Corunna, O.E. 20. The Spanish-Expedition Pacquet-Boat arrived here the 19th Initant from Falmouth. This morning failed hence 3 Durch Privateers, with 4 Prizes which they took some days ago, and brought into this Port. They write from Cadiz of the 27th past, that the Cloudesty, Beake, and Trumbull Galleys, were arrived there, and would fail again the next day. Twas lately reported, that the French Squadron commanded by Monsieur Chafteau-renaut had been seen on the Coast of Partugal; but we have since heard no surther news of them.

Leghsine, Off. 8. We have advice, that the Scanderson Convoy, with the Merchant Ships under command of Capter Mesody, arrived at Smirns the 18th of August last. The Dragon Frigat, Capt. Rigby Commander, had taken off Rhodes a French Ship of 180 Tuns, bound from Alexandris to Constantinople: And afterwards, near Scio, Capt. Moody took a French Satea bound to Metelin to lade Corn. An English Ship (which is supposed to be the Charles, Capt. Pickering Commander) took the 29th past a rich French Merchantman bound home from Turkey, and carried her to Naples.

Milan, Off. 10. The Neutrality or Suspension of Arms for Italy was signed the 7th of this month at Vigevano (near which place the Forces of the Allies are encamped) by the Ministers of the Emperor, the King of Spain, and the Duke of Savoy, in pursuance of which the Siege of Valence, which had lasted 15 days with open Trenches, was raised yesterday; and both the German and French Troops are to leave Italy forthwith, and to march home; The Germans are to have 300000 Pistoles of the Princes of Italy in lieu of Winter Quarters, whereof one third part is to be paid immediately, and Security given for the rest. Some days before the Truce was signed the Garison of Alexandria defeated a great Party of the Enemies Troops consisting of 1200 Men, of whom they killed 600 upon the place of sight.

Turin, Off. 11. The French Forces drew off from before Valence the 9th Instant; and on the 13th they will begin their march homeward; The Germans and other Auxiliary Troops are to do the like. Hostages are given for the performance of what is agreed on; Those for the Emperor and King of Spain are the Prince of Trivultio and the Marquis of Burgamaners; and the Count de Tesse and Marquis de Pins are shostages for France. The Duke of Savoy is expected here in tew days.

Vence; Off. 12. Yesterday arrived here a Ship from the Levant, and brought Letters dated the 8th of the list month at Napoli di Romania, which say, a Vesse was arrived there from the Archipelago, and reported, that there had been an Engagement between the Venerian and Turkish Fleets, but could give no account of the success of it. We hive advice from Constantinopse, that the present Sultana is brought to Bed of a Souver which General Caprara liad sent a Reinforcement thirther. The Turks have abandoned Moravita on the Save, which they took lately, after having plundered it.

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
