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Genova, September 30. N. S.

WE hear the French are arming 8 or 10 Men of War at *Toulon*, and that 4 others are gone out to cruise. The 25th Instant arrived here a Ship from *Tripoli*, the Master whereof says, That the Men of War belonging to that Government, who were sent to join the Ottoman Fleet, are expected home again towards the end of this month.

Venice, October 5. The last Letters from the Levant told us, the Venetian Fleet was in the *Archipelago*; That the Captain General raised Contributions upon the Islands there, and that the Frigates he had sent out to cruise had taken several small Vessels bound from *Egypt* to *Constantinople*; The Turks apprehended the Venetians would have landed upon *Negrepoint*, and sent 2000 Men to strengthen the Garison of the principal Fortrefs of that Island; The Captain *Bassa* continued in the mean time with the Ottoman Fleet near *Scio*. The Venetian Land Forces, to the number of 14 or 15000 Men were posted near *Corinth*, and their Parties have made great Spoil about *Thebes*; And the Turkish Forces, who in the beginning of the Summer threatened to march into the *Morea*, continue all this while very quiet on that Frontier. The Turks are very much alarmed at the taking of *Asaf*, which opens a way to the *Moscovites* and *Cossacks* to make great depredations in the *Black-Sea*.

Vienna, Oct. 6. The Imperial Court which has passed some time at *Ebersdorf*, will return hither towards the end of the week, when the Elector of *Saxony* will take his Leave of the Emperor, and return home. In *Hungary* the Campaign is drawing to an end, and our next Letters will probably tell us the Forces are separated in order to repair to their Winter Quarters.

Cologne, Oct. 16. They write from the *Upper-Rhine*, that the Forces of *Hesse*, *Lunenbourg*, and *Munster*, have passed the River *Maine* at several places, in their march to their Winter Quarters; The Regiments of the Garison of *Meuz*, who served in the Confederate Army this Summer, are returned thither with General *Thungen* their Governor; The Forces of *Franconia*, *Suebia*, and *Bavaria*, have passed the *Neckar*; and Prince *Lewis* is gone to *Guntzburg*.

Hamburgh, Oct. 16. The Negotiation is continued for Adjusting the Differences between *Denmark* and *Holstein*; The Ministers of the King of *Denmark* delivered some days ago to the Mediators in Writing, their Answer to the Complaints of the Duke of *Holstein*, and the same was communi-

cated to the Plenipotentiaries of the said Duke; who have since had several Meetings with the Mediators and the other Ministers upon this Subject. They write from *Moscovy*, that the Czar makes great preparations to continue the War against the Turks and Tartars; which will give them a very great Diversion.

Liege, Oct. 17. Our Troops that served in *Flanders* this Campaign are come back to the *Meuse*, from whence they will march to the Winter Quarters assigned them in this Country; Count *Serclaes de Tilly*, who commands them, arrived here two days ago. The Troops of the Garison of *Maestricht*, who likewise made the Campaign in *Flanders*, are returned thither.

Act anent the Alimmenting of Poor Prisoners; were all touched with the Scepter by His Majesty's High Commissioner in the usual manner. Yesterday His Majesty's High Commissioner Adjourned the Parliament till the 8th of *December* next. The same day we received the Welcome News of His Majesty's safe Arrival at *London*; on which Occasion there appeared more than ordinary Demonstrations of Publick Rejoycing. In the morning all the Cannon in the Castle fired 3 rounds; and in the evening, after the Parliament was Adjourned, the Nobility and Members of Parliament attended the High Commissioner to the Palace of *Holyrood-House*, where they were Entertained at Supper, the Windows being full of Illuminations, and making

making a very agreeable fight; After Supper his Grace walked to the outward Court, attended by the same Persons, and was met there by the Magistrates of the City, at which place there being a great Bonfire, the King's Health was Drunk, Kerle Drums beating, and Trumpets Sounding; At the same time the Cannon of the Castle were discharged, and the Regiment of Foot drawn up in the Court fired several Volleys.

The Parliament has not set in all 5 weeks, in which time several things very remarkable were past; For they granted two years Supplies for maintaining the Forces and Garrisons of this Kingdom before they entered on any other Business, and then made several good Laws, and among others one for Levying 1000 Men to Recruit His Majesty's Scots Forces in Flanders yearly; and all hath been done with great Unanimity and Calmness. It's said the Earl of Tullibardine, His Majesty's High Commissioner, will begin his Journey to wait on His Majesty some time this week.

Pembroke, Off. 9. The 7th Instant came into our Harbour His Majesty's Ship the *Speedwell* from Dublin, with 14 or 15 Sail of Merchant Ships under her Convoy.

Plimouth, Off. 13. This day arrived here the *Betty* Transport Ship from *St. Malo*, with about 400 English Seamen who have been Prisoners in France. This day likewise came in here a Suedes Man of War with one Merchant Ship bound to *Lisben*; as also the *Sun of Gottenburg* laden with deal Boards; The *Succels* of and from *Ostend*; The *Patriarch Abraham* of *Danzick* from London; And the *Norsa Signora de Gratia* from Rotterdam.

Yarmouth, Off. 16. The *Garland* Brigat is come into our Road with about 40 Sail of Laden Colliers from *Newcastle*, who will proceed for London with the first opportunity, the Wind being now against them.

Portsmouth, Off. 16. Sir *Cloudesty Shovell* arrived here yesterday, and went on Board His Majesty's Ship the *Queen*, where the Blue Flag was thereupon hoisted on the Main-top-Mast Head. He will put to Sea with the Ships bound to the *Straits* with the first fair Wind.

Shoreham, Off. 14. There was Launched last week at this place a new Ship of the Fifth Rate for His Majesty's Service, called the *Feversham*, carrying 135 Men, and 34 Guns; Built by Mr. *Thomas Ellis*.

Kensington, Off. 16. His Majesty returned hither this Evening from *Windfor*.

London, Off. 17. *John Clauscy* was the last Sessions at the *Old-Baily* indicted for endeavouring to draw off Capt. *George Porter* from being a Witness against the Earl of *Ailesbury*, the Lord *Montgomery*, and Sir *John Fenwick*, enticing him to that end to go into France, and giving him for his Encouragement 300 Guinea's in hand, with a Promise to remit to him 300 more when he was arrived there, and that the Lord *Ailesbury*, Lord *Montgomery*, and Sir *John Fenwick*, should each of them allow him 100 l. per Annum; And this day the said *John Clauscy* was brought to his Tryal and found Guilty of the said Offence, and received Judgment to pay 500 Marks Fine to the King, to stand 3 several days in the Pillory, and to find Sureties for his good Behaviour for a year. Also this day *Thomas Pyke*, who had been formerly Indicted of High-Treason for going into France, was

Tryed and found Guilty, and received Judgment of Death, as in Cases of High-Treason.
