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HE King of Spain has been ill again these last 4 or 5 days, his Fever being returned, and having had several Fits of it; But they say His Majesty is bet-The Queen is pretty well, recovering ily. The Count de Harrach, Envoy Eurordinary from the Emperor, atrived here some days ago by the way of the Groyne. They write from Barceloua, that the Spanish Galleys were returned into that Port; They went out to look for the French Galleys, and found them near Palamos; The Spanish Galieys lay by for them 4 hours, but the French avoided an Engagement by making the best of their way in for the Shoar; Soon after there came up a strong Leom, which hindred ours from following them; Sweral of our Galleys have fuffained damage by the Weather, and the Gapicana lost her Main Mast; The Duke of Nacra, who commanded our Galleys, his gained much Honour upon this Occasion. The Letters from Cadiz of the 27th past say, the Bub, Cloudesty, and Trumball Galleys, were arrived in that Port from England, the Mumford, and Toree butters, who came out in their Company, are arived at Malaga; and the Richardson went directly for Barbary. The Armies in Catalonia are retired to their Winter Quarters. The Moors are before Ceuta, the positive Orders of Muly Isand obliging them to continue the Siege norwithflanding the great Losses they have sustained, and the little progress they have hitherto made
