

At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 10th day of *August*, 1921.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Part II of the Administration of Justice Act, 1920, provision has been made for the reciprocal enforcement of judgments in the United Kingdom and in other parts of His Majesty's Dominions:

And whereas by the said Act it is amongst other things provided that where His Majesty is satisfied that reciprocal provisions have been made by the Legislature of any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom for the enforcement within that part of His Dominions of judgments obtained in the High Court in England, the Court of Session in Scotland, and the High Court in Ireland, His Majesty may by Order in Council, declare that the said part of that Act shall extend to that part of His Dominions and that on any such Order being made the said part of that Act shall extend accordingly:

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied that the Legislatures of the parts of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereinafter mentioned have made reciprocal provisions for the enforcement within those parts of judgments obtained in the High Court in England, the Court of Session in Scotland, and the High Court in Ireland:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above recited Act in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Part II of the Administration of Justice Act, 1920, shall extend to the parts of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom hereunder mentioned:—

Cyprus.

Gibraltar.

And the Right Honourable Winston Spencer Churchill, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter 134; of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 49; and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 55, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Representation, bearing date the 17th day of February, 1921, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 49; and of the Act of the 19th and

20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the consecrated Church of All Saints, Great Saughall, situate in the Parish of Shotwick, in the County of Chester and in the Diocese of Chester:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of All Saints, Great Saughall, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said Parish of Shotwick, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, together with the Extra Parochial Place called Shotwick Park, in the said County and Diocese, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is, with the said Extra Parochial Place, delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of All Saints, Great Saughall, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, Great Saughall.'

"And with the like consent of the said Henry Luke, Bishop of Chester (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of All Saints, Great Saughall, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees or dues to be received in respect of the publication of banns and of the solemnization or performance of marriages, churchings and burials should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, Great Saughall, comprising:—

"I. All that part of the Parish of Shotwick, in the County of Chester and in the Diocese of Chester, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon part of the north-west by the Extra Parochial Place called Shotwick Park, in the said County and Diocese, upon the south-west by the Parish of Hawarden, in the County of Flint and in the Diocese of Saint Asaph, upon the south-east by the Parish of the Holy Trinity, Chester, in the said County of Chester, and in the said Diocese of Chester, upon the north-east partly by the New Parish of the Holy Ascension, Upton, and partly by the Parish of Backford, both in the said County of Chester and in the said Diocese of Chester, and upon the remaining part of the north-west by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Powey Lane where the boundaries of the said Parish of Backford, the New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Capenhurst, in the said County
