TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

MADE-UP TEXTILES TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO FIX MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trades Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October, 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Made-up Textiles Trade Specified in the Trade Boards (Made up Textiles) Order, 1920, HEREBY GIVE NOTICE, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that THEY PROPOSE TO FIX General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time Rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers and to DECLARE the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, as shown in the Schedule set out below.

Provided that workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 16 years may be employed for a period not exceeding six months at a minimum rate which is less by ½d. per hour than the minimum rate applicable under the above Scale.
