly intrench'd their Camp; The Cannon had play'd for several days on both sides; and Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* was resolv'd, if he found any opportunity, to attack them.

Hamburg, Sept. 21. N. S. Mr. *Crescet* is arriv'd here from the Court of *Lunenbourg*, to assist on the part of His Majesty of *Great Britain* at the Treaty for Adjusting the Differences between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holftein-Gottorp*; and Monsieur *Hop* is come hither with the same Commission from the States-General of the *United-Provinces*. The Ministers have begun to meet together on Visits, and to settle the Preliminaries. The last Letters from *Poland* give us reason to believe, that the Election of a new King will be deferred till *March* or *April* next.

Dublin, Sept. 18. We have an account from Capt. *Cross*, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the *Dover*, by his Letter dated the 8th Instant off *Galway*, That on his coming in that Station he fell in with a French Squadron Commanded by Monsieur *Nesmond*, which he believes are come there to wait for some *East India* Ships. The Letters of the 8th from *Limerick* say, that a *Virginia* Ship of 12 Guns, laden with Tobacco for *London*, was chased up that River by a French Privateer. From *Kinsale* of the 15th they write, that on the 7th Instant arriv'd there His Majesty's Ships the *Harwich* and *Weymouth*, with a retaken Ship call'd the *Dolphin* of *Leverpoole* bound home from *Neuss*; and on the 10th she sail'd from thence with about 30 Sail of the *Virginia* Fleet bound to *Leverpoole*, *Whitehaven*, and *Milford*, under Convoy of the *Harwich* and *Dover* Privateers; The rest of the *Virginia* Men being about 11 Sail, belonging to *London* and *Plymouth*, continued still there. The same day the *Medway* Frigate sail'd to the Westward to cruise. On the 14th the *Weymouth* sail'd likewise to the Westward, and under her Convoy the *Melcovita-Merchant* Store Ship, bound to *Bantry*. And on the 15th was brought in there a French Privateer of 10 Guns, taken about 6 weeks ago by His Majesty's Ship the *Dolphin* off the Coast of *Spain*, and was separated from her in bad Weather.

Edinburgh, Sept. 17. The Parliament have resolv'd to give His Majesty a Supply of Fourteen hundred and forty thousand Pounds Scots, to be rais'd for a year for Maintaining the Standing Forces, Repairing of the Forts and Garrisons, providing of Arms and Ammunition, and paying the Frigats and Cruisers. And Considering the Danger this Kingdom was in by the late intended Wicked and Cruel Conspiracy against His Majesty's Person and Kingdoms, they have Order'd a Committee to bring in an Act for Securing our Religion, Lives and Properties in case (as God forbid) His Majesty should come to any Untimely Death.

Newcastle, Sept. 18. On Wednesday last sail'd from the Bar to the Southward a Fleet of above 100 Sail of Laden Colliers under Convoy of Two Men of War.

Falmouth, Sept. 19. On the 14th in the Evening sail'd hence the *Spanish-Alliance* for the *Grays*, having on Board the Count de *Harach*, the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary to the King of *Spain*.

Deal, Sept. 21. Yesterday came into the *Dromedary* from the Westward His Majesty's Ships *Royal William*, *Offory* and *Albion*, who together with the *Britannia*, *Sandwich*, *Dorsetshire* and *Neposue* sail'd again this morning for the *Nore*.

Whitehall, Sept. 23. This morning we received Letters from Rear Admiral *Bonbow*, dated the 21th Instant on Board the *Suffolk*, about 7 Leagues off *Calais*, giving an account, that on the 15th he saw 10 Dutch Men of War standing in for the *Maele*, who came from the Northward, the Wind at West; He lay till the 17th, (with the *Trent* from the N. E. to S. E.) then the Wind veer'd about to the N. E. and on the 18th, at night, he came up with His Majesty's Ship the *Ruby*, and 3 English *East-India* Ships, that came North about with 11 Sail of Dutch, who were gone in to the *Texel*. That on the 19th, at Noon, he saw 10 Sail to the W. N. W. of him, to whom he gave chase, and about 12 o'clock discovered them to be *Du Barr's* Squadron, he used all possible means to get up with them, and 4 of the headmost Ships came within two miles of them, but *Du Barr* made all the sail he could from him, and might coming on he lost sight of them. On the 21th in the morning Rear-Admiral *Bonbow* chased 4 Sail very near the Banks of *Dunkirk*, which he believed to be Privateers, being much smaller than any of *Du Barr's* Squadron; There were many Ships in *Dunkirk* Road, and therefore he concluded *Du Barr* was got in, perceiving by his Course he was designed for that place. Rear-Admiral *Bonbow* came to an Anchor the same day, about 2 in the afternoon, off *Calais*, from whence he detached the *Suffolk* and *Kings* to the *Nore*, with Orders to the Commanders to take care of the 3 *East-India* Ships.
