late Majesty, Chapter 114. have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the Church and Cure (hereinafter called 'the said Benefice') of Dunkerton, in the County of Somerset and in the Diocese of Bath and Wells:

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Dunkerton is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend Henry Gerard Hallett, of No. 50, Bullingham Mansions, Kensington, W., Clerk

in Holy Orders:
"And whereas the said Henry Gerard Hallett is desirous that the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Dunkerton now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells:

" And whereas the Right Reverend George Wyndham, now Bishop of Bath and Wells, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the Diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he, the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the transfer of the Patronage of the said Benefice of Dunkerton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the Parish or District in or in respect of which the right of Patronage or Advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the Parish of Dunkerton:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Henry Gerard Hallett (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his Episcopal Seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Dunkerton now vested in him, the said Henry Gerard Hallett as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and his successors in the same Bishopric, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said George Wyndham, Bishop of Bath and Wells, and by his successors in the same Bishopric for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said Scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Bath and Wells.

"Whereas by the Will, dated the 13th day of May, 1920, of the late Right Honourable Harriet Sarah, Baroness Wantage, the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to each of the said Benefices was devised to the Bishop for the time being of the Diocese in which such Benefices were situate at

the time of her death:

"And whereas the said Benefices were at the time of the death of the said Harriet Sarah, Baroness Wantage, and now are situate in the said Diocese of Peterborough:

"And whereas Arthur Thomas Loyd, of Lockinge House, Wantage, in the County of
